

# **2025-2025 Tutoring**

Principal Jim Rhoades at Gerke Elementary is seeking tutoring help for Franklin first graders. Franklin First has committed to tutoring in partnership with Mr. Rhoades. We are again recruiting tutors to work on reading skills with students identified by the school as in need of assistance. School staff provides the curriculum.

We will be tutoring during the fall from September 18 through November 13, excluding October 9 and 23. The winter session will run from January 8 through March 19, excluding February 12 and March 5. You can tutor

for both sessions, choose the session that fits your schedule, or serve as a substitute.

The program meets weekly on Thursdays from 3:15 until approximately 4:30 (or when your assigned student has been picked up). If you are not available for every week, a sub can fill in. All tutors must have had a background check, and we will provide that as needed.

The schedule for tutoring operates as follows:

3:15-3:30	Recreation time
3:30-3:45	Snack time
3:45-4:30	Tutoring time
4:30	Pickup time

Tutoring is a great way to bless a child, helping them to achieve their very best. Students and tutors often form a great bond of friendship. Talk to Linda Smith or Pastor Laura to sign up or with questions.



#### **Weekend Snack Packs**

Franklin First will be partnering with Principal Jim Rhoades at Gerke Elementary to provide snack packs for first grade students. Many of our local families struggle with food insecurity and rely on school meals to help with their children's nutrition. The snack pack program provides shelf-stable snacks to help families through those days without school meals. The bags are packed on Wednesday afternoons beginning at 1:30 in the Mission Room on the third floor. They are then transported to the school for student distribution on Friday. You are welcome to help pack the bags, and donations to the mission program are always

appreciated. Please talk to Linda Smith or Karen Anderson if you are interested in helping. We will let you know as soon as we can when this ministry will start for the fall. It will operate throughout the school year.

### Faith as a Shield Against Bullying

School can be a challenging environment, and for many children, bullying is a harsh reality. While schools strive to create safe spaces, and parents equip their children with coping mechanisms, there's an often-underestimated source of resilience that can make a profound difference: a faith community. For children facing the taunts and aggression of bullies, a vibrant faith community offers far more than just comfort; it provides a unique blend of spiritual, emotional, and social support that can transform their experience.



One of the most immediate benefits is the sense of belonging and uncondition-

al acceptance. Bullying thrives on isolation and making a child feel like an outcast. Within a faith community, however, children are typically embraced for who they are, regardless of their popularity at school or any perceived "differences" that bullies might target. This deep sense of belonging acts as a powerful antidote to the loneliness bullying can engender, reminding children that they are valued and loved.

Beyond acceptance, faith communities often instill **core values and moral frameworks** that empower children to navigate difficult situations. Teachings on compassion, forgiveness, justice, and the inherent worth of every individual can provide a strong internal compass. When faced with unkindness, a child grounded in these values may be better equipped to understand that the bully's actions reflect their own issues, rather than a true assessment of the victim's worth. This perspective can help mitigate the emotional sting of bullying and prevent it from eroding self-esteem.

Furthermore, faith communities offer access to a supportive network of adults and peers. These trusted adults can provide practical advice on how to respond to bullying, help children process their feelings, and even advocate on their behalf if necessary. Similarly, connections with peers who share similar values can foster strong friendships, creating a "safe haven" where children can feel understood and supported, reducing the power of the bully's influence.

Finally, for many, faith itself provides a profound source of **inner strength and hope**. Prayer, meditation, or simply reflecting on spiritual teachings can offer a sense of peace and resilience during times of distress.

In essence, a faith community doesn't just act as a shield against the pain of bullying; it cultivates inner resources and external support systems that help children not just survive, but thrive. It reminds them that they are part of something larger than themselves, deserving of respect and love, and equipped with the strength to face adversity with courage and grace.

#### \*A Call for Peace in the Midst of Conflict in Mideast\*

As Bishops of The United Methodist Church, we stand united in our pursuit of peace and our commitment to the sacredness of human life, guided by the Scriptures and our Social Principles. The scriptures and the Social Principles affirm the sacred worth and dignity of every person, emphasizing the importance of resolving disputes peacefully and promoting justice, equality, and compassion.

In light of the recent escalation of tensions in the Middle East, we echo the timeless wisdom of the prophet Micah, who implored us to "act justly, love mercy, and walk humbly" (Micah 6:8). Our Social Principles remind us that war is incompatible with the teachings of our Lord Jesus Christ (§ 163.F). and we urge all parties involved to prioritize diplomacy and dialogue over violence and aggression.

The Bible reminds us that "blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God" (Matthew 5:9). We are called to be peacemakers, seeking solutions that promote understanding and reconciliation. A continued conflict in the Middle East would have devastating consequences, causing irreparable harm to innocent lives and destabilizing the region and affecting communities throughout the world.

In this critical moment, we call on all United Methodists to join our efforts in advocating for peace. May God guide us toward a hopeful future, where nations and peoples can live in harmony and mutual respect. Together, let's join in this prayer:

God of justice and compassion,
we lift our voices in prayer for peace in the Middle East,
that all hearts may turn from violence to understanding and from fear to hope.
Guide your leaders with wisdom and courage to pursue the path of peace,
rooted in the dignity and sacred worth of every person.
May our prayers rise as a witness to your hope and healing for all nations.

#### WAS JESUS REALLY NICE? DISCOVERING THE **UNPLEASANT TRUTH**

What if I told you "Jesus wasn't nice"? Would you agree or disagree? Would it change the way you see Jesus?

One of the first things I learned about Jesus on my own (rather than having Sunday school teachers, youth group pastors and leaders, and pastors tell me things about Jesus) was that Jesus wasn't nice.

Read the 23rd chapter of Matthew and tell me if that's something a "nice" person would say. Let me give you some highlights:

> You blind guides! You filter out an ant but swallow a camel.

How terrible it will be for you legal experts and Pharisees! Hypocrites! You are like whitewashed tombs. They look beautiful on the outside. But inside they are full of dead bones and all kinds of filth. 28 In the same way you look righteous to people. But inside you are full of pretense and rebellion.

You snakes! You children of snakes! How will you be able to escape the judgment of hell?

Not very nice things to say to the religious leaders of his day.

I think we create all sorts of problems when we think Jesus was a "nice" person and that our calling is to be "nice."

Now, don't get me twisted. I'm not saying that Jesus was bad nor am I telling you to forgo being nice and flat out be a jerk. There's a difference between being nice and being good.

being good, not nice.

It's worthwhile to note the difference between the two. Because, nice people don't get crucified.



Being nice verse being good Being nice can be a deterrent from being good.

"Nice" people don't really confront evil. They're too concerned with being polite and proper. They don't want to be a disturbance.

Good people confront injustice and evil — often making "nice" people uncomfortable.

"Nice" people don't challenge the status quo. They'd rather maintain it, because to challenge the status quo -- to cause a disturbance -- wouldn't be very polite or nice.

Good people will challenge the status quo so that the (quoting Isaiah 43) uneven ground will become level.

The famous preacher Tony Campolo called this discrepancy out once in a sermon at a church gathering (and I paraphrase):

There are millions of people dying of hunger right now.

None of you in this church give a f%\$# about them.

And right now you're more concerned about what I said than the people dying of hunger.

Jesus was generous with love and grace which resulted Jesus was good, not nice. Therefore we should focus on him being rejected by the authorities. Jesus was inclusive, and in doing so, pushed the boundaries that led him to be persecuted by the powers that be.

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If Jesus was "nice" he wouldn't have challenged the system that was oppressive and marginalized the vulnerable. Again, if Jesus was "nice" he wouldn't have been killed.

Jesus was good. His mission was to share the goodness of God's kingdom, not to be "nice." The goodness of God's kingdom very often conflicts with the values of the world.

Jesus was unflinching in proclaiming the Gospel — even at the risk of offending the powerful people. Jesus spoke truth to power and opened the gates to include those who were excluded from the religious system. And it cost him his life.

I know I've said this twice already but it's worth mentioning again: if Jesus was "nice", he wouldn't have been killed.

So what does this mean for us?

A focus on being good

Well. Let's not focus so much on being nice, proper, and prim. Don't get me wrong — being those things do have a time and a place. I'm also not saying go out there and be a complete jerk. However, when we put all of our focus on being nice, it will get in the way of being good.

So may we focus on being good.

Good pushes us to be inclusive; to challenge the status quo; to do the work on making the ground level for everyone, particularly the vulnerable and marginalized.

Being good gives us the courage to speak truth to power; to name injustices; to work towards wholeness.

Being good allows us to partner with God in ushering God's kingdom closer and closer.

I mean, when we ask ourselves "WWJD" (what would Jesus do?), an option is to flip tables out of holy anger and bringing light to injustice for the sake of goodness.

However, we should note that being good may often require a sacrifice, as Jesus has shown us. But the Kingdom of God will not be ushered on the back of being nice.

We have too many nice Christians. We need more *good* Christians.
