WHY DID JESUS HAVE TO DIE?

The Christian Church teaches that Jesus' death on the cross and his resurrection carry ultimate meaning for our salvation, but did you ever ask yourself the question, "Why did Jesus have to die?" The Gospel writers saw the crucifixion and resurrection as the climax of God's work in the life of Christ. As followers of the risen Lord, we cannot understand Jesus without understanding his crucifixion.

During Lent, I will be leading a Bible study on Rev. Adam Hamilton's book, "Why Did Jesus Have to Die?" The New Testament is surprisingly vague on precisely how Jesus' death saves or why, exactly, Jesus had to die. The New Testament authors, writing after Christ's death and resurrection, offer at least ten different metaphors to describe the meaning of his crucifixion, but these only offer glimpses as to how it accomplishes its saving work.

The atonement, the work of Jesus on the cross to reconcile and restore humanity to God, is often described as a mystery. Many Christians focus on one dimension of this atoning work, usually forgiveness, which is utterly important. But there is far more that Christ's death is affecting than our forgiveness.

The class will meet on Sunday evenings at 5:30, February 22 and March 1, 15, and 29 to discuss the various Theories of Atonement that address this important question. A light meal will be provided. Please register through the church office by February 15 so that we have enough materials available. You will not need to purchase the book (although it is available on Amazon), as we will be using handouts.

Join us and add meaning to your observance of Lent as we deepen our understanding of God's work through Jesus Christ.







Ash Wednesday: A Sacred Beginning to Lent

Ash Wednesday ushers in the start of the season of Lent in the church. On this day, we confront our own mortality and confess our sin before God within the community of faith. We will be holding a short service at 6:30 PM on February 18, which will include the Imposition of Ashes. The use of ashes upon the forehead has been a sign of mortality and repentance within Jewish and Christian worship for generations. Lent is a time to prepare our hearts and souls before we remember the death and resurrection of Christ.



Lenten Series: The Seven Last Words of Christ

Jeff Sams and Pastor Laura will again be providing a dialogue series during the Lenten Worship services beginning February 22. This year's focus will be on the seven last statements made by Jesus while on the cross. Join us Sundays at 10:45 to experience the message of the season in a new, engaging way.



Noisy Bucket: Teaching Generosity Through Missions

Franklin First's kids will be passing the Noisy Bucket again during the season of Lent. Your donations of change will be pooled together to support the ministries of Heifer International. After Palm Sunday (the last week of Lent), the kids will choose which animals and other Heifer initiatives to enable with the funds. This is a great way to teach our children about world missions and the fact that the United States is a very wealthy nation compared to the vast majority of the world. Please save your coins!

Preparing the Heart: Three Practices for a Meaningful Lent

As we approach the season of Lent, many of us begin to think about what we might "give up." While fasting is a beautiful tradition, the heart of Lent isn't just about subtraction—it's about reorientation. It is a 40-day journey intended to thin the distractions between us and God as we prepare for the miracle of Easter.

If you are looking to deepen your spiritual walk this year, consider adopting these three simple yet profound practices:

1. *The Practice of "Holy Silence"*

Our world is increasingly noisy. This Lent, try to carve out ten minutes of intentional silence each day. This isn't just "quiet time" to think; it's time to listen.

The Goal: Turn off the podcast, the music, or the news during your morning commute or coffee.

The Scripture: "Be still, and know that I am God." (Psalm 46:10)

2. *Creative Fasting*

While fasting from food is the biblical standard, many find spiritual clarity by fasting from things that clutter the mind. Consider a "Digital Fast" (limiting social media) or a "Grumbling Fast" (committing to zero complaints for the day).

The Goal: Replace the time spent scrolling or complaining with a short prayer of gratitude.

3. *Intentional Acts of Generosity*

Lent calls us to look outward. Beyond our usual tithes, look for "micro-opportunities" to show Christ's love. This could be writing a handwritten note of encouragement to a neighbor or keeping small gift cards in your car to give to those in need.

The Goal: To move from self-absorption to selfless action.

A Lenten Prayer: *Lord, as I enter this season, strip away the things that keep me from You. May my choices be a bridge to your grace and my practices a reflection of your love. Amen.*

Whatever path you choose this season, remember that Lent is not a test to be passed, but an invitation to be transformed. May your journey be quiet, prayerful, and full of hope.


The Pantry —Help Provide Care Essentials

Let us Embrace Humble Discipleship

Walking Together into God's New Work

As we begin the new year, my first word is gratitude.

I give thanks for the people of Ohio – pastors, lay leaders, congregations, and communities – who have walked faithfully through seasons of change. Across this State, I have witnessed quiet courage, generous service, and love that sought no recognition. These moments have stayed with me, strengthening my hope and deepening my trust in what God is doing among us.

With gratitude for the past and with expectancy for the year ahead, we pause to listen.

“See, I am doing a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?” (Isaiah 43:19)

God’s word through Isaiah reminds us that the future does not begin with our plans, but with God’s faithful action. The question before us is not whether God is at work, but whether we are attentive enough to notice it. This new year invites us to listen carefully for what God is already bringing into being.

The God who makes a way in the wilderness and streams in the desert (Isaiah 43:16-18) continues to lead us – often quietly, often unexpectedly – calling us to walk by faith rather than familiarity.

The Way of Humble Discipleship

At the heart of God’s new work is humility.

The coming of Jesus Christ teaches us again that God chooses the way of self-giving love. “The Word became flesh and lived among us” (John 1:14) – not in power but in presence, and not in spectacle but in nearness.

Humility opens our hearts to see what fear and certainty often obscure. When we make room through



self-emptying, we become attentive to God’s presence in ordinary days. As Paul reminds us, Christ “emptied himself, taking the form of a servant” (Philippians 2:7). This is not weakness, but the strength of love.

My hope for this year is simple: that following Jesus will feel less like a burden and more like a source of life – less like obligation and more like joy. May humble discipleship quietly renew and steady us for the journey ahead.

Turning Toward Our Neighbors

Humble discipleship always turns us outward.

Again, and again, Scripture calls us to a life that is open and generous toward the neighbor. Jesus tells us plainly, “Just as you did it to one of the least of these ... you did it to me” (Matthew 25:40). In caring for our neighbors, we encounter Christ himself.

In a time when our society feels weary and divided, the Church is invited to embody openness – listening across differences, caring without conditions, and choosing compassion over fear. God’s abundance is not discovered by holding tightly to ourselves, but by offering ourselves in love.

When the Church lives not for its own preservation, but for the sake of others, Christ is made visible again.

We hold our churches, our leaders, and our communities across Ohio before God, trusting that we do not walk into this new year alone. As we pray for one another, we lift our eyes to see the light God is revealing among us. In this season of Epiphany, we move for-

ward together – guided not by fear, but by the light of Christ already shining across Ohio.




