Your Generosity is a Blessing

The year 2024 is almost ready to draw to a close, and Franklin First has engaged in some amazing ministry this year:

* About 5900 weekend snack packs will have been distributed to Anthony Wayne and Gerke children in need. This year, Franklin High School's National Hon-



- or Society has partnered with us to provide items for snack packs and student assistance with packaging the snack packs. We are so grateful for their help!
- * We provided literacy tutoring for ten second grade students at Anthony Wayne during the winter term of 2024. These kids also received free books regularly for their home library. The students love the relationships they build with their tutors. We look forward to tutoring with Gerke first graders after the Christmas break.
- * Our church has taken meals and appreciation gifts for Anthony Wayne and Gerke staff multiple times.
- * We collected school supplies which were divided up between all the schools in Franklin.
- * We have participated in community events like the Wettest Parade in Ohio (July 4), National Night Out, and the Community Trick or Treat increasing our visibility in the area.
- * Our Free Medical Clinic provided care for increasing numbers of uninsured or underinsured people this year. We also continue to offer free small-scale durable medical equipment such as walkers, crutches, braces, and bath aid devices.
- * The Angel Shop Boutique was blessed with continued formal wear donations and welcomed almost 100 young people who chose their special occasion attire free of charge. Our Angel Shop benefited from grant money that allowed the purchase of display equipment and better advertising.
- * Our FFUMC kids collected \$1,625 in the noisy bucket for Heifer Project International to provide animals for needy families around the world. They will be collecting again during Advent 2024.
- * Monthly birthday contributions totaling \$765 will have been given to the following charities: The United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR), Abilities First, Big Brother/Big Sisters of Cincinnati, and Franklin High School Senior Fees.
- * FFUMC is administrating the Christmas food and gift ministry for approximately 60 families this month. The cost to sponsor a food basket is \$25 per basket.

- * We have made quarterly contributions to the Franklin Community Pantry of paper products, baby items, cleaning supplies, and personal care items.
- * We are hosting and co-sponsoring an average of more than 350 community meals per month in partnership with St. Mary's Catholic Church and this year's new partner the Coffee Collab food truck. Previously with Hope and Red Lion United Methodist churches.
- * Our very active Women's Circle provided funeral dinners as requested, and supported Breast Cancer research in October with a \$324 donation from their bake sale which was met with a triple match from the Susan Komen Foundation. The Fall Marketplace was another success, and workers prepared 572 batches of noodles.
- * Our music program has inspired us with the Chancel Choir, Women's Ensemble, and the Aspenleiter Bell Choir gracing our worship with their songs. They were an inspirational part of our Homecoming celebration in September. Worship was followed by a delicious complimentary meal from the Coffee Collab. Our music groups held a Broadway concert, which raised \$720 for the Franklin High School Music/Drama Department.
- * Emphasizing our social media presence and on-line worship has increased the visibility of our church in the greater Franklin area and beyond. Theresa Fultz and Joe Chamberlain have spearheaded this ministry.
- * By the end of 2025 and since the inception of our grant awards, Franklin First will have received more than \$95,000 in grants from the Great Miami River District and the West Ohio Conference enabling a greater impact in ministry than we could financially do on our own. These grants were made possible by paying 100% of our apportionments.
- * Community friends have partnered with us to provide financial resources in support of our ministry. The Ruppert Family Foundation, Franklin-Carlisle Rotary Club, the Carlisle Alumni Association, and generous people from the Franklin area have all contributed to our various ministries.

Your faithful stewardship has enabled this and more. Thank you for your year -end generosity that keeps our ministries vibrant! Pastor Laura

We have been notified that we will be receiving the following grants next year.

- * A Great Miami River District "Community Connection" grant in the amount of \$2,500 to support the outreach work we do locally.
- * A Great Miami River District "Snack Pack" grant in the amount of \$4,000.

Trustee Update—Insurance Update

As you may know, we were notified last May, our insurance for the church would not be renewed. The trustee's started searching for a replacement company then. As we worked the process of finding new coverage, we were surprised with the findings. The number of com-

panies offering coverage for churches continues to shrink in size. Being offered coverage comes with a lot of demands, and churches with large steeples are an issue. We were denied insurance from approximately seven companies.

We were finally offered coverage by three companies. The first had an unrealistic premium, the second was liability only. We settled on Mennonite Mutual who offered catastrophic coverage at a reasonable premium, but a very large deductible. After a building inspection by Mennonite Mutual, we were required to upgrade and complete some building maintenance to comply with their requirements. Those were completed, along with pictures, and invoices for the work, and a second inspection. We submitted the application for insurance, and will have binding coverage as of this writing.

The insurance company was impressed with was, how well the building has been cared for, based on it's age, and the obvious pride of the congregation.

Every year, Christmas causes us to make room in our homes

and schedules. Our routines are disrupted as we get ready to celebrate and find ourselves busy with events and gatherings.

As you go through your preparations and celebrations, these devotions provide opportunities to pause and reflect on how you will you make room for the best things — others, hope, peace, joy and love — this Christmas.

MAKE ROOM FOR OTHERS

The light was in the world,

and the world came into being through the light, but the world didn't recognize the light.

The light came to his own people, and his own people didn't welcome him.

But those who did welcome him,

those who believed in his name,

he authorized to become God's children. –

John 1:10-12 CEB



Christmas is a time of welcome!

The Christmas celebration Las Posadas comes from the Hispanic traditions of Latin American countries, especially Mexico. It dates back to the 16th century.

Every evening from December 16-23, with a special service on Christmas Eve, those celebrating Las Posadas travel together to a predetermined place where they knock on the door of a darkened home to begin a liturgy.

The community gathered outside asks for lodging in the voice of Joseph. "We have come exhausted from Nazareth," the United Methodist Book of Worship reads.

The people inside give a rational response, "We do not give lodging to strangers."

Readings from Scripture follow until the people inside the desperately want. home turn on the lights and invite the travelers to come inside. "Lodging we will give you with much happiness,"



they say, "enter, good Joseph; enter with Mary." When everyone is inside, it is time to celebrate!

Making room for Jesus includes making room for our neighbors. Jesus taught that

what we do for others, we also do for him.

What rituals will you go through to prepare for Christmas? How will you make room in your life in the days ahead? How will you reach out in love and service to your neighbors around the corner and around with world?

How will you make room for others this Christmas?

Prayer: O God, open my eyes to see those with whom I can share your love this week. Amen.

Mary said,

He has scattered those with arrogant thoughts and proud inclinations.

At Christmas, we can lose focus on what is most important, thinking more about what we want than what we already have in Christ.

In the United States this year, Amazon.com released its first-ever, print, toy catalog for Christmas. It even included stickers to help family members highlight the items they most want this year.

We sometimes come to Christmas from a place of lack. We ask our kids what they want for Christmas and make wish lists of our own. We worry about having enough money to get everyone the gifts we've imagined they so desperately want.

We do all of this in celebration of the birth of Jesus, who had nearly nothing — not even a proper place to be born. Yet we proclaim this child to be King of Kings and Lord of Lords. Clearly there is more to Christmas than the gifts we exchange. It is the gift we receive in Christ.

The baby with "nothing" is the hope for the world.

What do you want for Christmas? Where do you sense lack? How will you refocus your attention on the hope found in Jesus Christ?

How will you make room for hope this Christmas? Prayer: O God, refocus me on the hope I already have in Christ. Amen.

MAKE ROOM FOR PEACE

Nearby shepherds were living in the fields, guarding their sheep at night. The Lord's angel stood before



them, the Lord's glory shone around them, and they were terrified.

The angel said, "Don't be afraid! Look! I bring good news to you — wonderful, joyous news for all people. Your savior is born today in David's city. He is Christ the Lord. — Luke 2:8-11 CEB

Christmas is busy! There is so much to do!

The decorating needs to be done. We need to prepare for the arrival of guests. You may be expected to attend the company Christmas party with your spouse.

The <u>kids' pageants at the church</u> are coming up. Shopping and baking still needs to get done. We wonder every year how we're going to fit it all in.

But it's not this way only at Christmas time. Some of us live similarly the other 11 months of the year also. We expend so much energy going from here to there, accomplishing to-do list item A through to-do list item Z with little room to pause and ponder.

Maybe that's one of the reasons the shepherds were the first to hear about the birth of Jesus. They were "living in the fields, guarding their sheep at night." It must have been quieter with their flocks than it was

with the crowds in town who'd arrived for the census.

In the midst of our busyness at Christmas and other times throughout the year, we need to take time for wonder, awe and peace.

Have you been busy as you prepare for Christmas? How will you take time to go out to the fields and look up into the sky? How will you pause, process and give thanks for all that God is doing in and for you?

How will you make room for peace this Christmas? Prayer: O God, slow me down so that I might experience the wonder, awe and peace of Christmas. Amen.

MAKE ROOM FOR JOY

Since Joseph belonged to David's house and family line, he went up



from the city of Nazareth in Galilee to David's city, called Bethlehem, in Judea. He went to be enrolled together with Mary, who was promised to him in marriage and who was pregnant.

— Luke 2:4-5 CEB

As Mary and <u>Joseph</u> traveled to his hometown, many of us go home for Christmas as well. We journey near and far to gather with family and friends, some of whom we may not see at any other time of year.

For infrequent travelers, the idea of getting on an airplane or packing the car can seem overwhelming. Where is that suitcase? Is this too big to be a carry-on? Do we have everything the kids will need? How will we travel with the gifts we'll give and later return with the ones we'll receive?

Many will over pack, only to realize later we didn't need to take *everything* with us.

In our everyday lives, we can also carry a lot of negative, emotional "baggage." Anger about that event long ago still travels with us. Hurt from a difficult relationship seems always nearby. Internal struggles about money, time, and other resources are held onto. We need to pack lighter.

When we carry too much, we hinder our ability to receive. Our hands must be empty to embrace the joy of

Advent is a time when we are comfortable moving things around to make room in our homes for Christmas.

How will things be moved around in your home this Christmas? What needs to be rearranged in your life to make room for the Christ child? What changes will you make to carry Christ with you every day?

How will you make room for love this Christmas?
