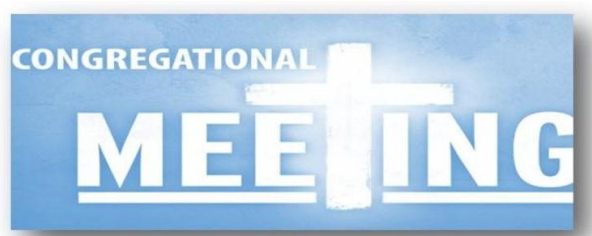

Pastor Niki's Ponderings

January

Years ago, I stumbled upon an author by the name of Donald Miller. He came into prominence with a book entitled "Blue Like Jazz: Nonreligious Thoughts on

Christian Spirituality." I enjoyed his style of writing; reflective on the ordinary, everyday encounters. But it was his book "A Million Miles in a Thousand Years" that truly struck a chord for me. This book chronicles his journey of editing his previous book from a "meandering memoir to a structured narrative" for the movie screen, and editing his life in the process to mean something more than what it has become. And while I have notes written all throughout one of my copies of the book (I bought a second when I met him in person, just so he could sign it), there is one quote in particular on my mind for the new year we approach.

"A story is based on what people think is important, so when we live a story, we are telling people around us what we think is important."

Consider some of your favorite stories, biblical or not. One of my all-time favorites is The Lord of the Rings trilogy by J.R.R. Tolkien. I watch the movies around this time every year. There are numerous characters in this sweeping story, but the ultimate goal is to rid Middle Earth of an ultimate evil and its power so that the people of Middle Earth can live their lives in peace and freedom from said evil. To Tolkien, the acknowledgement that there is evil in the world was important, but more important was the ability of ordinary people to come together, in spite of their differences, and to stand against that evil. And they did it not just for themselves, but for the good of all in Middle Earth.

Most of us are not living lives that require us to battle orcs and goblins with swords and axes or to scale rough terrain to throw a powerful ring into a volcano. However, we are all living stories. We live a story as individuals. Our family has a story that it lives. Our community, our church, the people of God...we all live a story together too.

Our story is telling people around us what we believe is important. If a person in the community hasn't heard of our church, is unfamiliar with the kinds of ministry we do, doesn't know about how we encounter the living God, then what kind of story are we telling? Are we telling a story that grips the hearts of those who hear it? Or one in which

someone can eat popcorn, play on their phone, and not feel like they missed much? Do we need to reevaluate how we tell it?

Last year at this time, we took our daughter to see “The King of Kings,” an animated retelling of the life of Jesus based on a manuscript Charles Dickens wrote for his children. In the movie, we not only get to experience the story of Jesus for ourselves, but we get to see one of Dickens’ children (and his cat) experience it too. For our daughter, it was like experiencing the story of Jesus with another child, just like her. She gazed with wonder at his birth story, laughed as Jesus interacted with his friends, asked us questions of curiosity, and curled in my lap with sadness when Jesus died. And when Jesus came back from the dead? Oh, the joy in her dancing around the aisle in front of us!

What do you believe matters the most to our church? How do we live our story so the world knows the reason for the hope that we have? And how do we invite others to be a part of God’s story with us?

Well, here we are in that time of year again. The weather is cold and snowy. It still gets dark earlier than we would like. It just feels...ho-hum. Unless you’re incredibly excited your team is actually going to the Superbowl this year! (I know...I just had to.)

Truthfully, I’ve considered the whole phenomena of modern day professional sports a lot lately. What is with all of the excitement that can be felt for our professional teams (or even college teams, for that matter.) Living an hour away from Buffalo, NY, I continually heard about the “4 Superbowls in a row, but no ring” debacle from older Bills fans. Here in Pittsburgh, there are so many stories about the “Steel Curtain”, that incredible defensive line in the 1970s that helped the Steelers on their way to their own 6 Superbowl rings. Most people here don’t want to hear about my team’s own 6 Superbowl rings, the greatest comeback in an NFL Superbowl (Atlanta will never be made to forget the numbers “3-28”), or Drew Bledsoe’s concussion that led to the young Tom Brady

becoming the starting quarterback of the New England Patriots. Being a New England Patriots fan, but living outside of New England, can be a social difficulty. Geoff looks amused by how excited I get when I see someone wearing a Patriots jersey or hat in Steelers territory. It’s like finding another alien amongst humans.

We call ourselves Patriots Nation, just as many of you belong to Steelers Nation. We wear similar clothing to others in our “nation,” share collective memories of big games, particular players, and groan about shared frustration with our franchises. Do you see where I’m heading with this?

It’s a shared identity. A community. A group of believers with stories, and in some seasons, hope.

Just as those who are part of a community of fans find common ground on which to connect, may it also be so with the Body of Christ. Nowhere do we see this more clearly than in passages like Acts 2, when the fellowship of believers gathers its possessions to share with one another, or in the coming together of the tribes of Israel to form one holy people as they entered a covenant with God. Ecclesiastes reminds us that “two are better than one”, as they can work together for a common end. And Romans 12 serves as a reminder that even with how different our gifts may seem to be, there is always a way that God intends to bring fruit from our sharing of our gifts with one another.

One of our favorite wedding gifts came from one of my aunts. She made a quilt with matching pillows. One side uses Steelers fabric and the other uses Patriots fabric. Even when we couldn’t agree about what side should be displayed, the blanket always kept us warm.

In difficult and divisive times, it is important for us to gather and to remember that finding common ground, having real and honest dialogue, listening to one another, and continuing to love as Christ taught us to love, is paramount. May it always be so for each of us.

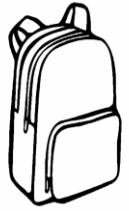

\$\$ PER CAPITA \$\$

AUPC's 2026 per capita, as formulated by the Presbytery of Kiskiminetas, has been calculated at **\$40.66 per member (a correction of the previously published \$39.24)**. This amount is then multiplied by the number of **active members** from the previous year. AUPC had 106 active members when the 2026 per capita was calculated, therefore being responsible for **\$4,187.98** to be paid before the end of 2026. We urge all members to pay their individual per capita during the months of January and February. The total amount collected during those 2 months is sent to Presbytery in a lump sum and the balance due is divided by the 10 months left in the year. This method of monthly payments eases any stress on the general budget that a large, one-time payment might cause. **AUPC is responsible to pay for each member listed as active whether or not those members pay their share.** Our goal is to keep our financial commitment just as we have done in the past. With your help, we will be able to meet that commitment and do it with a manageable monthly payment. Your per capita payment will be welcomed at any time throughout the year if you are unable to contribute during January or February. We thank all of our members for their continued support, financially, spiritually, and in-kind giving. AUPC is truly blessed.

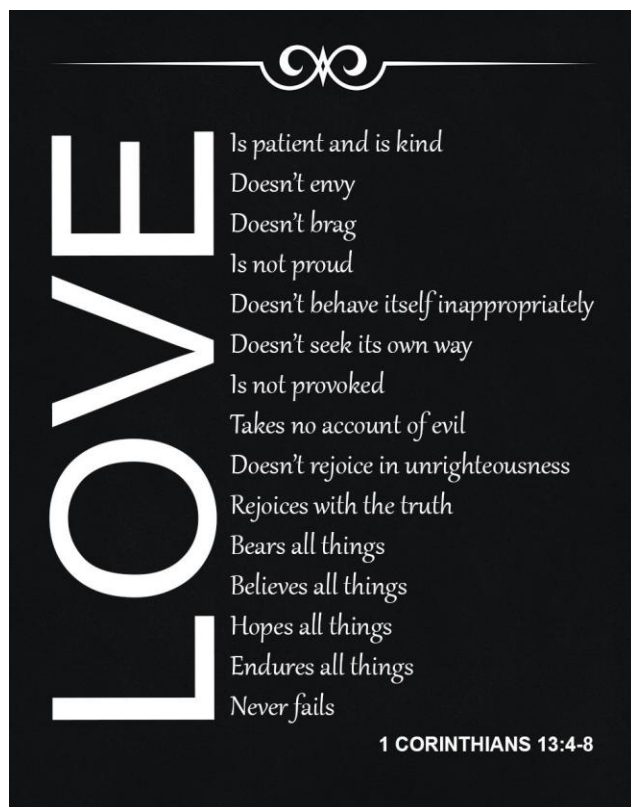
