Before our reflex response of "Christ is Risen, indeed!", perhaps it is good for us to consider our own expectations for what it means to worship a God who loved us so much, that God did all of this to be in relationship with us. 

Something new is coming to AUPC...

Pretty soon, you will begin to see a transformation occur in a space of our church's sanctuary. With the gracious financial and spiritual support of our Presbyterian Women and the leadership of our Session, we will be putting in a "Pray-Ground!" A what??? Here are some questions you may have...

What is a "pray-ground"?

-A Pray-Ground is a designated space in the sanctuary where young children and their families can experience worship through age-appropriate worship materials and tools that can help to keep them engaged in what is happening – materials like children's Bibles and books, coloring/drawing materials, soft toys, puzzles, and other items that can relate to the church season or worship theme. Some churches will put a pray-ground in the front of their worship space, as it is easier for children to see when they are up front. However, our sanctuary isn't set up for that ability, so ours will be in the back corner, but facing an aisle so children can still see!

Why do we need a "pray-ground"?

-A pray-ground is an intentional part of a larger worship space. Some caregivers prefer to remain in worship together rather than separating from their children for a variety of reasons (limited time together during the week, separation anxiety, medical reasons, ritual of worship is soothing, etc.) A pray-ground acts as an "accommodation," such as a wheelchair ramp or a hearing aid, to help children access worship in a way built for them. It also helps to remind us that the kingdom of God is filled with diversity, people of all ages, abilities, and personalities. And that worshiping God is for all of us, not just some of us. Worship is at the heart of what we do as a church family, and a pray-ground is yet another tool in AUPC's toolbox for a swiftly growing children's ministry (a blessing for us all!)

Who is the pray-ground intended for?

- Generally-speaking, the Pray-Ground is intended for kids who are in pre-K and younger, or who are not yet old enough to attend Sunday School. Kids who do attend Sunday School sit in worship with their parents until the Moment of Word and Wonder (15-20 minutes into the service), and then go to Sunday School after that. But we also recognize that many ages and neurodivergent types get wiggles and fidgets, so if you forget to bring tools for your kiddo to worship alongside of you, the Pray-Ground can be an option.

What other options do caregivers have for the kids they bring to worship?

-For kids who are too young to attend Sunday School, there are three options: the Pray-Ground, where they stay for the service with their caregivers sitting with them; the nursery, which is open during every worship service for children 4 and under, and where the service is piped in through speakers (we are working on having this staffed with volunteers who have passed their clearances starting in September); and, of course, parents always have the option to simply sit with their children in the pews. We have activity pages and children's bulletins in the vestibule for kids who need a few extras to help hold their

attention in the pews. Any of our ushers can help you find your way to these options, if you need some help.

But...won't a Pray-Ground make it noisy and distracting?

- The world around us can be a noisy and distracting place. We all sneeze, cough, move in our seats, sometimes wear squeaky shoes, and even some crack their knuckles! But yes, we get why you're asking this question and it definitely is one we've discussed amongst our ministry team and in other groups. Honestly, it may not be any noisier than it would be if those same kids were sitting in the pews!

We also took great care in doing our research and connected with other churches who have praygrounds to see how they handle any extra noise. We have selected play items that would keep the noise to a minimum: the blocks are made of foam, many of the toys and books are plush (we have play food and a play farm, as well as felt books with Bible stories), and even the baskets where we keep the crayons are made of fabric.

The only items that could really be used to make noise would be if a child were to bang a crayon or puzzle piece over and over on the table, but if/when this happens, a caregiver would *hopefully* step in quickly. Same for dumping the entire basket of crayons out, which will happen occasionally. But the same thing could happen for a child sitting in a pew!

One of the things shared by another church was that, surprisingly, they found that the noise level has gone down since settling in to having a Pray-Ground. "The first few weeks were a little louder, but now the "regulars" know what is expected of them, and they are rarely disruptive. On occasions when there are a lot of visiting children (Christmas Eve, for example, or Easter morning, or when we have several baptisms with lots of visiting family), things do tend to be a little louder, but if it means that children who aren't generally in church are in church, we give thanks and move on!"

Now that I know what a pray-ground is, what is it not?

-The pray-ground won't be staffed. Children are not to be left unattended, so caregivers are expected to sit at the pray-ground and worship with their children.

-The pray-ground is not intended to be a substitute for church or Sunday school (there's a reason it's called a pray-ground, not a playground.) There will be items in it that are faith-based, as well as items that foster learning. As stated above, it's another tool in our toolbox for helping all ages and abilities learn to worship together!

-The pray-ground is not a place of judgment, just like the rest of our church. If someone is in the pray-ground who looks "older" than a 5-year-old, we trust that they are there because it's necessary for them.

Prayer List! <u>How it works:</u> Please list prayer concerns on the back of the attendance card found in your bulletin. We will place these names on our "Immediate" prayer list for three weeks. The *newest names will appear in italics*. On the third week we will '**bold' the name**. The prayers of concern will then move to the "Continuing" list and will remain there three more weeks and then rotate off, unless otherwise requested. If you don't see a name that had previously been there and that person still requires prayer, please list the name again. Also, please list spelling corrections, if needed. **IF WANTING TO ADD NAMES TO THE BELOW LIST DURING THE WEEK, PLEASE CONTACT THE CHURC OFFICE.**
