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
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


















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Richard L. Kiner



On Saturday, Oct. 25, Loudonville High School seniors Nora Lance and Lettie Wenell ran in the Division IV Regional Cross Country Championships at Boardman High School in Youngstown. Both athletes completed their four-year careers on the Loudonville cross country team.

Lance placed 92nd out of 159 runners, finishing the race in 23:33. Wenell earned 43rd place out of 174 runners, completing the course in 18:12.

Head Coach Whitney Snyder praised their performances. "Both ran very good races to round out their senior year of cross country and fourth year of high school cross country. Our region regularly has an extremely competitive field, and they held their own and represented Loudonville well," Snyder said.

# Hands-On Farm Safety Event Scheduled

Farmers and first responders in Ashland, Holmes and Wayne counties will have the opportunity to receive hands-on manure pit rescue training during the Conservation Chat: Lagoon Lifeline on Dec. 6.

The event, hosted by the local soil and water conservation districts, will feature a 20-foot trailer holding 150 gallons of water designed to simulate emergency conditions in a manure pit. The training covers recognizing confined space hazards, managing low-oxygen risks, and performing rescue operations.

The session will be held at Valley Vista Farm near Jeromesville. Firelands Electric Cooperative will also present an afternoon demonstration on electrical safety using a high-voltage Power Line Safety Demonstration trailer, showing how energized lines and other electrical hazards are handled in emergency situations.

The training is free, and advance registration is required. Organizers are monitoring interest to determine whether a second session will be added. 


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# Loudonville JH Golf Wraps Up 7-2 Season

The Redbirds junior high golf team wrapped up its 2025 season with a 7-2 record, remaining undefeated at Pleasant Hill Golf Course. The team came close in matches against Wooster and West Holmes, where the loss was determined by only a few strokes. The final match was canceled and couldn't be rescheduled.

Over the course of the season, Loudonville golfers faced a variety of course conditions. They competed at Fire Ridge in Millersburg, known for its hilly terrain and elevated greens; Vernon View in Mount Vernon, which features heather grass and tight fairways; and their home course, Pleasant Hill, where the greens proved especially challenging.

"This season brought about many surprises," said Assistant Coach Steve Jeffries. "We got to witness a group of incoming seventh graders, some who hadn't previously golfed, finish the season as skilled golfers."

Individual scores included a 31 by eighth grader Wyatt Artrip in a nine-hole match against Northmor, the lowest score recorded by a Loudonville golfer this season. Seventh grader Grayson Buirley scored a 40 against Fredericktown, the lowest score on the girls side. Seventh graders Grayson Wilson and Adrian Lee each recorded birdies during match play. Seventh graders Elliott Merritt and

Braxton Tuttle joined eighth graders Artrip, Aiden Stone, Bentley Shearer and Mathew McClure to complete the top six lineup.

Jeffries also noted the rising interest in golf across the community. "Interest in golf has picked up in Loudonville," he said. "Other than Wooster, we had the biggest team out of the opposing teams." He added that the girls program is still developing but said he is optimistic. "Soon it will take off when the current girls get into high school and are able to showcase their talents."

Head Coach David Artrip expressed pride in the team's growth and resilience. "I'm very proud of this group of athletes and what they accomplished as individuals and as a team," he said. He emphasized the unique challenges of golf compared to other sports, explaining, "Most sporting events, either home or away, have the same conditions, boundaries and setup. With golf, there are a lot of variables, and it's less predictable."

He also spoke about the mental demands of the sport. "It takes a lot of focus and mental toughness to be consistent," he said. "Add the pressure of having spectators right up on you watching you play. It's not easy."

Looking ahead, Coach Artrip is confident in the eighth graders moving on to high school. "The eighth grade golfers we are sending

up to high school all have the skill set and experience to contribute right away," he said. "We have 13 golfers currently in junior high. In a few years, this group of kids will play some great golf in high school."

He added, "My goal is to come back next year for junior high golf with an even bigger team.

Pleasant Hill and Round Lake golf courses provided space for practices and hosted several of the team's matches during the season.

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# Loudonville Ends Football Season with 3-7 Record

The Loudonville High School football team showed significant improvement in 2025, finishing with a 3-7 record after a winless season in 2024. The Redbirds started the year strong, opening with back-to-back victories over Mapleton (60-0) and Richmond Heights (48-16), before facing a series of tough matchups.

Several games came down to the wire. Loudonville appeared to have the upper hand against Danville, holding a late lead before a final-minute touchdown gave Danville a 34-28 win. Another close game went to overtime against Fredericktown, where the Redbirds fell 26-20. They also picked up a narrow win over Cardington-Lincoln, 21-16, before finishing the season with a 41-19 loss to Northmor.

Collin Caley led the Redbirds in scoring with 12 touchdowns and four conversion runs, totaling 80 points. Josiah Hershberger added nine touchdowns and 71 points, while Braylon Kauffman and quarterback Chayse Wright each scored six touchdowns. Caley also made big plays on special teams, returning three kickoffs for touchdowns, including two runs of 80 yards.

Wright guided the passing game with 126 attempts and 59 completions, including a long 60-yard touchdown pass. Loudonville totaled 3,079 yards on the season, with Caley and Hershberger making significant contributions in the running and return games.

On defense, Hershberger led the team with 120 total tackles, two interceptions, and three fumble recoveries. Gavin Eikleberry added 116 tackles, while Nic Buzzard, Coalton Poole, Zeb Brecheisen, and Kauffman all made significant contributions in sacks, tackles for loss, and pass deflections. The team tallied 907 total tackles, eight interceptions, and 50 tackles for loss over the season.

Several players earned postseason honors in the Knox Morrow Athletic Conference. Hershberger was named first-team linebacker, Drew Robinson earned second-team recognition on the defensive line, and Caley was named a second-team defensive back. Eikleberry received honorable mention, and Brecheisen earned all-academic honors.

Head coach Ed Honabarger praised the team's progress from last year's winless season. "Obviously, we wish our record was better, but the program took big strides in being a competitive football team this season," he said. "If we created a few more breaks, we could have easily won six or seven games."

With seven seniors moving on, Honabarger emphasized the importance of leadership from the returning players. "This year's senior class worked hard in the weight room and on the field. Their effort will be sorely missed. Now it's time for the upperclassmen to step up, continue to work hard and keep building the program."

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

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
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
