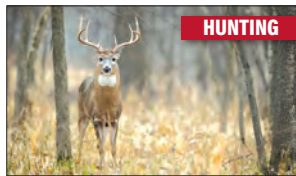

Ashland Council Takes Action on City Projects

Ashland City Council approved the \$420,000 purchase of a Ford Transit vehicle for the city's wastewater division during its September 15 meeting. The vehicle will be equipped with cameras and other viewing technology to provide images from inside the city's sewer system. Delivery is expected in spring 2027.

Council approved a contract for 6,000 tons of salt at \$91.45 per ton, up from approximately \$58 per ton last year. The salt will be available beginning January 15, 2027.

Council also approved a 10-year, 50% tax incentive application for a proposed retail development on a corner lot at Third and Orange streets, where the original building has been demolished. Developer Matt Wurster is proposing a 2,600-square-foot retail store with approximately 1,200 square

feet of rooftop seating. The project is expected to be completed during the first quarter of 2027.

The development would be another addition to Ashland's Pumphouse District, where apartment units are expected to begin leasing in November.

Mayor Matt Miller announced that Ashland's sanitation rates will increase at the beginning of next year. The fees cover trash and recycling services within the city.

Miller also announced that fluoride will no longer be added to Ashland's city water beginning this weekend due to difficulty obtaining the supply. He said he was unsure whether the change would be permanent and that it would not affect the taste or quality of the water.

Miller reported that Smith Paving and Excavating has been selected as the contractor for the multipurpose pathway along U.S. 250. No construction date has been set.

Miller also reported that a proposed housing development on land behind the Ashland County Sheriff's Office, extending to Hillcrest Drive and Davis Road, will not move forward. The developer is considering another local parcel for housing.

The next council meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, October 6, at 7 p.m. on the third floor of the municipal building, 206 Claremont Ave. Meetings are open to the public and livestreamed on YouTube.

Commissioners Approve \$300K ODOT Agreement

The Ashland County Commissioners approved a \$300,000 agreement with the Ohio Department of Transportation to replace and install guardrails on various county roads using Fiscal

Year 2031 funding during their September 17 meeting.

The commissioners approved several appropriations for anticipated remaining-year expenses, including foster parent support, child

support enforcement, public assistance, prosecutor seizure expenses, Job and Family Services legal expenses, Health Department expenses, Local Emergency Planning Committee grant funding and Dog & Kennel payroll.

The board authorized a \$52,000 transfer to the Dog & Kennel Fund to cover remain-

ing-year payroll expenses. A Health Department transfer of \$626.60 from the Mosquito Grant travel account to other expenses also was approved.

The commissioners approved an agreement allowing the Ashland County Department of Job & Family Services to continue participating in the Ohio Child Protective Services Fellowship Program. The program provides services for recruiting, hiring and training college students interested in careers in child welfare.

The board approved auctioning surplus county

equipment through GovDeals in accordance with Ohio Revised Code.

Personnel appointments within the Department of Job & Family Services also were approved.

The commissioners authorized Then & Now Certifications and payment of warrants for the commissioners and Health Department. A travel request also was approved.

The board canceled its meeting scheduled for September 22 due to a lack of agenda items.

Rebecca Garcia, program director of Safe Haven of Ashland, provided an update on the organization's

impact over the past year, upcoming events for October's Domestic Violence Awareness Month and its request for 2027 support. The commissioners approved approximately \$13,000 in support for Safe Haven for 2027.

The commissioners entered executive session to discuss collective bargaining matters with the director of the Department of Job & Family Services. They also said they would discuss other personnel matters during the session.

The next regular meeting is scheduled for 9 a.m. Thursday, September 24, in the second-floor conference room of the Ashland County Building, 110 Cottage Street. Meetings are open to the public and streamed live on the "Ashland, OH County Government" Facebook page.

Perrysville Council Reinstates Administrator Amid Dispute

The Perrysville Village Council voted Monday, September 14, to reinstitute the village administrator position following a contentious discussion over Mayor Steve Goines’ refusal to appoint two applicants to the village’s Board of Public Affairs.

After the previous village administrator resigned in November 2025, council created a Board of Public Affairs to oversee the village’s water and sewer programs. Ohio Revised Code requires the village to have either a Board of Public Affairs or a village administrator to remain in compliance. Board members are appointed by the mayor.

Goines appointed Marianne Price to the board in June but has been unsuccessful in appointing the remaining two members. In August, the village received letters of intent from Mike McCaskey and Eric Edmondson expressing interest in serving on the board.

Goines said Monday that he would not appoint McCaskey because of concerns stemming from his previous employment with the village. He said he would leave the two positions vacant rather than appoint the applicants.

Because of the lack of Board of Public Affairs or village administrator, the village has not been able to apply for certain grants and is not in compliance with Ohio code.

Council member Carol Secoy challenged the decision, saying it was “a disservice to the community” to disregard the applications because the mayor did not want to appoint the applicants. She said McCaskey and Edmondson should be appointed immediately. Board members Christopher Clady, Ruth Zakutni and Randall Stroh agreed.

Goines maintained that his decision was in the village’s best financial and long-term interests.

Clady said the issue needed to be resolved as soon as possible. Council member Bill Herman suggested promoting street maintenance superintendent Donovan Switzer to village administrator with an accompanying pay adjustment.

Switzer said he was willing to take on the position and was already performing duties required of the administrator.

Council voted to reinstitute the village administrator position, effectively eliminating the need for the Board of Public Affairs. The proposal will be forwarded to the village solicitor to draft legislation making the change official before the next meeting.

The action will allow the village to return to having a designated administrator responsible for the water and sewer operations and address the compliance issue that has affected grant opportunities.

Council approved the purchase of 100 tons of road salt from the Ohio Department of Transportation for the 2026-27 winter season.

Zoning Inspector Rodney Fry reported that the property at 137 North Bridge Street remains in legal limbo. A judge granted the village’s request March 3 to demolish the structure because of safety hazards, but the owner filed for relief July 31, delaying the demolition. On August 21, a magistrate ruled in favor of the village. Fry said the owner had 14 days to appeal but he had not yet learned whether another appeal

had been filed. The Ashland County Land Bank has approved demolition assistance if the court order stands.

Council referred a proposal to change the village’s health insurance reimbursement program to an employee health insurance plan to the finance committee. The village previously did not have enough full-time employees to qualify for a group plan but now has three.

Council approved garage door maintenance at the sewer plant and village maintenance garage and agreed to pay for Switzer to attend Operator Training Committee of Ohio (OTCO) classes toward his wastewater operator certification.

Council member Matt Schwartz reported that he had contacted the Ashland County Sheriff’s Office for information comparing law enforcement coverage in the village with the two previous years, when the village contracted with the sheriff for dedicated coverage. Schwartz said coverage has decreased by approximately 30% and that no deputy was present during some key times, including school bus pickup and drop-off. He recommended council consider options for increasing coverage, including the possibility of a police levy.

The village’s Halloween event was set for October 31, with a parade beginning at 4:30 p.m., followed by costume judging and trick or treat.

The next council meeting is scheduled for Monday, October 5, at 6 p.m. in the community building. Meetings are open to the public.

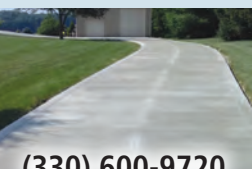

FLANK STEAK WITH
PEACH PLUM NECTARINE
SALSA

Yield: 6 servings

INGREDIENTS

- Steak:
- 1 pound flank steak
 - 1 teaspoon garlic powder
 - 1 teaspoon salt
 - 1 teaspoon ground cumin
 - 1 teaspoon dried oregano
 - 1 teaspoon chili powder
 - 2 tablespoons olive oil
- Salsa:
- 1 peach, pitted and cut into 4 wedges
 - 1 plum, pitted and cut in half
 - 1 nectarine, pitted and cut into 4 wedges
 - 1 to 2 jalapeno peppers, stemmed, seeded and cut in half lengthwise
 - 1/4 cup minced red onion
 - 2 tablespoons chopped cilantro
 - 1 tablespoon freshly squeezed lime juice

DIRECTIONS

Thoroughly tenderize the steak by pricking both sides with a meat tenderizer or fork. In a small bowl, stir together garlic powder, salt, cumin, oregano and chili powder and rub onto both sides of meat. Pour oil onto the meat and lightly rub on both sides. Cover tightly in cellophane wrap and refrigerate overnight or at least 2 hours.

Place fruit wedges and jalapenos on a well-oiled grill over medium heat and cook for a few minutes on each side to lightly char. Let cool, then chop and place in a medium bowl with onion, cilantro and lime juice; stir to combine. Cover and refrigerate until ready to serve.

Remove cellophane wrap from meat and place on grill over medium heat. Cook for 5 to 7 minutes on each side or until meat is cooked to your liking. Let stand for 5 minutes before thinly carving at an angle against the grain.

Transfer meat and juices to a platter. Serve with Peach Plum Nectarine salsa and warm flour tortillas, shredded cheese and sliced avocados.

The Ashland City Schools Board of Education reviewed 22 district policy updates Monday, September 14. Eighteen policies were revised, covering topics including staff activities, athletics, medications, volunteers and public records. Three policies were rescinded, and one was rejected.

Students use timelines, memoirs, photo galleries and other sources to examine historical influences and make modern-day connections. Electives include Holocaust, Psychology and Sociology.

The Ashland County Fair will run September 20-26, with Ashland City Schools' Fair Day scheduled for Friday, September 25. There will be no school for students that day, and teachers will participate in an in-service day. The homecoming football game will kick off at 7 p.m. Friday, September 25, with the Ashland High School Homecoming dance scheduled for Saturday.

The board's next regular meeting is scheduled for September 28 at 5:30 p.m. in the district's administrative offices, 1407 Claremont Avenue. Meetings are open to the public and regular monthly meetings are livestreamed on YouTube.

Former Board Member Applauds L-P Facilities Plan

Kathy Adams, an eight-year veteran of the Loudonville-Perryville Board of Education, praised the current board for its work on the Master Facilities Plan during the board's regular meeting Monday, September 14.

"I know how difficult it is to put a plan like this together, and I feel you have done a wonderful job with it," said Adams, a retired Ashland City Schools teacher and longtime advocate for public education.

The meeting lasted about 15 minutes, with the board approving routine matters through the consent agenda. Among the items approved were acceptance of more than \$26,000 in donations, including \$14,261 from St. John's Evangelical Lutheran Church in Perryville for the Budd School Outdoor Education Program and \$11,409 for the community-school liaison program. Board Member Dave Hunter said the church funds came from its recent building auction.

The board also approved participation in federal, state and local grant programs totaling approximately \$659,082; use of

Budd Auditorium by the Loudonville Street Fair in the event of inclement weather; a special education program through High Road School in Bucyrus; amended student handbooks; and field trips through December. Several personnel changes and supplemental contracts also were approved.

Hunter, the board's liaison to Heartland Technical Education Center, reported that construction on the facility is nearing completion, with some laboratory work remaining. He expressed concern about the condition of State Route 60, which is closed for construction, and criticized the suggested detour using State Route 511 and U.S. 30 because of safety concerns at the intersection.

He reminded board members that an open house for the renovated Heartland facility is scheduled for Thursday, October 22, at 5:30 p.m.

In her monthly report, Superintendent Jennifer Allarding said some of the high school students have been spending Friday mornings at McMullen School, greeting younger stu-

dents, promoting kindness and helping with activities. She also noted student participation in the September 11 tribute hosted by American Legion Post 257 and said she is looking forward to the October 6-10 Loudonville Street Fair.

Allarding also distributed a revised version of the proposed school strategic plan and asked board members to review it before its planned discussion at the October 12 meeting.

Board Member Wende Lance was absent, so no legislative report was given.

At the close of the meeting, the board entered executive session to discuss school security arrangements and emergency response protocols.

The next board meeting is scheduled for Monday, October 12, at 6 p.m. in the high school cafeteria. All board meetings are open to the public.

New Philadelphia's offense proved too much for Ashland to handle September 11, as the Quakers cruised to a 35-10 victory over the Arrows in front of a packed Community Stadium crowd on Military Night.

Ashland's lone touchdown came on defense when junior Brayten Stuart intercepted a New Philadelphia pass and returned it 34 yards for a touchdown. Junior Layton Roop added a 33-yard field goal to round out the Arrows' scoring.

Junior quarterback Liam Hubacher started under center for Ashland and completed 16 of 30 passes for 117 yards before sophomore Carson Graber took over. Graber completed 6 of 9 passes for 21 yards but was intercepted twice as New Philadelphia's defense kept the Arrows' passing attack in check throughout the second half.

Senior Killian O'Brien led the receiving corps with six catches for 48 yards, while junior Carter Nelson added eight receptions for 42 yards.

The loss dropped Ashland to 3-1 on the season and 0-1 in Ohio Cardinal Conference play.

Ashland traveled to Dover September 18. Results were not available at press time.
