Anywhere, anytime. Just meeting you in the Word is so hard sometimes.



#### The History of

### Dillsboro United Methodist Church

The first Methodist Episcopal Society was formed around 1828 and worshipped in the Presbyterian Church, which was located where the old cemetery is now (about a quarter mile north of our present church building).

On June 9, 1838, the first Trustees were elected. They were Isaac Randal, William Glenn, Sedan Bramble, James Stevenson, and Abraham Pearson.

On March 18, 1840, the Trustees purchased Lot No. 22 in the Town of Dillsborough for \$100. That same year a frame building was erected, and it was in this building that the first Quarterly Conference for the Wilmington Circuit was held on December 26, 1846.

In the year 1874 the present brick building was built on the same site.

Around the year 1900 the spelling of Dillsborough was changed to Dillsboro.

It may have been in 1938 when a two-room frame structure was added to the east end of the brick building. One room served as a furnace room and the other was used for the primary Sunday School class.

In 1948 the first electric organ was installed in the church. This was made possible by a generous sum of money willed to the church by Mrs. George Ellerbrook.


In the late 1940's and early 1950's, Sunday School teachers, officers, and members of the church realized the growing demand for more room for Sunday School classes and a place for entertainment and recreation. At this time there were ten Sunday School classes with an average attendance of 142 per Sunday. The classes were Primary, Boosters, Victors, Good Samaritans, Star Light, Sun Shine, Peg-A-Ways, Master Builders, Corinthians, and Men's Bible Class.

A large two-story Bedford stone addition was started in 1952 and completed in 1953. This addition has six rooms, two restrooms, and entry on the first floor, and a Fellowship Hall and kitchen on the second floor.

It was in the year of 1968 that the Methodist Church and the Evangelical United Brethren Church merged, becoming the United Methodist Church.

In 1970 a sizable amount of money was left to the church by Miss Ada Smith. Part of this money was used to purchase a new organ, and the balance was used as partial payment on remodeling the brick part of the building. This remodeling consisted of adding the vestibule, paneling the inside walls, lowering the ceiling, and installing new pews, floor covering, lights, sound system, and sidewalks. Also, it was at this time the outside brick walls were covered with Bedford stone.

On November 14, 1971, the remodeled part of the building was consecrated and the new organ dedicated.

The bell tower, built and dedicated in 1996, houses the bell that once hung in the steeple and called worshipers to Sunday morning services.




That is the beauty of stewardship.

#### A Prayer for Autumn's Arrival


Lord of all seasons,

She felt a stranger, that little bride, when with her husband to worship she came; she wished that someone, just anyone, would stop and call her by name. Did you?


Her loved one had died a few weeks ago, so sad and heart-broken she sat; she wished that someone, just anyone, would come to her house to chat. Did you?

# No Bake Pumpkin Pie

Ingredients +4 ounces cream cheese softened + ¼ cup white granulated sugar +8 ounces Cool Whip divided in half +1 10 inch pre-made graham cracker crusts +1/4 cup instant vanilla pudding mix ½ of a ¾ ox box + ½ cup milk +1 cup pumpkin puree + 1 teaspoon pumpkin pie spice + ½ teaspoon nutmeg + ½ tablespoon cinnamon

**Instructions:** <u>Bottom Layer</u> add cream cheese, sugar, and half of the Cool Whip in a bowl and blend well with a Hand mixer. Fill your pre-made crests evenly with this mix. <u>Middle Layer</u>, Mix pudding and milk and stir until thick. Add 1 cup canned pumpkin puree. Add pumpkin pie spice, nutmeg, and cinnamon. Stir until blended. Pour On top of the cheesecake layer. <u>Top Layer</u>: Top evenly with the remaining half of the Cool Whip and sprinkle with Spices. Refrigerate for at least an hour before eating so pie has time to set completely.



Watch out when you are at the grocery store that you buy pure canned pumpkin pie Filling. Make sure your cream cheese is at room temperature so that it blends well And doesn't leave lumps in your mixture. Sprinkle a little pumpkin spice on top of The Cool Whip to add a little extra flavor


