Through Goonhilly, ships have direct dial access to practically every telephone and telex installation in the world, with a high level of quality and reliability.

Ships fitted with the compact Inmarsat-C equipment can take advantage of BT C-Sat, the new text-only messaging service. C-Sat not only fulfils the requirements of the GMDSS and provides useful communications back-up for larger commercial vessels, it also makes satellite communications available to a wider range of vessels such as yachts, fishing boats and small coastal craft.
