

Longer holidays

The holidays are longer than for most jobs and there's a good choice as to when and how you take them. To start with you get three weeks in the summer and an extra week in winter to total four weeks' paid holiday.

Pay and allowances

The enclosed sheet gives current details. You will be on full pay throughout initial training and a lodging allowance is given to married men during this initial training. Shift allowances are paid and overtime rates for extra duty.

Superannuation

All new staff between the ages of 19 and 50 must become members of the contributory pension scheme.

Sick pay

Sick leave is with pay subject to certain conditions. While this will ease financial worries, our trained Welfare staff can be of assistance to you in other ways if required.

Promotion prospects

Today's Radio Operators can be tomorrow's managers. The first step on the promotion ladder is normally to the post of Radio Overseer, maybe as Officer in Charge at a coast station and then perhaps, as a Radio Surveyor at one of the main ports in the UK. The next step is normally to the post of Radio Assistant Superintendent, either as Officer in Charge of a Radio Survey depot or as a Headquarters manager concerned with the Division's responsibilities for coast station and radio surveying operations, the planning and development of services, personnel, and the national and international aspects of the maritime mobile service.

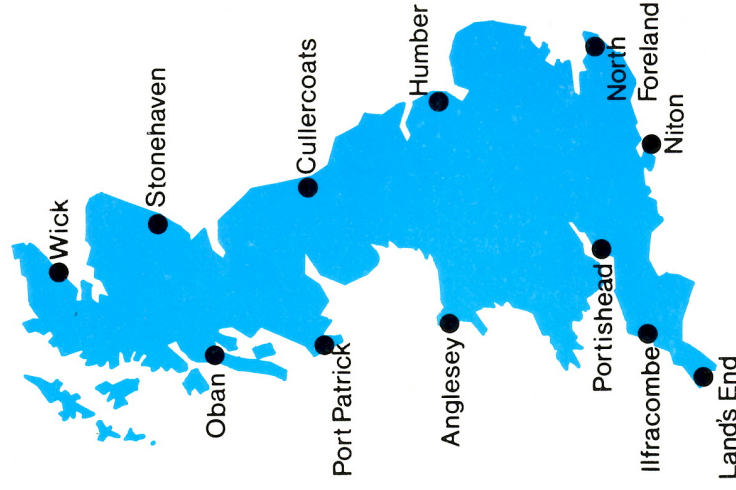
There are opportunities for further advancement into the Post Office Senior Management structure and avenues for
