General Club Rules

- 1. Dogs are not allowed in Clubrooms.
- 2. Bitches in season are not allowed on Club grounds.
- 3. Dogs may not be off lead unless permitted by an Instructor.
- 4. Dogs & handlers must not use equipment without permission.
- 5. All incidents of dog attacks (provoked or unprovoked) must be reported immediately to the Head Instructor who will act accordingly. The incident must be recorded in the Incident Report book in the Office. An appeal to the decision made by the Head Instructor may be made in writing to the Club Secretary and the incident discussed at the next Committee meeting.
- 6. Children under 10 must be supervised by an adult at all times on the Club grounds.
- 7. If your dog fouls on the Club grounds you must clean up the deposit immediately. Poo bags are provided on the grounds. If your dog urinates on a Club building or structure, you rinse it off with water.
- 8. Smoking is not permitted in class or in Club buildings.
- 9. No alcoholic drinks are permitted in class or in Club buildings.
- 10. If you arrive late, do not enter your class. Wait until the instructor indicates that you may join.
- 11. Members must wear sensible shoes no thongs or bare feet.

- 12. Any member not in class may not exercise their dog in the vicinity of classes in progress.
- 13. Please keep dogs well apart to avoid confrontations.
- 14. All handlers and dogs participate at their own risk.
- 15. A current vaccination certificate must be presented upon joining or attending a complimentary class. It must also be presented when renewing an existing membership.
- 16. Dogs carrying a contagious disease may not attend until they are cleared in writing by a qualified vet.
- 17. Abusive or foul language is not tolerated on Club grounds.
- 18. Your membership badge must be worn in class. "I forgot" badges are available from the office.
- 19. There will be no training for Obedience if the Saturday night forecast for Sunday is 32°C or over for the Elizabeth area.
- 20. There will be no training for non-trialers in Agility if the Thursday night forecast for Friday is 32°C + for the Elizabeth area. There will be no training for non-trialers in Agility if the Thursday night forecast for Friday is 32°C + for the Elizabeth area.
- 21. There will be no training for beginners in Flyball if the Sunday night forecast for Monday is 32°C + for the Elizabeth area.
- 22. Any class may be cancelled due to stormy or inclement weather at the discretion of the Head Instructor (s).
- 23. Sun protection is encouraged for you and your dog.
- 24. All injuries must be reported and recorded.
- 25. Class instructors in consultation with the discipline Head



Dogs are sent to us for different reasons, and I believe Sydnee was sent to teach me. Sydnee has been a Slipcollar Covergirl before, in 2016, when she amused people with her strange but comical quirks. She was on the brink of trialing in flyball, agility and obedience, and all of the hard parts of her training were behind her. Fast forward 2 years, and she has retired from flyball after a grand total of 3 competitions, and she did not start her agility or Obedience careers.

Seemingly overnight, my laid back, friendly, confident, well socialised cocker spaniel had turned into a snarling, barking, lunging monster at the mere sight of another dog. I can pinpoint the moment it happened. A dog who had reacted to Sydnee many times in the past lunged at her, and Sydnee, having never retaliated before, gave back as good as she got. I was shocked at her reaction but passed it off as a one-off. Over the next twelve months, there were many more of these 'one-offs', and she had definitely made some 'enemies' of particular dogs. The incidents weren't frequent enough for me to get too worried though, so I just kept her out of the path of the dogs she didn't like.

In early 2018, my older dog, Alison, was diagnosed with a serious illness, and she became the focus of my attention for the next 8 months. During this time Sydnee's ever growing list of 'enemies' had extended to pretty

much every new dog that she met, along with quite a number of former 'friends'. I had now started calling Sydnee a reactive dog, and was very embarrassed by her behaviour. Every time she put on a scene. I would tell her off and remove her from the situation. However, on a whole, although walking from the car to class was a nightmare, once she started class, she was focussed and worked well, so I felt like I was doing a reasonable job of managing Sydnee's behaviour. This was until Sydnee had a fight in class. I did not know if she started it. but it frightened me to know that I now could not trust Sydnee off leash.



At home, Sydnee, who had always been slightly obsessive with toys, had begun guarding her possessions and even her space (my bed, my bedroom, the lounge room and the car), snarling, jumping on and attacking my 12 year old, very unwell dog. This happened a couple of times per week, but never resulted in injury to either dog. She had also started barking incessantly, seemingly at nothing.

I knew Sydnee wasn't doing great, and that I probably needed to do something to help her, but by this stage, Alison was getting worse, and I knew that I did not have long left with her, so all of my energy was focused on making her life as comfortable as possible. All I could manage was to enrol Sydnee in a course for reactive dogs, but this didn't really change anything with her behaviour. People at the club were very helpful, but by and large, because I was now extremely good at managing Sydnee in public, and hid her issues well, they didn't realise her problems were as severe as they were.

Alison passed away at the end of August last year, and I was gutted. Despite this, I felt that the best thing for Sydnee was to get a pup as soon as possible, so that she did not get an opportunity to be an only dog. Knowing Sydnee was reactive. I did my research, and did all of the right things with the introduction of Finley, the Working Cocker Spaniel, when he arrived 3 weeks later. All went well for about 30 seconds, and then Sydnee attacked the pup. She did not harm him, but this was the wake up call that I had needed



I immediately began researching as much as I could about dog behavioural problems and aggression, and it became obvious very quickly that Sydnee was suffering from severe anxiety, and helping her was going to take more than what I could learn from a book and manage on my own.

I booked her an appointment with our vet, and she was put onto medication to help with her anxiety. I also sought recommendations for a professional trainer to help me with Sydnee. We ended up having 4 sessions with a wonderful trainer over the following 3 months, and Sydnee has come a long way. It was not easy - the dogs needed to be kept completely separate for nearly 3 months before finally being able to be off leash at home together, which was nearly impossible to manage. I

t was hard work - I had to dedicate hours of time to working with Sydnee, whilst at the same time trying to socialise Finley and give him as many positive experiences as I could. It is still not perfect, and never will be - Sydnee still reacts to Finley at times. Sydnee still has trouble meeting most dogs, and we are yet to be able to return to training. That said, Sydnee loves playing with Finley, either chasing him, wrestling with him, or playing with the ball, which is somewhere I never thought I would get to.

Looking back, although Sydnee was always genetically predisposed to being an anxious dog, there were triggers that, although minor at the time, most likely contributed to the development of her anxiety related aggression. It wasn't a sudden change, like I had thought, but a gradual escalation. There were also a number of things I did or did not do, that were not helpful for Sydnee. The number one thing I did not do was get help early. Sydnee's problems would have been a simple fix if I had admitted that she had issues 12 months before I did.



It is not easy to admit that you have a dog with a problem, so reason I am telling Sydnee's story is to let people who have dogs that exhibit behaviors that worry them, that they are not alone. In actual fact, these types of behaviors are very common, and can often be easily managed. The four pieces of advice I would offer to anyone who thinks their dog may have a problem are:

- Don't be embarrassed or ashamed to tell people your dog has an issue - they are more likely to be understanding or helpful if they know.
- Get help early. If you ignore this type of behaviour, it won't go away - every time your dog has the chance to rehearse the behavior, it will escalate. Help may be in the form of asking an instructor at the club, reading books, chatting to other dog owners, or, in severe cases like Sydnee, getting veterinary advice and working with a professional trainer.
- Don't be scared of being assertive and advocating for your dog. If you don't want your dog to interact with a particular dog or person, it's absolutely fine to politely tell people that your dog is working through some issues and you would prefer if he/she did not interact at this point.
- Don't get angry at your dog. Your dog is most likely scared, and you are one of the only things in the world that bring them comfort.

And for those lucky ones out there that have a laid back, dog-friendly, people-friendly superpup, if you see a member with a wild, lunging nutcase of a dog, please remember that the owner is at the club, being responsible, and doing their best to help the dog. They are most likely upset and embarrassed by the way their dog is behaving. A friendly smile is all it takes sometimes, to realise that people do understand, and are not judging you by the way your dog is behaving.

These are fantastic in that they are an exceptional tool to allow a very deep massage without the pain that a deep tissue hand massage would give. The dogs can lay on the mat while the 3D circular vibration goes through 4 feet of bone and 2 feet of tissue to the cell level. This vibration therapy gives fantastic results with pain relief and rehabilitation after and before surgery. For athletic dogs it's a great aid to movement, length of stride and reduction of lactic acid buildup after the excitement of running and performing through the day.

I travel to you so that your dog can be in the comfort of their own surroundings; they can be relaxed and accepting of the massage treatment.

My fees are very affordable \$40 which includes the initial assessment of movement/gait and collection of medical history.


I am a qualified Remedial and Reiki Canine Massage Therapist, also qualified for human Reiki treatments.


