PARA DISTRICT OBEEDIENCE DOG CLUB INC.

General Club Rules

1. Dogs are not allowed in Clubrooms.
2. Bitches in season are not allowed on Club grounds.
3. Dogs may not be off lead unless permitted by an Instructor.
4. Dogs & handlers must not use equipment without permission.
5. All incidents of dog attacks (provoked or unprovoked) must be reported immediately to the Head Instructor who will act accordingly. The incident must be recorded in the Incident Report book in the Office. An appeal to the decision made by the Head Instructor may be made in writing to the Club Secretary and the incident discussed at the next Committee meeting.
6. Children under 10 must be supervised by an adult at all times on the Club grounds.
7. If your dog fouls on the Club grounds you must clean up the deposit immediately. Poo bags are provided on the grounds. If your dog urinates on a Club building or structure, you rinse it off with water.
8. Smoking is not permitted in class or in Club buildings.
9. No alcoholic drinks are permitted in class or in Club buildings.
10. If you arrive late, do not enter your class. Wait until the instructor indicates that you may join.
11. Members must wear sensible shoes – no thongs or bare feet.

12. Any member not in class may not exercise their dog in the vicinity of classes in progress.
13. Please keep dogs well apart to avoid confrontations.
14. All handlers and dogs participate at their own risk.
15. A current vaccination certificate must be presented upon joining or attending a complimentary class. It must also be presented when renewing an existing membership.
16. Dogs carrying a contagious disease may not attend until they are cleared in writing by a qualified vet.
17. Abusive or foul language is not tolerated on Club grounds.
18. Your membership badge must be worn in class. "I forgot" badges are available from the office.
19. There will be no training for Obedience if the Saturday night forecast for Sunday is 32°C or over for the Elizabeth area.
20. There will be no training for non-trialers in Agility if the Thursday night forecast for Friday is 32°C + for the Elizabeth area. There will be no training for non-trialers in Agility if the Thursday night forecast for Friday is 32°C + for the Elizabeth area.
21. There will be no training for beginners in Flyball if the Sunday night forecast for Monday is 32°C + for the Elizabeth area.
22. Any class may be cancelled due to stormy or inclement weather at the discretion of the Head Instructor (s).
23. Sun protection is encouraged for you and your dog.
24. All injuries must be reported and recorded.
25. Class instructors in consultation with the discipline Head

My husband Florian and our two pups, Atlas and Willow, have been attending the club now for three months. We are working hard to keep progressing through the obedience levels, and eventually we hope to have a crack at flyball and agility too. Our time at the club – and this is not an overstatement – has had a significant impact on our lives and has helped restore much peace to our home and a lot of enjoyment back into our relationship with our dogs.

I'm sorry to say the beginning of our time with PDODC was forged under deeply sad circumstances. I am sure that many people reading this will understand the deep sorrow that comes from the loss of a beloved pet. We lost our magnificent Heeler cross, Austin, to shocking and sudden liver failure at just nine years of age. He was so very loved and after our many happy years together, was a confident, loyal, trustworthy and obedient dog. Simply put, we will never not love and miss him.

Just two months before Austin's death we had adopted a ten-month-old Kelpie x Labrador from Farmdogz Rescue whom we named Willow. She was a quirky little character, born with a dramatic lightning bolt kink in her tail and a serious issue with drooling! But as they always do, Willow's little ways began to make us laugh and we soon discovered she's a great snuggler, quick to learn, eager to please, and just a very sweet little girl.

When Austin passed away, poor Willow was lost. At only ten months of age she had already lived in several foster homes as well as a stint in the Mildura Pound, so this significant change in her life shook her up. Despite being enveloped in grief, Florian and I made the decision to adopt a second dog. Were we in our right minds? Perhaps not! But after just a week as a one-dog household, the picture of a six-month old Heeler cross puppy popped up on



We put in a phone call and the next day we were driving from our home in the Barossa to the RSPCA Lonsdale shelter. Several other families were in line to meet 'Patch' as he was then known, but we were fortunate to have the first 'meet and greet'. He was bouncy, wriggly and so full of beans he could have opened a Mexican restaurant. The head trainer carefully introduced him to Willow who quickly let us know, "he's too full on! Not interested!" Despite Willow's initial dislike of this overly-exuberant puppy Florian and I said to each other, "we know he'll be handful initially, but he needs a home and we have one to give. Let's do it."

On the way home Patch wet himself in the car, twice. As a pup whom had been surrendered because he 'barks and digs' and had only been walked 'monthly'(!) he had yet to experience that life could be really nice and fun. So this first car ride was quite scary and he had the added indignity of a cone on his head after being de-sexed. On the drive home we thought about his name. We'd recently returned from our honeymoon in Greece, and I suggested the name Atlas. That's the name of the Greek Titan who carries the weight of the world on his shoulders. I was feeling every ounce of that weight after Austin's death and I thought that this new addition to our family may just help ease that load. So Patch became Atlas and it



Speaking of honeymoons... the honeymoon period with Atlas was virtually non-existent. He jumped, barked, chewed and nipped constantly and of course, was not toilet trained. We maintained our regular routine of a big run at the oval every morning, but it didn't seem to be doing much good and there was no way we felt we could let him off the lead. When we would arrive home from work at night, we would take a deep breath and brace ourselves for the ensuing chaos. Willow found him totally overwhelming and he harassed her from sun up to sun down. Although the words were never outwardly spoken, I am sure when Florian and I looked across the room at one another we were each thinking, "what have we done?" We could see small progresses, and he was clearly very smart. But we needed help.

I found PDODC online and we decided to head along that Sunday. We packed up the car with the dogs and plugged the address into the GPS. Forty-five minutes later we arrived and were both taken by surprise at the tremendous number of dogs and handlers milling about the reserve.

Parked next to us was a car with a noble looking German Shepard casually and calmly watching the proceedings. That would have been Austin, once upon a time, and it was a stark contrast to Atlas and Willow who were trying to go in seventeen directions at once. The first timers class was great, and we began to learn the basics. Dog on left, treats in hand, walk in a circle. Simple! Florian and Willow immediately fell into rhythm with each other, though Atlas was more of a handful. But we had some things to take away and practice at home together.

Well, since that time, we've attended almost every weekend and here's the big surprise – Atlas and I have progressed through the puppy classes and are now in Grade 1! Florian and Willow are close on our heels, but this little guy has taken everyone by surprise with his willingness to learn and smarts. This weekly activity together as a family has made a real change to our lives.

Now, when Atlas starts to become over-excited at home, we simply strap on our fanny-packs full of treats, and give him a workout for ten or so minutes. Not only are we all thrilled with how quickly he falls into ‘work mode’ but we can confidently go back to having friends, family, nieces and nephews over to our house without fear of anyone being jumped on or nipped. My four-year-old niece Georgia is particularly fascinated with the concept of dogs getting to go to school and always asks “what have Atlas and Willow learned this week!?” I think she’s jealous they’ve been able to start school before her!

Although it’s only been a few months, our experience at PDODC has been nothing but positive. The whole club has made us feel welcome, and never judged. I feel like Atlas’s true personality as a cute and cheeky, sweet little fellow has come to the fore, rather than just seeming out of control and destructive.

If you see us around, please come and say hello and we really look forward to the future as members of wonderful PDODC.

Thanks for letting us share our story.

President's Report

Hi everyone.

Flyball Report

Well after a pretty slow start to the year things are really starting to ramp up for Flyball. Training has been progressing well for all the beginners even with some disruptions due to the weather. All the dogs and handlers are working well as a team and enjoying each little milestone they achieve. As always we are always on the lookout for new dogs to join in the sport. It doesn't matter how big, small, fast or slow your dogs is, new dogs are welcome at any time. They need to be 12 months of age and grade 3 obedience although they can be assessed to start training even if they aren't at the right obedience level. It helps if they are interested in a ball but if they aren't but are food or toy motivated we can work with that.

Since my last report we have had two competitions. The first was in May at Dover Gardens and we had three teams entered. Para Doggy Dashers walked away with first place, with Para Barking Brigade 3rd and Para Swaggers 5th. All the dogs ran well and the day was enjoyed by all. We have also hosted our first competition at the club grounds for the year with the comp delivering a few firsts for flyball in SA. The competition was scheduled for Saturday June 29th, but in a SA first it had to be cancelled due to rain making the grounds unsafe for racing. Thankfully the competition was able to be rescheduled for the Sunday, with racing held after normal obedience training. It was a huge effort by both Para and Dover racers and all those involved to make the comp happen. Thanks for Martin and Catherine for judging, Alli and Teresa for timekeeping, and Michael and Robyn for their efforts on the BBQ. A huge thank you also to Eddie, Caitlin, Jenny and Donna for stewarding. None of the stewards are involved in the sport of Flyball (yet ☐) so their support is really appreciated although I think it is safe to say all were very impressed with their front row seats for the action. Again we had three teams entered with Para Doggy Dashers third, Para Swaggers fourth and Para Barking Brigade fifth. Congratulations to Rebecca Knapp and Rumble for obtaining their first flyball title at the competition and also congratulations to Para Swaggers and Para Doggy Dashers for being the first teams in SA to race in a dead heat. While close racing is fairly common in the sport with timing down to a thousand of a second for teams to dead heat is extremely rare.

We now turn our attention to September and the Royal Show, and begin preparations for hosting our second competition at the October Spring Fair run by the City of Prospect. The instructors are also in discussion about how we may be able to get dogs training for flyball before the age of 12 months, like a number of other sporting disciplines. It will take us a little while to work out details but keep your eye out for announcements if you have a dog that you think may be interested but is still only young. The hope is if we get them started earlier we can work on some of the more common issues that crop up once dogs are 12 months and begin training but still keep it safe for them while they are still grow-

I have been in business for 5 years and in that time I have sponsored several clubs in Agility and obedience and sponsoring the State and National Agility Championships. It was at the Victorian Agility Nationals in 2018 that I purchased the Accell Therapy Mat and Handheld machine. These are fantastic in that they are an exceptional tool to allow a very deep massage without the pain that a deep tissue hand massage would give. The dogs can lay on the mat while the 3D circular vibration goes through 4 feet of bone and 2 feet of tissue to the cell level. This vibration therapy gives fantastic results with pain relief and rehabilitation after and before surgery. For athletic dogs it's a great aid to movement, length of stride and reduction of lactic acid buildup after the excitement of running and performing through the day.

I travel to you so that your dog can be in the comfort of their own surroundings; they can be relaxed and accepting of the massage treatment.

My fees are very affordable \$40 which includes the initial assessment of movement/gait and collection of medical history.

Build upon this exercise by changing the duration and the location regularly.
