#### PARA DISTRICT OBEDIENCE DOG CLUB INC.

#### **General Club Rules**

- 1. Dogs are not allowed in Clubrooms.
- 2. Bitches in season are not allowed on Club grounds.
- 3. Dogs may not be off lead unless permitted by an Instructor.
- 4. Dogs & handlers must not use equipment without permission.
- 5. All incidents of dog attacks (provoked or unprovoked) must be reported immediately to the Head Instructor who will act accordingly. The incident must be recorded in the Incident Report book in the Office. An appeal to the decision made by the Head Instructor may be made in writing to the Club Secretary and the incident discussed at the next Committee meeting.
- 6. Children under 10 must be supervised by an adult at all times on the Club grounds.
- 7. If your dog fouls on the Club grounds you must clean up the deposit immediately. Poo bags are provided on the grounds. If your dog urinates on a Club building or structure, you rinse it off with water.
- 8. Smoking is not permitted in class or in Club buildings.
- 9. No alcoholic drinks are permitted in class or in Club buildings.
- 10. If you arrive late, do not enter your class. Wait until the instructor indicates that you may join.
- 11. Members must wear sensible shoes no thongs or bare feet.

- **12**. Any member not in class may not exercise their dog in the vicinity of classes in progress.
- 13. Please keep dogs well apart to avoid confrontations.
- 14. All handlers and dogs participate at their own risk.
- 15. A current vaccination certificate must be presented upon joining or attending a complimentary class. It must also be presented when renewing an existing membership.
- 16. Dogs carrying a contagious disease may not attend until they are cleared in writing by a qualified vet.
- 17. Abusive or foul language is not tolerated on Club grounds.
- 18. Your membership badge must be worn in class. "I forgot" badges are available from the office.
- 19. There will be no training for Obedience if the Saturday night forecast for Sunday is 32°C or over for the Elizabeth area.
- 20. There will be no training for non-trialers in Agility if the Thursday night forecast for Friday is 32°C + for the Elizabeth area. There will be no training for non-trialers in Agility if the Thursday night forecast for Friday is 32°C + for the Elizabeth area.
- 21. There will be no training for beginners in Flyball if the Sunday night forecast for Monday is 32°C + for the Elizabeth area.
- 22. Any class may be cancelled due to stormy or inclement weather at the discretion of the Head Instructor (s).
- 23. Sun protection is encouraged for you and your dog.
- 24. All injuries must be reported and recorded.
- 25. Class instructors in consultation with the discipline Head Instructor, reserve the right to send a dog back to a lower class if it is to the advantage of the dog and/or handler.

We first met Raz on the 14<sup>th</sup> February, 2002 – Valentines Day! He was born on the 24<sup>th</sup> of December, 2001. His litter name was "Captain" then, and he was one of 13 identical little puppies, 8 weeks old. We sat and watched all of them for about 2 hours, wondering which one would be the right choice for us. Eventually, Captain stood out. He was being pummelled by some of the other puppies – he put up with it, and put up with it, until he finally had put up enough, and found the courage to tell his siblings he'd had enough! Then they left him alone, and he went back to doing his thing. Captain was our pick. We brought him home that night, so many years ago. Little did we know the adventure that Captain was going to take us on for the next 14 years of our lives!



We didn't particularly like the name Captain (although in hindsight, it was a name that would have suited him well!) After weeks of trying to come up with a name, we eventually settled on RAZ. This name came from previous dogs we had owned. Wayne's dog **Rebel**, and my dog **Ziggy**. Rebel And Ziggy – **RAZ**. It suited him instantly, and so it was to be – **RAZ**.

Raz & Wayne started their journey at Gepps Cross Dog

Obedience Club, as that was so close to home. He loved training, and they trained every Sunday morning, rain, hail or shine. Every month they were awarded with "Dog of the Month", until he had attained his Basic Obedience Certificate.

Raz's other love, from day one, was the ball. Oh what he would do for that ball! Wayne and Raz had a little routine they would do where he would make Raz get back, drop, stand, sit, drop and then drop again so that his head was level with the ground. This began with voice signals, and later Wayne was able to command this routine with only one finger and the ball. Raz was invited to a children's birthday party, where he performed his routine in front of the children. They all stood around, shouting get back, get back, drop, sit, stand, and on it went, until Wayne noticed that the only person that Raz would listen to, in amongst all the excitement, was the young child with the ball in his hand. From that day on the ball became Raz's "Remote Control".



One day we saw a segment on Harry's Practice about the sport of Flyball. Of course, we had to investigate. With Raz's love of the ball, we thought it would be a wonderful sport for him. So off we went to Golden Grove Dog Club – the only club in SA to train this sport at that time. Raz didn't "get it" straight away like we thought he would. He was used to chasing a moving target, and as everyone

knows – in Flyball the dog has to retrieve the ball from a spring loaded box. After some many months to get him to understand what to do, and alot of running up and down the course, the penny finally dropped. Eventually we were asked if we would like to enter him in his first competition. This was to be the Ringwood Highland Games in Victoria – and of course we went! It was a fantastic experience, and Raz got judges pick that day – the judge said she had never seen a dog run down the whole course and back, watching the dog in the other lane, but not once faltering or missing his own jumps. It was quite a funny sight! So began Raz's Flyball career, and we just couldn't get enough of it. Raz got better and better, and faster and faster – at one point holding a record for the fastest dog in SA.

When Raz was about 2 years old, a friend suggested we take him to have a look at dog sledding. It sounded great – so one cold winter's weekend we headed off to Kuitpo Forest to check this sledding out. We were offered to give him a run, and within no time Wayne & Raz were kitted up, and off into the forest they went. Raz took to this like a duck to water, and absolutely loved it. We started entering races that winter, and in his second race he won first place. That same season we also entered our first National Competition, The Wild Dog Derby, held at Mt Crawford Forest. Raz was amazing, and brought home 1<sup>st</sup> place in his class! We were thrilled to bits, to the point where Wayne would come over the finish line in tears of joy, through Raz's amazing efforts!

Suddenly our weekends were full of Flyball competitions and Sledding races, and still training Obedience on Sundays when time would allow. It was about this time we rescued Ce-Ce – a Labrador x Boxer, who became Raz's new best friend.

He'd never cared much for other dogs, but Ce-Ce brought out the best in him, and they were soon inseparable. Ce-Ce also played Flyball with Raz, and even joined him sledding once or twice.



In 2004 our Flyball Club moved to Para District Obedience Dog Club, where the sport continued to grow. Once becoming members at PDODC, Raz continued his obedience training here, and also began training in Agility & Jumping. Before too long Raz was trialling in both Obedience and Agility, gaining his CD Title in 2005 and by 2006 had also gained his

ADX & JDX.

Raz continued to take us on his amazing journey. Anything that we pointed Raz at, he took on with spirit! He featured in a corporate commercial for air purifiers; he auditioned for the movie "Red Dog", but unfortunately never made the final cut; he was a blood donor for a friend's dying dog; he amazed us with his teaching skills with other dogs; through his loyalty, he followed Wayne up a ladder onto the roof, only to discover he could not find his own way down! He learnt to close the back door, but with major attitude- he would slam that door shut when told to! He was once a ute dog; he rode in wheel barrows; he wanted to befriend every human he met and had a unique bark for every individual he knew; he liked to talk, alot, and he told it how it was! He never, ever, gave up!

Early in 2007 Mika, our White German Shepherd, joined our family and our lives began to get very busy indeed, with all 3 dogs training Obedience & Flyball at PDODC.

In 2009 Raz fathered a litter of 11 beautiful puppies to Mika. Of all 11 puppies, there was one that looked like Raz. Wayne always liked the look of the first puppy born, a large white male, but the decision had already been made by Raz's look alike – she decided that she was part of our pack, and was not going anywhere.... so daughter of Raz was appropriately named Sheraz! We are fortunate enough now, to have her to remember him by.



Raz had his last send off for Flyball in 2012, at the Royal Adelaide Show. He had started to slow down, and was no longer competing in Agility or Jumping either. It was time for Raz give up the high life, but not in silence. He would continue to support as a major "cheer squad" at club events, and Flyball

competitions, barking at all the young ones "you're doing it wrong"!!!

Raz made many friends along the way, and in the last 4 years of his life, he spent a lot of time around his doggy & human companions, as well as his puppies who would often visit for a play, or a vacation. Because of the journey Raz took us on, we have made many life long friends, who have a like minded passion for dogs.

We had many camping trips away with Raz, and the beach was one of his favourite places, as was the river. Raz was always surrounded by all of his friends at these special places, it was not an uncommon sight to see us all with 15-20 dogs playing fetch on the foreshores of Semaphore Beach.

Over the last 2 years of Raz's life, his legs slowly began to tire, and he could no longer carry himself with pride. The nerve endings in his rear feet were deteriorating, and this degeneration would eventually travel into his legs and spine. Raz never stopped trying, and would still yell at the younger dogs "you're doing it wrong!" and still managed to get himself around, albeit difficult.

We made the decision to give Raz his wings on the 19<sup>th</sup> February, 2016, at the age of 14. It was not an easy decision, it was down right heart breaking. Raz's mind was still so alert, but his body was failing him. It was the kindest gift we could give him, after being our most loyal and best friend for so many years.

Everything we continue to do today, the dogs we continue to train, the experiences we continue to have, the friends we have made, the lessons we have learnt, the passion we hold dear to our hearts, the love we continue to feel – it all began with Captain Raz.......

Dog's feet and pads are tough, right? Most people are aware that foot pads can be injured by stepping on something sharp, but what about something hot? Dangerously hot pavement and metal surfaces are hard to avoid in the heat of summer. Walking or running on hard pavement is tough on feet, too.

Pavement, metal or tar-coated asphalt get extremely hot in the summer sun. We remember to wear sandals, walk on the grass and not sit down on these surface in the heat of the day.

Harder to remember is the effects of the summer heat and our dog's feet. Unlike the obvious wounds such as lacerations, foot infections (fungal, bacterial), or foreign bodies such as cheat grass), burned pads may not be apparent to the eye, at least initially.

#### Signs of burned pads:

Limping or refusing to walk, Licking or chewing at the feet, Pads darker in colour, Missing part of pad, Blisters or redness.

#### Burned Pad First Aid.

It is important to keep the foot area cool and clean. As soon as you notice the problem (limping along on the road), flush with cool water or a cool compress if available. Get the dog to a grassy area, or if possible, carry him. At first chance, your vet should examine your dog for signs of deeper burns, blisters and possibility of infection. Your vet will determine if antibiotics or pain medication is needed.

Washing the feet with a gentle cleanser and keeping them clean is important. Bandaging can be difficult to apply and maintain (monitor and change often), but licking *must be kept to a minimum*. Some dogs will tolerate a sock to keep the area clean, but caution is advised for dogs that may chew and ingest the sock. Lick deterrents (bitter sprays) may help reduce the damage *caused by* licking.

#### **Prevention is Best**

Best advice is to be mindful of hot surfaces — asphalt and metal (i.e. boat dock, car or truck surfaces) — and walk your dog on the cool side of the street or in the grass. Another tip is to lay down a wet towel for your dog to stand on when grassy areas are not available. It's a good way to keep cool while loading up the car.

Please note: This article has been provided for informational purposes only. If your pet is showing any signs of illness, please consult a veterinarian as quickly as possible

#### **Retrieving Comes to Para**

On Monday October 3<sup>rd</sup> while most people were inside trying to stay warm and dry, Gundogs and their owners descended on PDODC for a double Retrieving Ability Test for Gundogs Trial. Thanks to a partnership with the Retrieving and Field Trials Club of South Australia, PDODC became the first All Breeds Obedience Club in South Australia to hold a RATG with the grounds and the surrounding reserve areas well suited to this type of trial. Before the trail even started we had some great support with food donated for the BBQ by Hollywood Fresh and Springfield Butchers both at Hollywood Plaza, and also Crusty's Bakehouse in Marden. A \$25 cash prize for first place was also on offer thanks to Silabar Kennels, and Bow Wow Gourmet Dog Treats also donated prizes for 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> places.

There were a total of 36 entries across both trials (18 in each trial) with a range of different breeds and all levels of experience represented. The morning trial was judged by Lynette Schmidt with most of the dogs completing their retrieves in wet and cold conditions. Of the 9 Novice dogs that started, 4 qualified with 2 of those gaining their Novice Title. In Open, 9 dogs started with 2 dogs qualifying. Congratulations to Tori and Anya from Para who were successful in obtaining their NRA title in the morning. In the afternoon the judge was Keith Millington and while the sun did appear at times there was still some wind and rain for the dogs and handlers to contend with. Of the 5 dogs that started in Novice, 3 completed with qualifying scores. In Open there were 13 starters with 4 dogs successfully obtaining qualification scores. While not everyone had success in the trial all the dogs showed some great work and a good day was had by all.

Thanks to Jason Hillier and Mary Dalla Valle who helped with the BBQ and Canteen on the day and made sure that all those trailling were well fed and looked after.

A huge thanks also to all those that helped with the organisation of the trial and also with the running of the trial and of course the Para Committee who supported the trial. Below are the results for the trails and photos of the proud winners.


