Dog/Handler Etiquette

- Always pick up faeces after your dog has defecated and place in the bins provided.
- When approaching another dog, ask the permission of the owner if it is okay to approach.
 Do not assume that every dog wants to be approached by unknown dogs or people.
- After being given the okay to approach an unknown dog, approach calmly and do not allow your dog to rush at them. Keep the leash short enough, but not tight, to pull your dog back quickly if there is a problem.
- ♦ If your dog wants a drink, do not allow them to interrupt another dog while they are drinking. Wait until they have finished, then allow your dog to drink.
- Do not approach dogs that are tethered and unsupervised.
- Do not take your dog off lead, unless directed by an instructor.
- Supervise your children around dogs and always ask permission of the owner before allowing children to pat unknown dogs.
- ♦ Ensure your dog does not become entangled with other dogs' leads. Always allow space between you and your dog and other dogs and handlers. Be aware of your environment at all times.
- If your dog urinates on any club buildings, get some water and wash the area.
- Listen to and observe all instruction from club officials and instructors.

PARA DISTRICT OBEDIENCE DOG CLUB INCORPORATED

General Club Rules

- 1. Dogs are not allowed in Clubrooms.
- 2. Bitches in season are not allowed on Club grounds.
- 3. Dogs may not be off lead unless permitted by an Instructor.
- 4. Dogs and handlers must not use equipment without permission of Instructors.
- 5. All incidents of dog attacks (provoked or unprovoked) must be reported immediately to the Head Instructor who will act accordingly. The incident must be recorded in the Incident Report book in the Office. An appeal to the decision made by the Head Instructor may be made in writing to the Club Secretary and the incident discussed at the next Committee meeting.
- 6. Children under 10 years of age must be supervised by an appropriate adult at all times on Club grounds.
- 7. If your dog fouls the Club grounds you must clean up the deposit
- 8. immediately. Poo bags are provided on the grounds. If your dog urinates on a Club building or structure, you rinse it off with water. Containers for water can be provided upon request if none are available.
- 9. Smoking is not permitted in class or in Club buildings.
- 10. No alcoholic drinks are permitted in class or in Club buildings.
- 11. If you arrive late, do not enter your class. Wait until the instructor indicates that you may join.
- 12. Members must wear sensible shoes no thongs or bare feet.
- 13. Any member not in class may not exercise their dog in the vicinity of classes in progress.
- 14. Please keep dogs well apart to avoid confrontations.
- 15. All handlers and dogs participate at their own risk.


- 16. A current vaccination certificate must be presented upon joining or attending a complimentary lesson. It must also be presented when renewing an existing membership.
- 17. Dogs carrying a contagious disease may not attend training until they are officially cleared in writing by a qualified vet.
- 18. Your membership badge must be worn in class. Replacement or "I forgot" badges are available from the office.
- 19. There will be no training for Obedience if the Saturday night forecast for Sunday is 32°C or over for the **Elizabeth area**.
- 20. There will be no training for non-triallers in Agility if the Thursday night forecast for Friday is 32°C or over for the **Elizabeth area**.
- 21. There will be no training for beginners in Flyball if the Sunday night forecast for Monday is 32°C or over for the **Elizabeth area**.
- 22. Any class may be cancelled due to stormy or inclement weather at the discretion of the Head Instructor(s).
- 23. Sun protection is encouraged for you and your dog.
- 24. All injuries must be reported and recorded.
- **25.** Class instructors, in consultation with the discipline Head Instructor, reserve the right to send a dog back to a lower class if it is to the advantage of the dog and/or handler.

If the estimated Sunday maximum temperature for Elizabeth (Channel 9 News, Saturday night) is 32 degrees or higher, training will be cancelled.



We had 12Victorian teams, coming from Ballarat, Eastside, Croydon, Keilor, Western Wieners and Bellarine, plus 4 teams from Para.

September came and it was Royal Show time. This year we were a bit concerned that we may not have had a competition due to a break-out in the Dairy Cattle Lawn Area, but thanks to Catherine and the Royal Show we were moved to the Beef Cattle Judging Lawn and had great exposure. Again we had 5 Para Teams, 1 Team from Dover and 4 Teams from Victoria coming from Ballarat and Keilor.

Head Flyball Instructor's Report—New Year 2011

Flyball

Welcome to 2011, hope you all had a great Christmas and New Year.

2011 is another packed year for PDODC Flyball, we have 2 home ground competitions this year, with the first being on Saturday 14th May and the second being on Saturday 4th December. We also will be at this year's Royal Adelaide Show on Saturday 10th September and will be hosting a competition at Portland, Victoria on Sunday 12th June.

Flyball is a relay race for dogs, in which there are 4 dogs in each team, where they jump over 4 hurdles, push down on the flyball box to release a tennis ball, come back over the 4 hurdles and when they cross the start finish line, the next dog goes. To have a clean heat, each dog must jump each hurdle, trigger the box to release the ball, carry the ball in their mouth, whilst jumping the hurdles. The handler of the next dog to go must ensure they do not release their dog too early as if they do it will not be a clean heat.

Any dog can do Flyball as long as your dog is at level 3 Obedience, over 12 months of age, is ball obsessed and is very social with other dogs and people. If your dog meets these criteria's why not give Flyball a go. We have an assessment on Monday nights at 6:30 (weather permitting as per rules).



HOT WEATHER POLICY

There will be *no training* for non-trialling dogs/handlers (Puppies/Beginners, Learners, Advanced Learners and Pre Novice) in agility if the Thursday night weather forecast on Channel 9 News for Elizabeth on the Friday is 32 degrees Celsius and over.

Volunteers needed—support your club!

Our club is run solely by volunteers. That is **everyone**, the President, Committee members, Instructors, canteen workers, and Ray, who has on a number of occasions been called out to the club during the night to attend to intruders. We all want to train our dogs but someone needs to organise things for our club to operate and cater for our ever increasing members.

Many hands make light work! If you could spare a couple of hours to help the club, it would be greatly appreciated. Specific roles that need to be filled are the treasurer and secretary. The descriptions for these are below.

Treasurer

- receive and provide a receipt for all monies paid to the Club and pay the same into a bank account of the Club
- set up the floats each week for the shop, canteen and office and collect the money at the end of training, balance the money taken, fill in the deposit book and deposit the money in the bank within 24 hours.
- paying all bills promptly, when given bills or some acceptable proof of payment eg shop dockets with the name of the shop. Using discretion whether to pay cash or cheque.
- iv present a report on the finances of the club to each Committee meeting. This means producing a bank reconciliation statement.
- v keep proper books of account of all monies received and disbursed on behalf of the Club. This includes keeping all bills and receipts in an orderly fashion for auditing at the end of the financial year.
- vi provide a yearly Balance of Account for the various club accounts and to provide a fully audited Treasurer's Report at the AGM. (There is an accountant who does this)
- vii Shall assist the Property Officer in valuing all Club property and determine the assets and liabilities of the Club as required. A copy of Club Property to be filed. (Not done at present, but there should be a record of all equipment for insurance purposes. A photograph of equipment used on trial days should be allowed as evidence of ownership of equipment)
- viii generally perform all such duties as are usually performed by a Treasurer and such additional duties as the Committee may direct from time to time.
- NB The Treasurer will not have to spend all Sunday morning in the office collecting money. This job could be shared by all Committee members or the Assistant Treasurer. The outgoing Treasurer has indicated that she will be willing to assist any new Treasurer with the job for the first couple of months and will teach any skills necessary.

Secretary

The secretary shall carry out the duties of that office under the direction of the Committee and

- i keep minutes of all meetings of the Club and its Committee
- ii attend to all correspondence and issue notices for meetings (Notice of Meetings are not issued at present)
- iii keep a record of Exhibitions and the results thereof (This is done by the Trial Secretary, Lynn Fielden, at present)
- iv ensure that a current copy of the Constitution of the Association and the Constitution and Rules of the Club are available for any member to see at any Exhibition, meeting or other official function of the Club
- ensure that such Schedules, entry forms and other documents required for the proper conduct of an Exhibition by the Association and ANKC are present at each Exhibition (at present done by the Trial Manager)
- vi maintain an accurate record of club membership, including buying and ruling cards for the files, transferring life members and honorary members to current year files.
- vii provide a first contact service in a friendly, courteous manner that reflects favourably on PDODC and its committee.
- viii other duties as directed by the President/committee that would constitute normal secretarial duties.
- NB Every assistance will be given to the new Secretary to settle in to the job. The Secretary does not have to spend all day Sunday in the office collecting money as this task is the responsibility of the Treasurer, though possibly she/he will have to be prepared to spend part of each Sunday in the office.

Here are some common canine quandaries!

1. I've got a new puppy - what dog supplies do I need to have before I bring him home?

- A travel crate to actually transport him home. This will come in handy for future trips, including trips to the vet.
- Good food and water bowls. Stainless steel is a good idea, as they can't be chewed. And plastic bowls may over time leach chemicals into the water.
- Good quality food. If you're getting your dog from a breeder, try and find out in advance what food they raised the puppies on. It's best to start with this brand as your new pet will be used to it. You can always switch to another brand later on.
- an adjustable collar
- a leash
- puppy toys
- Bedding

2. Crate training sounds really weird - what is it?

Crate training is good for dogs that might create havoc in the house if left alone for longer periods of time. It's a good idea to get your dog used to being in the crate when he's a puppy. But it's important that it is seen as a place of refuge, and not a punishment. So, never use it when he is in trouble.

Start by putting him in there for short amounts of time, and leave the door open at first. They you can start closing the door, but only for brief intervals initially. Gradually, leave the door closed for longer, and give him treats whenever he enters the crate. You can even give him his meals in there once he gets more comfortable with the experience.

When you get home though, it's important to take your dog out of the crate, so he can socialize with his family of humans.

3. Can you tell me about microchips?

Microchips are small devices that are injected under a dog's skin. Many dogs will already come microchipped. They're a great way for a dog's owner to be found should their pet escape from the yard. The details of ownership are stored in a database, and accessed through scanning the chip. It's a very safe procedure.



No need to give me your number, Il just scan your microchip!

4. What if my dog has worms? How can I tell?

Pets pick up worms very easily, especially puppies. Your dog should be wormed regularly. Most worms can cause gastrointestinal irritation, and potentially lead to nutrient deficiencies, and heartworm can even be fatal.

Types of worms that canines can get include tapeworms, hookworms, whipworms, and heartworms.



You may notice worms in their stool. Or they may simply not be gaining weight though they eat well. Vets can take a stool sample and check it under a microscope.

Worms are often treated as a preventative, and if your dog gets regular check-ups and more serious problems should be easily identified. The worm medicine available from vets is stronger and more effective than the worm treatments you get in the supermarket or pet shop.

5. Why should I get my dog fixed?

There's a real tendency for people to project their own feelings onto their pets with regards neutering.

Over 4 million dogs and cats are euthanized every year because they cannot be found homes. There is a massive overpopulation, and unless you are going to breed your dog professionally, get him fixed from the start. His temperament will be better, he will be less likely to spray to mark his territory, and he won't try and escape with such intent if there is a female in the neighborhood on heat. Spraying and neutering your puppy before he reaches 6 months can also lower the risk of him getting some cancers and infections by half! That's a big difference.

6. Does my dog need obedience school?

The short answer is - yes. For larger dogs, and some breeds, obedience training is more necessary than with others, however, all dogs (and owners) can benefit. Dogs are taught to do what they are commanded to, and people also learn how to communicate with their dogs in a way their canine friends understand. This can prevent a lot of frustration later on.

Another benefit to dogs is in socialization, as they are taught how to be calm when there are a lot of strangers (dogs and people), around. It's a much easier environment to do this in than the local park at peak dog-

traffic time!



10 Reasons Why It's Great to be a Dog


- 1. If it itches, you can reach it. And no matter where it itches, no one will be offended if you scratch it in public.

If dogs could teach us we would learn things such as:




- 2. never pass up the opportunity to go for a joyride
