

Vice Presidents Report; Ray Gunter

By now I would expect that most members will have seen and most probably used our nice new verandah, but not too many would be aware of how it all eventuated at no cost to the club

Just over two years ago I applied for a Salisbury Council Grant of \$20,000 to build a new verandah (not as grand as the one we have now) unfortunately we were unsuccessful with our application. Council suggested that they may be prepared to consider a new verandah as a works project.

Last year the grants increased from \$20,000 to \$30,000 and yours truly figured that with that sort of increase I could build a much better verandah. But it was no go Council would not allow me to apply for a second grant for a verandah as they said it had been scheduled as a Works Project for 2012/2013 financial year.

Council then asked me what sort of verandah did I have in mind, so I explained to them that with \$30K I could make it wider and higher and possibly have enough to do some concreting, Council response was that they could do all that and put in a couple of lights as well.

So here we are two years later and the job is done earlier than the 2012/2013 forecast, true it was a little drawn out in construction but some of that was due to weather problems and unexpected storm water drainage issues. I really have to thank Salisbury Council and in particular Michael Nigem who has been most helpful and of course I must thankZac Kopasic from Multiquote who was responsible for the construction.

One other item I should mention whilst thanking Council is the new gate to our training area situated just north of the green storage shed it will make it so much easier to load and unload agility equipment, the gate is the result of a comment I made to Council, who says they don't listen, thanks again.



There will be <u>no training</u> for non-trialling dogs/handlers (Relationship Building, Skills 1, Skills 2, Foundation 1, Foundation 2 and Handlers, and Sequencing and Pre-Competition) in agility if the Thursday night weather forecast on Channel 9 News for Elizabeth on the Friday is 32 degrees Celsius and over. Same as last year — only name has changed — Please NOTE - If a student has entered trials but has not graduated out of Sequencing and Pre-Competition they are considered a Non-Trialling dog by this club and therefore are NOT to train on Hot Weather Policy nights.

Pet Memorial Candles

Hello Para Districts Obedience Club,

My name is Mel Cant, I am the owner of Mel's House of Wax, a family owned SA business specializing in making and supplying a range of candle products, including personalised pet memorial candles.

About 18 months ago our beloved dog, Lester, died unexpectedly of cancer. At the time our Vet Clinic told us we could have him cremated and put into an urn, or we could purchase a wooden box with his picture on the lid (to put small items in) – at the time both options were too costly, so we came home and I made a pet memorial candle for him, showing him at the beach where we shared many good times together.

We later decided to offer others the opportunity to have their own pet memorial candle, so we advertised on our website & Facebook page and soon we started getting requests to do personalised pet memorial candles for others.

Our business is a strong supporter of 'no kill' not for profit animal organisations, and we support, as much as we can, dog rescue organisations, such as Animal Welfare League, SA Dog Rescue, SA Lost Dogs & Moorook Animal Shelter, as they help find loving homes for unwanted, abused, neglected or difficult dogs. About 12 months ago we began advertising our pet memorial candles on SA Dog's Rescue Facebook Page and we got a terrific response, and later we wrote letters to let local SA Vet Clinics letting them know of our services, and again we got a terrific response – their clients loved being able to have a personalised pet memorial candle of their beloved pet – and at \$55.00 for a medium sized candle, it was genuinely affordable.

We still fondly recall a SA Dog Rescue member who purchased a small pet memorial candle for her 8 year old daughter, who had lost her first pet, a small turtle, Hurtle. She contacted us after we did her candle to say her daughter loved the candle – it was her first death experience and the candle had helped her deal with the grief of losing her pet. Her mother said "it's the best money I've spent in ages!".

Prices for our pet memorial candles start at \$55.00 for a medium, \$70.00 for a large and \$100 for an extra-large personalised candle.

Our business makes and supplies a range of candle products and services, but our pet memorial candles are special, we know the customers who order them loved their pets and want to recognise the importance of them in their lives .. as we did with Lester.

We work with each customer to develop artwork which is meaningful to them and their pet ... our candles reflect the character of their pet! We embed artwork images into the outer layer of the candle, then dip into a candle glaze, which leaves the candle with a porcelain like finish, then we embellish with ribbons etc.

Amazing Facts About Dogs

- All dogs, be it a Dachshund or a Poodle, are direct descendants of wolves. They all can mate together as they are of the same species however different they might look.
- Dogs cannot see colour as clearly as we do. They might identify a slight colour difference but cannot see and distinguish the exact colour.
- There are a few breeds of dogs who can sense smell as high as one million times greater than us.
- A dog can hear sounds 250 yards away which is 100 times greater than humans. On an average, human beings can hear up to 25 yards.
- The gestation period in dogs is about 60 days.
- Dogs have been used inhumanly in various wars. In World War II the USSR used to send dogs around the area of German tanks with land mines tied upon them.
- On an average, the life span of a dog is around 15-16 years.
- The normal body temperature for a dog is 101.2 degrees Fahrenheit.
- It is natural for young puppy to chew on to whatever comes in their way. So, they should never be reprimanded. Just make sure that you give them the right object to chew on to.
- Dogs are able to see much better in dim light than humans are.
- Almost all dogs are capable of attacking livestock. This is because they primarily belonged to the species of wolf.
- A puppy's eyes do not open until it is 10 to 15 days old. And until it
 has grown about four weeks, it cannot see properly.
- When puppies are born, their senses are not properly developed.
 They cannot even hear, see or smell properly till they are a few days old.

P.D.O.D.C - GENERAL CLUB RULES

- 1. Dogs are not allowed in Clubrooms.
- 2. Bitches in season are not allowed Club grounds.
- 3. Dogs may not be off lead unless permitted by an Instructor.
- 4. Dogs & handlers must not use equipment without permission.
- 5. All incidents of dog attacks (provoked or unprovoked) must be reported immediately to the Head Instructor who will act accordingly. The incident must be recorded in the Incident Report book in the Office. An appeal to the decision made by the Head Instructor may be made in writing to the Secretary and the incident discussed at the next Committee meeting.
- 6. Children under 10 must be supervised by an adult at all times.
- 7. If your dog fouls on the Club grounds you must clean up the deposit immediately. Poo bags are provided on the grounds.
- 8. If your dog urinates on a Club building or structure, you rinse it off with water. Containers for water can be provided upon request if none are available.
- 9. Smoking is not permitted in class or in Club buildings.
- 10. No alcoholic drinks are permitted in class or in Club buildings.
- I I.If you arrive late, do not enter your class. Wait until the instructor indicates that you may join.
- 12. Members must wear sensible shoes no thongs or bare feet.
- 13. Any member not in class may not exercise their dog in the vicinity of classes in progress.
- 14. Please keep dogs well apart to avoid confrontations.
- 15.All handlers and dogs participate at their own risk.
- 16. A current vaccination certificate must be presented upon joining or attending a complimentary lesson. It must also be presented when renewing an existing membership.

- 17. Dogs carrying a contagious disease may not attend training until they are officially cleared in writing by a qualified vet.
- 18. Your membership badge must be worn in class. "I forgot" badges are available from the office.
- 19. There will be no training for Obedience if the Saturday night forecast for Sunday is 32°C or over for the Elizabeth area.
- 20. There will be no training for non-triallers in Agility if the Thursday night forecast for Friday is 32°C + for Elizabeth.
- 21. There will be no training for beginners in Flyball if the Sunday night forecast for Monday is 32°C + for Elizabeth
- 22. Any class may be cancelled due to stormy or inclement weather at the discretion of the Head Instructor(s).
- 23. Sun protection is encouraged for you and your dog.
- 24. All injuries must be reported and recorded.
- 25. Class instructors n consultation with the discipline Head Instructor, reserve the right to send a dog back to a lower class if it is to the advantage of the dog and/or handler.

HOT WEATHER POLICY

CLASSES ARE HELD EVERY SUNDAY, MONDAY AND FRIDAY FROM FEBRUARY TO NOVEMBER, <u>EXCEPT</u> IN THE FOLLOWING SITUATIONS:

- There will be no training in any discipline on a long weekend (where the Friday or Monday is a public holiday).
- Sunday morning classes: If the estimated Sunday maximum temperature for Elizabeth (Channel 9 News, Saturday night) is 32 degrees or higher, training will be cancelled.



- Friday night classes: If the estimated Friday maximum temperature for Elizabeth (Channel 9 News, Thursday night) is 32 degrees or higher, all NON-TRIALLING CLASSES will be cancelled.
- Monday night classes: If the estimated Monday maximum temperature for Elizabeth (Channel 9 News, Sunday night) is 32 degrees or higher, training will be cancelled.

If the weather is stormy or inclement, training may also be called off.

The SA Canine Association Inc (SACA), Trading as Dogs SA, is the

State Office in respect to the affairs of registered breeders, the registration of pedigree dogs and the administration of canine exhibitions in South Australia. The Association is affiliated with the National Body, the Australian National Kennel Council (ANKC).



The SA Canine Association Inc commenced in 1952, taking over the affairs of the SA Kennel Association which had existed since 1914. Before 1914 there were several dog clubs, the oldest being the SA Poultry & Kennel Club founded in the late 1800's and still active today.

In 1951 the Royal A & H Society agreed to assume control of the SA Kennel Club and the name was changed to the SA Canine Association Inc. The Director of the RAHS became the SACA Secretary and the Royal provide use of an office at the Wayville Showgrounds.

In 1983 the SACA purchased an office in Thebarton to manage its affairs and from there purchased 17 acres of land at Kilburn which is known as 'SACA Park'.

The Association commenced trading as Dogs SA in 2008.

There are 95 affiliated Kennel, Group, Breed and Trials Clubs affiliated with Dogs SA which conduct shows and trials most weekends.

Dogs SA's responsibilities are:

- 1. To maintain a register of pedigree dogs
- 2. To promote purebred dogs and their breeding
- 3. To promote all dogs participating in trial events
- 4. To approve all exhibitions and promote fair competition and sportsmanship
- 5. To conduct Judges training and licensing
- 6. To present the members views to local and State Government authorities
- 7. To provide recreational facilities to members
