

DOG/HANDLER ETIQUETTE

- Always pick up faeces after your dog has defecated and place in the bins provided.
- When approaching another dog, ask the permission of the owner if it is okay to approach. Do not assume that every dog wants to be approached by unknown dogs or people.
- ♦ After being given the okay to approach an unknown dog, approach calmly and do not allow your dog to rush at them. Keep the leash short enough, but not tight, to pull your dog back quickly if there is a problem.
- If your dog wants a drink, do not allow them to interrupt another dog while they are drinking.
 Wait until they have finished, then allow your dog to drink.
- Do not approach dogs that are tethered and unsupervised.
- Do not take your dog off lead, unless directed by an instructor.
- Supervise your children around dogs and always ask permission of the owner before allowing children to pat unknown dogs.
- Ensure your dog does not become entangled with other dogs' leads. Always allow space between you and your dog and other dogs and handlers. Be aware of your environment at all times.
- If your dog urinates on any club buildings, get some water and wash the area.
- Listen to and observe all instruction from club officials and instructors.

President's Report

Well, we are back into another year of training. How do we fit everything into our lives?

We were all shocked and saddened by the recent devastation caused by the bushfires in Victoria. I am proud to say your Club donated \$150 to the fund. This represented \$50 each from Agility, Flyball and Obedience. Whilst it doesn't sound like a huge amount of money, we are a not-for-profit, volunteer organisation and \$150 is a lot of recycled cans or sizzled sausages. As I was already travelling to Victoria for an Agility trial the week after the fires, I put out the word for donations. Many people from our Club donated money, food and items. Donations were

dropped off at my house and people at my work also contributed. It took a little while to fit all the goodies into the car. There was not a lot of room left for the furkids, and Buffy, Demon and Summa only had half of the back seat to share (both in width and height), while Gypsie was in a crate in the front, the base of her crate being level with the dash. The cargo carrier on top was full of towels, quilts, blankets. In the car there was 4 x 20 kg of biscuits, 6 x 2 kg of biscuits, over 100 cans of food, a dog bed (the full size of the back seat), 2 foldable crates, an air travel crate full of goodies, and masses of bowls, leads, collars, toys, balls, treats, etc. There was even a box of cat goodies, plus there was heaps of assorted people stuff. When we were unpacking the car, I collapsed in giggles. Stuff just kept coming out. It was hilarious. I'm sure I heard the car sigh with relief when it was emptied. Fortunately I did not travel through any of the affected areas; however, whilst in Melbourne there was a heavy layer of smoke in the air and the sun was an amazing red/orange colour. I noticed when driving back to Adelaide that The Grampians were veiled in a thick mist of smoke and were merely presented as an outline instead of displaying their usual grandeur.

Preparations for the April Obedience trial and the May Agility trial are well under way. If you would like to offer assistance for a couple of hours to help set-up the rings, or work in the canteen or sizzle some sausages, or maybe steward in a ring, please see Jan Mitchell for Obedience or Rachael Fagan for Agility. If you don't know these ladies, any instructor or committee member can point you in the right direction. Stewarding is particularly useful for someone who is about ready to trial. It gives you a feel for ring etiquette and provides an insight into trialling, plus the experience will really help to reduce those nerves for your first trial. Stewarding or helping out at a trial is a great way to feel more like part of the club and to get to know more people. It is also a way to give back a little to those who give up their time week after week to help you achieve your training goals.

I would like to ask all handlers to be more aware of their dogs. What do I mean? Well, every time I wander around the grounds during training, I see people not being aware of their dog's behaviour. Please do not let your dog just go up to another dog. Not all dogs want to be social. Be aware of the signs your dog displays. Very few dogs run off or are aggressive with no warnings. Those warnings might be very slight but it is up to you to learn how to understand your dog and prevent the preventable.

Enjoy your training, enjoy your dogs and (even if you have to really look hard) take away a positive from every training session.

Communication and your dog

Dogs communicate in three ways; using auditory (vocal), visual (postural) and olfactory (scent) methods. For us to learn more about canine communication, we should try to understand how these types of signals help our pet to communicate with other dogs and with us. In this issue we will look in detail at the first of these methods.

There are five types of auditory styles that your dog will use: 'infantile' sounds, including crying, whimpering and whining; 'warning' sounds, including barking and growling; 'eliciting' sounds, such as howling; 'withdrawal' sounds, like yelping; and 'pleasure' sounds, which also include moans.

Barking

Domestic dogs bark in order to announce a presence, territorial dominance or identify an individual, but more commonly barks can be associated with greeting, interactive play, alarm, hunting, tracking, herding, vocal alerting, defence, threat, care seeking, distress, contact seeking and group vocalisation.

Puppies begin barking at about 2-4 weeks of age and use it initially as a form of play. Aggressive barking in puppies does not appear much before 8-12 weeks of age, and by 4 months aggressive barking is normally used in the defence of food, towards strange dogs or as an indication of a presence, rather than as a warning.

A higher tone of barking is used for greeting and play, whilst lower tones are used as a threat. As canine guardians, we can better understand the vocal communications of our dogs by putting them into context with the postural (visual) communications that go along with the vocalisation.

It is generally believed that varying tonal qualities exist within the vocal range of dogs, allowing more than one message to be communicated at a time. Also, it is possible that, because the bark does not seem to carry any one specific signal, it may be used as a means of attracting attention to visual signals that a barking dog is also using.

Growling

Although perceived to be an aggressive noise at times, the growl is in fact a more complex communicator than that. Growling can be used to sound an alarm, for defence and distress, as a group vocalisation, as a greeting and also in submission.

The growl is often misunderstood and often ends in the dog being reprimanded, causing it to stop using growls to signal, for example, an imminent attack. When his growling signs are ignored, a dog will very likely go on to bite when his attempt to warn of displeasure is ignored.

Tragically, this misunderstanding can lead to heartache for you and your dog, so it is important to understand the signals your dog is sending you.

Howling

Howling by the domestic dog has been compared with what is known as the 'behaviour display' in wolves and may help us to understand why it occurs in some dogs, in particular in certain breeds.

Wolves are believed to howl to aid in the assembly of the pack, particularly before a hunt, while an individual wolf will howl in order to seek contact with other pack members, or to attract other wolves during the breeding season.

However, with domestic dogs, we think that they howl when alone, maybe to seek social contact with their human pack or other dogs. Also, a dog might howl at a siren because that noise is similar to a group sound, leading the dog to imitate it. When a dog 'sings' with his guardian he probably thinks that he is joining in the vocalisation of his pack.

Screaming, groaning and yelping are three further vocalisations that express distress, pain or submission. However, yelping can also be used in the context of contact seeking and defence.

Problems that arise from excessive vocalisation are a major source of anxiety. When considered from a canine perspective, barking is perfectly normal behaviour. However, guardians (or their neighbours) are not always prepared to tolerate such conduct.

Humans often unintentionally reinforce barking by praising a dog for being a good watchdog, hoping to increase what is an instinctive, protective course of action.

Although annoying to some, barking is a normal communicative behaviour and just one of the ways in which dogs try to communicate with others about their neighbourhood.


All dog vocalisations should be read in context, such as whether or not there is also postural information being shown, what is happening around the dog at the time, the conditions in which the vocalising happens, etc., as well as in conjunction with your knowledge of the dog in question.

Adopting such an attitude will help you to understand better what it is that your dog is trying to 'say' to you.

PARA DISTRICT OBEDIENCE DOG CLUB INCORPORATED General Club Rules

- 1. Dogs are not allowed in Clubrooms.
- 2. Bitches in season are not allowed on Club grounds.
- 3. Dogs may not be off lead unless permitted by an Instructor.
- 4. Dogs and handlers must not use equipment without permission of Instructors.
- 5. All incidents of dog attacks (provoked or unprovoked) must be reported immediately to the Head Instructor who will act accordingly. The incident must be recorded in the Incident Report book in the Office. An appeal to the decision made by the Head Instructor may be made in writing to the Club Secretary and the incident discussed at the next Committee meeting.
- 6. Children under 10 years of age must be supervised by an appropriate adult at all times on Club grounds.
- 7. If your dog fouls the Club grounds you must clean up the deposit immediately. Poo bags are provided on the grounds. If your dog urinates on a Club building or structure, you rinse it off with water. Containers for water can be provided upon request if none are available.
- 8. Smoking is not permitted in class or in Club buildings.
- 9. No alcoholic drinks are permitted in class or in Club buildings.
- If you arrive late, do not enter your class. Wait until the instructor indicates that you
 may join.
- 11. Members must wear sensible shoes no thongs or bare feet.
- 12. Any member not in class may not exercise their dog in the vicinity of classes in progress.
- 13. Please keep dogs well apart to avoid confrontations.
- 14. All handlers and dogs participate at their own risk.
- 15. A current vaccination certificate must be presented upon joining or attending a complimentary lesson. It must also be presented when renewing an existing membership.
- 16. Dogs carrying a contagious disease may not attend training until they are officially cleared in writing by a qualified vet.
- 17. Abusive or foul language is not tolerated on Club grounds.

- 18. Your membership badge must be worn in class. Replacement or "I forgot" badges are available from the office.
- 19. There will be no training for Obedience if the Saturday night forecast for Sunday is 32°C or over for the **Elizabeth area**.
- 20. There will be no training for non-triallers in Agility if the Thursday night forecast for Friday is 32°C or over for the **Elizabeth area**.
- 21. There will be no training for beginners in Flyball if the Sunday night forecast for Monday is 32°C or over for the **Elizabeth area**.
- 22. Any class may be cancelled due to stormy or inclement weather at the discretion of the Head Instructor(s).
- 23. Sun protection is encouraged for you and your dog.
- 24. All injuries must be reported and recorded.
- 25. Class instructors, in consultation with the discipline Head Instructor, reserve the right to send a dog back to a lower class if it is to the advantage of the dog and/or handler.


