DOG/HANDLER ETIQUETTE

- Always pick up faeces after your dog has defecated and place in the bins provided.
- When approaching another dog, ask the permission of the owner if it is okay to approach. Do not assume that every dog wants to be approached by unknown dogs or people.
- After being given the okay to approach an unknown dog, approach calmly and do not allow your dog to rush at them. Keep the leash short enough, but not tight, to pull your dog back quickly if there is a problem.
- If your dog wants a drink, do not allow them to interrupt another dog while they are drinking.
 Wait until they have finished, then allow your dog to drink.
- Do not approach dogs that are tethered and unsupervised.
- Do not take your dog off lead, unless directed by an instructor.
- Supervise your children around dogs and always ask permission of the owner before allowing children to pat unknown dogs.
- Ensure your dog does not become entangled with other dogs' leads. Always allow space between you and your dog and other dogs and handlers. Be aware of your environment at all times.
- If your dog urinates on any club buildings, get some water and wash the area.
- Listen to and observe all instruction from club officials and instructors.

Head Obedience Instructor's Report

Well, it's the middle of winter already. We have had reasonably dry Sundays so far...

We are very short of instructors again this year so if you can help out in the lower classes please tell your instructor and they will put you to work as a helper. You don't have to trial your dog but we will always encourage you to do so.

If you are in any of the lower classes it's a good idea to watch some of the higher classes and strive to achieve that standard.

Our next Obedience Trial is on Saturday, 7 August, so I hope to see some new faces there too. We will need helpers on the day so please put your hand up to HELP in any way you can. Please tell your instructor if you can HELP and by doing that it relieves the same old people that help EVERY time.

We are now selling 100% natural liver treats in the shop and encourage you to use them as a positive reinforcement with your dog/s. If food isn't working, use an alternative; a toy or something that your dog likes to play with. When you are waiting in class bring out the motivator and play with your dog until it's your turn. We see a lot of people just standing around in class. We want you and your dog to have fun while you are at training.

A dog whatever breed or age learns by repetition and the reward system. Watch any of the border patrol/sniffer dogs in action and they always get a reward for what they do well. Always end your class on a good note and you will have more success.

This is an old saying: the 3 P's are Patience/Perseverance/Practice. Until next time—Happy Training.


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Dogs & Separation Anxiety - Treating Separation Anxiety in Dogs

Separation anxiety is a disorder that causes dogs to panic at the idea of being left home alone. The panic is so overwhelming that when you leave, dogs tend to become destructive, bark like crazy, and have housebreaking accidents. When you return home, their greetings are often frantic. This condition is stressful for both dogs and owners, especially because regular obedience training does little to ease it. The good news is that something can help reduce your dog's anxiety. It is referred to as systematic desensitization, and it is a method of gradually allowing your dog to get used to being left home alone. The following will guide you through the process:

Rule Out Boredom

People often mistake boredom for separation anxiety. Both are accompanied by problem behaviours, such as destructive chewing and excessive barking. The difference is that boredom can be overcome by adding more exercise and mental stimulation to your dog's day, while those things have little or no impact on separation anxiety. Try adding an extra walk, games of fetch or tug-of-war, an obedience class and a variety of toys. If boredom is the reason for the barking and chewing, you should see a big change in your dog's behaviour. If none of these things help, then you should continue to follow the steps to treat separation anxiety.

Change Your Behaviour

Most of us have a routine we follow before we leave the house - shower, dress, put on coat, grab keys, walk out the door. Once he has recognized your routine, your dog's anxiety may start building from the first step. This means his anxiety is not just beginning when you walk out the door. Instead, it starts when your alarm clock goes off or you turn on the shower, and by the time you leave the house he is in a full blown panic.

To prevent this building anxiety, make some changes to your own behaviour. Pay attention to the things you do before you leave the house, and begin doing them randomly throughout the day. For example, you can grab your keys and sit down to watch television, or put on your coat and feed your dog. Within a few weeks, your dog should no longer see these things as signs that you are about to walk out the door, and some of his anxiety should be eased.

Keep Coming and Going Low-Key

Most of us hate leaving our dogs almost as much as they hate seeing us go. This often leads to us lavishing our dogs with affection and attention right before we leave home and immediately when we walk in the door. Unfortunately, this can add to your dog's anxiety. To prevent this, the best thing you can do is ignore your dog before you leave and for several minutes after your return. In this way, you are telling your dog that your coming and going is really no big deal. For mild to moderate cases of separation anxiety, these steps may be enough to ease your dog's anxiety. For more severe cases, however, you will need to do some more work.

Work Your Way Up to Long Periods Away

This step can be time consuming, and requires a real commitment on the part of the dog owner. Once this process is started, it is important your dog is never left alone for extended periods until his anxiety is completely gone. It can take up to several weeks to get to this point, so you may need to take some vacation time, hire a pet sitter, or find a doggie day-care until you have finished this step.

Once you have a plan in place to make sure your dog is never alone, it is time to start getting him used to your being away. Plan on spending at least 30 minutes on each training session. To start, step out the door for a short amount of time, and step right back inside. You cannot step out long enough for your dog's anxiety to begin building, so in cases of severe separation anxiety you may only be able to step outside for a second. When you step back inside, keep things quiet, and give your dog a few minutes to relax. Once he is relaxed, step back outside again, and repeat this step until your dog is showing no signs of anxiety - no panting, pacing, drooling, etc.

Next, it is time to slowly increase the amount of time you are gone. Again, this might mean only moving up to two seconds, then three, and so on for severe cases. Once you start adding time, you can mix up the lengths of time you step out during a training session. For example, if you are able to step outside for five minutes, step out for five minutes and then three minutes. Change it up, but do not go beyond the five minutes until your dog is showing no signs of anxiety.

Once you have worked up to leaving your dog alone for about 45 minutes, you should be able to begin adding time more quickly. In this way you can work your way up to leaving your dog alone for an hour, then two, and then for an entire work day.

If you are able to devote an hour or more each day to training, your dog's anxiety should be greatly improved within a few weeks. If you have followed all the steps, and your dog is still showing signs of anxiety, you may need to seek more help. Your veterinarian can help you decide if medication or hiring a behaviourist is the right step for you and your dog.



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Jasper CD ADX JDM JDO FMX—1st SA dog to gain Flyball Master Excellent title

When Catherine Saberton asked me to write something about my dog, Jasper, being the first dog in SA to achieve his FMX title, I was just going to say how much fun flyball is and what great doggy and human friends we've made, but then I thought what's this title really worth. Is it really just worth a couple of bucks for a cloth badge, or much more?

To understand where I'm coming from you need to know two important things: one, we've been doing flyball for nearly seven years; and, two, we've only got two clubs in SA and for many years we only had a couple of teams. So getting those 700 points has been a long, arduous and, at times, expensive exercise.

Along the way we've had an interesting and entertaining time. Our first comp was the Royal Adelaide Show in 2004. Unfortunately, even though we won our division, we didn't get enough points under the old point system to get a title. That had to wait until we went to a Victorian comp, which is where the cost comes in.

We have done many comps in Victoria and as far as Canberra over the years and they have all been memorable for one reason or another, from competing at the Nationals in Canberra where we stayed in a motel that Basil Fawlty would have been proud of and getting rained out on the first day, to the Melbourne Nationals where we pushed four dogs in 40 degree heat for two days to come up with a tie for 1st in our division only to lose in a run-off. That nearly cost us a huge price - our dogs' health - and we learnt not to push our dogs like that again.

We have made the pilgrimage to Yarram/Best Friends Retreat for the last few years and this has now become our main holiday of the year. It is a lot of fun even though it normally rains, and it becomes expensive to buy enough alcohol to keep warm, and the Panadol to kill the hangovers isn't cheap either. Neither was it cheap when I refused to go back without a caravan the following year. More cost for a new van and goodbye tent.

We have had so many memorable trips that I have lost count but along the way we have formed bonds with so many good people and dogs that the cost of these trips is not really of much importance. We have laughed at our flyball friends' weddings, giggled when a new puppy has licked our faces, and cried when a flyball team mate is no longer with us. We have shared the joy of a dog getting their first title and laughed with the owners of dogs who just didn't get it for months of training and just when you want to give up it all clicks into place.

SA flyballers look upon interstater flyballers with envy at your 1,000-plus point titles. I don't know if interstate flyballers comprehend how lucky they are and how hard it is for us in SA to achieve high points. It has taken me six years to get those 700 points and my dog is nearly eight, so we should get 1,000, but the thought of 4,000 points is just a pipe-

dream. But the one thing I know is that, when my dog does cross the Rainbow Bridge and waits for me on the other side, he will be waiting for me with a ball in his mouth waiting to race again.

So cost? Who cares? Life is a journey, not a destination. Race on!

PARA DISTRICT OBEDIENCE DOG CLUB INCORPORATED General Club Rules

- 1. Dogs are not allowed in Clubrooms.
- 2. Bitches in season are not allowed on Club grounds.
- 3. Dogs may not be off lead unless permitted by an Instructor.
- 4. Dogs and handlers must not use equipment without permission of Instructors.
- 5. All incidents of dog attacks (provoked or unprovoked) must be reported immediately to the Head Instructor who will act accordingly. The incident must be recorded in the Incident Report book in the Office. An appeal to the decision made by the Head Instructor may be made in writing to the Club Secretary and the incident discussed at the next Committee meeting.
- 6. Children under 10 years of age must be supervised by an appropriate adult at all times on Club grounds.
- 7. If your dog fouls the Club grounds you must clean up the deposit immediately. Poo bags are provided on the grounds. If your dog urinates on a Club building or structure, you rinse it off with water. Containers for water can be provided upon request if none are available.
- 8. Smoking is not permitted in class or in Club buildings.
- 9. No alcoholic drinks are permitted in class or in Club buildings.
- If you arrive late, do not enter your class. Wait until the instructor indicates that you
 may join.
- 11. Members must wear sensible shoes no thongs or bare feet.
- 12. Any member not in class may not exercise their dog in the vicinity of classes in progress.
- 13. Please keep dogs well apart to avoid confrontations.
- 14. All handlers and dogs participate at their own risk.
- 15. A current vaccination certificate must be presented upon joining or attending a complimentary lesson. It must also be presented when renewing an existing membership.
- 16. Dogs carrying a contagious disease may not attend training until they are officially cleared in writing by a qualified vet.
- 17. Abusive or foul language is not tolerated on Club grounds.

- 18. Your membership badge must be worn in class. Replacement or "I forgot" badges are available from the office.
- 19. There will be no training for Obedience if the Saturday night forecast for Sunday is 32°C or over for the **Elizabeth area**.
- 20. There will be no training for non-triallers in Agility if the Thursday night forecast for Friday is 32°C or over for the **Elizabeth area**.
- 21. There will be no training for beginners in Flyball if the Sunday night forecast for Monday is 32°C or over for the **Elizabeth area**.
- 22. Any class may be cancelled due to stormy or inclement weather at the discretion of the Head Instructor(s).
- 23. Sun protection is encouraged for you and your dog.
- 24. All injuries must be reported and recorded.
- 25. Class instructors, in consultation with the discipline Head Instructor, reserve the right to send a dog back to a lower class if it is to the advantage of the dog and/or handler.


