

10.30am: 100 metre sprint



#### Puppies die after being dumped in skip

The RSPCA is investigating after three sixweek-old puppies were sealed in a garbage bag and dumped in a skip at Bolivar in Adelaide's north.



A passer-by found the Labrador-cross pup-

pies outside a Port Wakefield Road service station about 7:30am. RSPCA chief inspector Simon Richards says by the time staff arrived two of the dogs had died, while a third has been taken to a vet and is recovering.

He says the service station operator is reviewing security vision to provide clues.

"The penalty for this, the maximum penalty for this, is up to two years' imprisonment or a \$20,000 fine," he said.

"It's disgusting. Certainly the fact that we've taken one puppy out and we've been able to get it treated and begin a rehabilitation process suggests that they were alive when they were put in to the bin.

"One of the puppies will be autopsied to find out what the cause of death is. "But it's just a, it's a despicable act when there are so many other options to ensure the animal has a good home to go to."

# Fun stuff for dog lovers. Did you Know...

- •A dog's heart beats between 70 and 120 times a minute, compared with a human heart which beats 70 to 80 times a minute.
- •A dog's normal body temperature is 100.5 to 102.5 degrees Fahrenheit.
- •A female carries her young about 60 days before the puppies are born.
- •An adult dog has 42 teeth.
- •It is a myth that dogs are colour blind. They can actually see in colour, just not as vividly as humans. It is akin to our vision at dusk.

- •If never spayed or neutered, a female dog, her mate, and their puppies could produce over 66,000 dogs in 6 years!
- •The only sweat glands a dog has are between the paw pads.
- •The world's smartest dogs are thought to be (1) the border collie, (2) the poodle, and (3) the golden retriever.
- •Chocolate contains a substance known as theobromine (similar to caffeine) which can kill dogs or at the very least make them violently ill.
- Dogs' sense of hearing is more than ten times more acute than a human's
- Dogs don't like rain because the sound is amplified and hurts their very sensitive ears.
- Dogs were the first animals domesticated by people.
- •A greyhound can run as fast as 45 miles an hour.
- •Spaying/neutering your dog before the age of 6 months can help prevent cancer in your dog.
- Puppies acquire a full mouth of permanent teeth between four and seven months old.
- •Small dogs live the longest. Toy breeds live up to 16 years or more. Larger dogs average is 7 12 years. Veterinary medicine have extended this estimate by about three years. However, some breeds, such as Tibetan terrier live as long as twenty years.
- Eighty percent of dog owners buy their dog a present for holidays and birthdays. More than half of them sign letters and cards from themselves and their pets.
- •Most pet owners (94 percent) say their pet makes them smile more than once a day.
- •It has been established that people who own pets live longer, have less stress, and have fewer heart attacks.
- •A dog's whiskers are touch-sensitive hairs called vibrissae. They are found on the muzzle, above the eyes and below the jaws, and can actually sense tiny changes in airflow.
- Dogs can smell about 1,000 times better than humans. While humans have 5 million smell-detecting cells, dogs have more than 220 million. The part of the brain that interprets smell is also four times larger in dogs than in humans.



#### **Canine Careers – Search and Rescue**

Dogs throughout history have been bred and kept for many different tasks and services to people. From hunting and retrieval to guarding, lap dogs and off course family companions and friends. Today we continue to use the dog's intelligence, loyalty and willingness to please, to put them to use in some very important jobs. They become part of the workforce they are involved in and are generally considered as another staff member and comrade. Search and Rescue is one in a long list of tasks that these loyal animals perform for us.

In many cases of disaster and loss specially trained dogs are called on to use their extraordinary scenting abilities to help find people who are missing, wounded or casualties. These situations can be widely varied, including aftermaths of hurricanes, earthquakes, flooding, tsunami, landslides, avalanches, bombing, helping the police with missing persons and searching for trampers and sightseers who may be missing in remote and dangerous terrain such as mountain passes and dense bush.

As a dogs' sense of smell is 10,000 times stronger than ours they are much better at discriminating different types of scent. Humans shed up to 40,000 skin sells every minute which the dogs are easily able to pick up and locate.

Search and Rescue dogs date back to 1660 in a place called St. Bernard Pass, a mountain route through the Alps between Switzerland and Italy. These were the ancestors of what we know today as the St. Bernard. They were originally kept as guard dogs, but their talents were quickly recognised and monks trained them to help locate people trapped by the snow.

Later Search and Rescue dogs played an important role in World War 1 and World War 2, British, American and Germans used the dogs to help and find missing and wounded soldiers. After World War 2 they were used in the Swiss Alps by the Swiss Alpine Club to locate people trapped by avalanche.

There are two categories for Search and Rescue dog: air scenting and trail scenting.

Air scenting dogs roam off their leash and sniff the air to locate who they are looking for, while trail scenting dogs are kept on a leash and use their nose and ears together to find the scent on the ground. Air scenting is used to work in areas that may have been contaminated by other human searchers and trailing is used when the scent is weeks old. Search and Rescue dogs are quite often trained in both methods. Dogs are selected very carefully to be introduced to this type of training. They will be challenged with training for many skills such as advanced obedience, agility, jumping, tracking scenting and sounding. While selecting is not breed specific some breeds stand out for these tasks. Bloodhounds have a superior sense of smell. German Shepherds, Belgian Malinois, Golden Retrievers and Labradors also excel in training. The dogs are also need to have great concentration, so that they are able to keep to the task at hand for up to eight hours a day on any given search.



In addition to the canine effort, it cannot go unmentioned the amazing training and commitment that goes into creating a successful Search and Rescue dog, by his human counterparts.

There are years of training and maintenance which these skilled and dedicated trainers, supporters and organisations take on for the benefit of so many who may one day be in need off rescuing.

#### **PRESIDENT**

Shall promote teamwork and foster good relations among club and committee members. Shall represent the club at any official function. Shall attend and preside over all committee meetings. Shall have a knowledge of the PDODC constitution and the SACA constitution and rules.

#### **VICE PRESIDENT**

Shall assist the President whenever required. Shall attend all committee meetings and preside over these in the absence of the President.

#### **SECRETARY**

Shall keep minutes of all meetings of the club and its committee and attend to all correspondence and issue notices for meetings. Shall provide a first-contact service in a friendly and courteous manner that reflects favourably on PDODC and its committee. Shall perform normal secretarial duties. Shall attend all committee meetings.

#### **TREASURER**

Shall receive and provide a receipt for all monies paid to the club and pay the same into a bank account of the club. Shall set up the floats each week for the shop, canteen and office and collect the money at the end of training, balance the money taken, fill in the deposit book and deposit the money. Shall pay all bills promptly. Shall present a report on the finances of the club to each committee meeting. Shall keep proper books of account of all monies received and disbursed on behalf of the club. #### **AGILITY TRIAL SECRETARY**

Shall engage judges, stewards and SACA rep and helpers for the day, receive agility trial entries and prepare catalogue, judges sheets, stewards and judges badges. #### **AGILITY TRIAL MANAGER**

Shall organise rings on the day of trial, oversee the management of the trial, ensure the trial runs smoothly, deal with any complaints.

#### **MAGAZINE EDITOR**

Shall prepare club magazine which shall include all events relevant to the club. Shall attend all committee meetings. This position is to be held by a general committee member.

#### WEB SITE ADMINISTRATOR

Shall maintain the club web site by keeping it up to date with relevant information and uploading 'Slipcollar' magazine and Teams of the Month. 

# PARA DISTRICT OBEDIENCE DOG CLUB INCORPORATED General Club Rules

- 1. Dogs are not allowed in Clubrooms.
- 2. Bitches in season are not allowed on Club grounds.
- 3. Dogs may not be off lead unless permitted by an Instructor.
- 4. Dogs & handlers must not use equipment without permission.
- 5. All incidents of dog attacks (provoked or unprovoked) must be reported immediately to the Head Instructor who will act accordingly. The incident must be recorded in the Incident Report book in the Office. An appeal to the decision made by the Head Instructor may be made in writing to the Club Secretary and the incident discussed at the next Committee meeting.
- 6. Children under 10 must be supervised by an adult at all times on the Club grounds.
- 7. If your dog fouls on the Club grounds you must clean up the deposit immediately. Poo bags are provided on the grounds. If your dog urinates on a Club building or structure, you rinse it off with water. Containers for water can be provided upon request if none are available.
- 8. Smoking is not permitted in class or in Club buildings.
- 9. No alcoholic drinks are permitted in class or in Club buildings.
- 10. If you arrive late, do not enter your class. Wait until the instructor indicates that you may join.
- 11. Members must wear sensible shoes no thongs or bare feet.
- 12. Any member not in class may not exercise their dog in the vicinity of classes in progress.
- 13. Please keep dogs well apart to avoid confrontations.
- 14. All handlers and dogs participate at their own risk.
- 15. A current vaccination certificate must be presented upon joining or attending a complimentary class. It must also be presented when renewing an existing membership.
- 16. Dogs carrying a contagious disease may not attend training until they are officially cleared in writing by a qualified vet.
- 17. Abusive or foul language is not tolerated on Club grounds.
- 18. Your membership badge must be worn in class. "I forgot" badges are available from the office.
- 19. There will be no training for Obedience if the Saturday night forecast for Sunday is 32°C or over for the Elizabeth area.
- 20. There will be no training for non-triallers in Agility if the Thursday night forecast for Friday is 32°C + for the Elizabeth area. There will be no training for non-triallers in Agility if the Thursday night forecast for Friday is 32°C + for the Elizabeth area.
- 21. There will be no training for beginners in Flyball if the Sunday night forecast for Monday is 32°C + for the Elizabeth area.
- 22. Any class may be cancelled due to stormy or inclement weather at the discretion of the Head Instructor(s).
- 23. Sun protection is encouraged for you and your dog.
- 24. All injuries must be reported and recorded.
- 25. Class instructors in consultation with the discipline Head Instructor, reserve the right to send a dog back to a lower class if it is to the advantage of the dog and/or handler.
