PARA DISTRICT OBEDIENCE DOG CLUB INCORPORATED General Club Rules

- 1. Dogs are not allowed in Clubrooms.
- 2. Bitches in season are not allowed on Club grounds.
- 3. Dogs may not be off lead unless permitted by an Instructor.
- 4. Dogs & handlers must not use equipment without permission.
- 5. All incidents of dog attacks (provoked or unprovoked) must be reported immediately to the Head Instructor who will act accordingly. The incident must be recorded in the Incident Report book in the Office. An appeal to the decision made by the Head Instructor may be made in writing to the Club Secretary and the incident discussed at the next Committee meeting.
- 6. Children under 10 must be supervised by an adult at all times on the Club grounds.
- 7. If your dog fouls on the Club grounds you must clean up the deposit immediately. Poo bags are provided on the grounds. If your dog urinates on a Club building or structure, you rinse it off with water.
- 8. Smoking is not permitted in class or in Club buildings.
- 9. No alcoholic drinks are permitted in class or in Club buildings.
- 10. If you arrive late, do not enter your class. Wait until the instructor indicates that you may join.
- 11. Members must wear sensible shoes no thongs or bare feet.
- 12. Any member not in class may not exercise their dog in the vicinity of classes in progress.
- 13. Please keep dogs well apart to avoid confrontations.
- 14. All handlers and dogs participate at their own risk.
- 15. A current vaccination certificate must be presented upon joining or attending a complimentary class. It must also be presented when renewing an existing membership.
- Dogs carrying a contagious disease may not attend until they are cleared in writing by a qualified vet.
- 17. Abusive or foul language is not tolerated on Club grounds.
- 18. Your membership badge must be worn in class. "I forgot" badges are available from the office.
- There will be no training for Obedience if the Saturday night forecast for Sunday is 32°C or over for the Elizabeth area.
- 20. There will be no training for non-trialers in Agility if the Thursday night forecast for Friday is 32°C+ for the Elizabeth area. There will be no training for non-trialers in Agility if the Thursday night forecast for Friday is 32°C+ for the Elizabeth area.
- 21. There will be no training for beginners in Flyball if the Sunday night forecast for Monday is 32°C+ for the Elizabeth area.
- 22. Any class may be cancelled due to stormy or inclement weather at the discretion of the Head Instructor (s).
- 23. Sun protection is encouraged for you and your dog.
- 24. All injuries must be reported and recorded.
- 25. Class instructors in consultation with the discipline Head Instructor, reserve the right to send a dog back to a lower class if it is to the advantage of the dog and/or handler.

Oscars Law

OSCAR'S LAW

Oscar's law is a campaign that enables everyone to make a stand and tell the

Government that "We do not want companion animals factory farmed anymore" and "We no longer want the pet industry to mislead us about what is acceptable for our animals".

You can help fight the killing of healthy, rehomeable pets in Australia's pounds, promote rescue organisations and shelters as the first option to adopting, and change the way Australians gets their pets. Adoption is the intelligent alternative to impulse buying. No puppy factory whether it is 'clean', 'model', 'state of the art' or otherwise is the answer for mans best friend.

Why are there health problems with pups from puppy factories?

Many breeds of dogs have conditions that they are prone to, such as hip dysplasia, chronic skin conditions, overshot jaws and heart murmurs. Good breeders test their breeding dogs for these conditions prior to mating. Puppy factories do not and, as they have no contact with the puppies once they have left the factory, they have no idea what genetic defects they are continuing to breed into these puppies.

Why are pet shop puppies more likely to have behaviour problems?

It has been known by behaviourists for years that the most important time in a puppy's development is between 3 to 12 weeks and puppies isolated during this time (say in a glass box in a pet shop or cage at a factory) are much more likely develop behavioural issues than a well socialised dog. In short - puppy factory puppies miss out on the two things that are known to help shape a good, stable temperament for later life; good breeding and many and varied positive life experiences before the age of seven weeks. As long as they're cute and fluffy, the factory farmer gets his money.

What happens to ex-breeding stock?

Dogs should not be bred every



heat cycle as it is bad for their bodies. Puppy factory bitches are bred every time they come into heat, until there body can no longer produce puppies. Once the dog is no longer useful for breeding it is destroyed and replaced by one of her female pups.

Dogs rescued from puppy factories are often very difficult to rehome. They have known nothing but a cage their entire life and struggle to cope with the outside world. Many of these dogs can not be rehabilitated as pets and will be euthanased. The ones that are saved will need special care their entire lives.

Is Oscar's Law against all dog breeding?

No we are not against dog breeding, we are opposed to factory farming pets. We love dogs and don't want to see the extinction of our wonderful companions by banning all breeding. We believe there are better ways to keep, breed and find your new 'best friend'. Puppy factories inflict cruelty and deprive dogs of their basic needs and there is no justification for factory farming our pets.

We strongly promote adoption as there is nothing more rewarding than saving a life. We do recognise that some people will search for a particular breed and want a puppy, we recommend you do your research when finding an ethical breeder, just because they are registered doesn't mean they are ethical! Check out the RSPCA Smart Puppy Buyers Guide for further information on how to buy a puppy without supporting puppy factories.

Is the RSPCA opposed to puppy factories and the sale of animals in pet shops?

Some State RSPCA are opposed to puppy factories and the sale of animals in shops. Please support the RSPCA campaign to Close Puppy Factories and support them on their Close Puppy Factories Facebook page

What is the difference between a registered breeder and a puppy factory (and how will I know)?

A registered breeder is registered with their State organisation such as Dogs Victoria. However, just because a breeder is registered does not necessarily mean they're ethical. A puppy factory is not registered with any organisation. Many claim to be registered, but they are in fact just a 'registered' business! An ethical breeder will be happy for you to visit them to meet the parents and the pups at their own premises, in fact most will insist. Puppy factories will not. Even puppy factories who meet the legal requirements of minimum standards of care will not let you see their breeding facilities - they know that you will be horrified.

We encourage you to do your own thorough research before buying a puppy - inspect the breeder's facilities, breeding dogs and puppies yourself. Ask for testimonials of previous buyers and what 'after purchase' follow-up the breeder offers. A breeder will know about their breed, they will be happy to answer your questions and are very likely to have plenty of their own. The RSPCA Victoria have developed the Smart Puppy Buyers Guide to further assist you in ensuring you are not supporting puppy factories.





I was hunting for my next German Coolie and finding a breeder is very hard. I did find one with Renae and her husband Trent. Linda and I went off and had a



look at all of these puppies, actually 17 gorgeous, fluffy and an assortment of colours. Well Linda and I both came home with a puppy one was happy and the other was angry. They both looked like book ends

As a puppy Gabby was great learnt things very quickly. Taught her back leg awareness, ready for our career in both obedience and agility. Tricks like hand stands, picking up coins and putting in a bottle. At 9 months of age we ended up in our first trial in CCD and won that with a score of 99. That was the start of her career. By the end of the year we had our CCD and CD titles The Royal Adelaide Show we won the CD class and the State Champion we won the novice class. The SACA Awards that year we won SACA Top CCD and CD What a great start to Gabby's trialling career.

2009 we got our CDX and UD title and by the time 2010 came around we got that elusive Obedience Champion 2009 we also won the SACA Award for Top CDX and runner up UD.2010 we won the Top UDX award. Over the years we have won numerous State Champion in Open and Utility and UDX and Royal Shows. We have since worked on going for our Obedience Grand Champion which means I needed to pass another 5 qualification with a score of 185 or more and at Dover Gardens Obedience Trial held in May we finally cracked our last pass. Gabby had become the first dog in the state having this title and the first in Australia to have an Obedience Grand Champion and Agility Champion. It was very fitting as my older Coolie Xena was the first dog in Australia to have the Obedience Champion and the Agility Champion title. It was a very emotional time as I had just lost Xena 5 days before and I didn't want to go to the trial but I am glad I did.

When Gabby was just over 2 we started our agility career flying

through our titles gaining our ADM in June 2010. We also won numerous classes in both State and Royal Shows and SACA Awards. We have competed at National level competing against all of Australia and New Zealand. What a buzz that was. We had represented SA twice. Our first attempt was in Western Australia and we got in three finals and that was in our first year of trialling 2010. JDM, JDO and ADO and we got a second in JDO. Our next attempt was in Sydney Nationals that was a gruelling 5 days of competition walking courses at 8 in the morning and not finishing till 11.30 at night but we finally managed a win



becoming the 2012 National Master Gambler Champion beating some of the top dogs of Australia. What a buzz that was.



We tried our hand in Rally gaining our Novice, Advance and Excellent titles and we are now working our way to gaining our RAE title we have two passes only another 8 to go.

We have also tried our hand in dancing well Gabby is great pity about the owner but we had a bash and got our Dancing with Dog Starters Freestyle Do have to try and put another routine together and get back into the ring lol

So overall my best mate has lots of lovely letters both in front and end won numerous awards in SACA, State Championships and Adelaide Royal Shows. What an awesome dog Gabby is this is her official name:

Have you drained your dog's excess energy lately???

While most people attend obedience training with their dogs thinking it is the best way to get their excitable and high energy dog to focus, most don't realise that in many cases you are often fighting an uphill battle unless you can drain some of your dog's excess energy. For a lot of high energy dogs taking them for a daily walk is recommended and then also taking them for a walk right before training is recommended to drain some of their ener-



gy. In reality though for most of these dogs a walk isn't even going to dent their energy levels, even if it is a 60 minute walk and a 35 minute walk around the block daily certainly won't be enough to keep their energy levels in check. That's fine you say, I run with my dog. Well unfortunately even running with your dog may actually not be enough unless you have quite a

small sized dog or are running a marathon with them every day and here is why.

Most healthy people can walk at around 5 – 7km per hour and can maintain these speeds well for long distances (2 hours plus). A highly trained marathon runner can run at a pace of around 19km per hour although your person with average to good fitness



is more likely to be in the range of 8 – 12km per hour. If you are a recreational runner you are likely to run at the 8 – 10 km per hour mark with the distance you can last depending on how much running you actually do. Pretty impressive until you consider a medium sized dog such as a kelpie, border collie, aussie shepherd or husky would probably consider

12km per hour as a leisurely jog and if they were high energy could probably sit at that pace for a good hour before you started to dent their excess energy. By excess energy here I mean that energy that builds up daily every time they don't' actually get enough exercise. If they were to select their running pace they would probably sit more around the 14-16km per hour mark and again could stay at this pace for a good 30 minutes or more without thinking much of it. For some of these dogs running speeds of 25km per hour are not unheard of and they can still maintain these speeds for 10-15 minutes. Your larger dogs such as german shepherds, larger labradors or aussie shepherd and malamutes are have a similar pace and while they often don't actually run faster at their top speeds, their stride length means that holding a pace of 14-16km per hour for 30-60 minutes isn't a problem at all.

Bike riding

I am not talking about the dog here but if you have access to one consider using a bike. It doesn't take a much practice as you might think to get the hang of it and if you are worried about riding and holding the lead you can buy attachments for your bike that you can attach the lead to. A bike allows you to be able to maintain a pace that is much more suited to your dog's natural



running speed without requiring the same level of fitness if you were trying to run with them. As the dog can set the pace it can allow you to drain both their energy and their excitement levels. This is also something that the whole family can often do together. As the dog is moving at a much faster pace it also requires more of their concentration to keep balanced so they are often less likely to be distracted as they have to keep their focus forward. It is illegal to ride with you dog on the road however as long as you are following all other cycling rules (helmets, lights, bell etc) and are on a dual purpose path (not a normal footpath) or trail you are not likely to have any problems if you keep your dog on their lead.

Once you really start keeping your dog's excess energy in check you will find that dealing with just their normal energy levels becomes much more manageable. It will also make a very big difference to their ability to focus at training and also their general behaviour at home. While most people think that doing any of these activities will only increase their dog's fitness and therefore give them more energy this isn't the case. This is about excess energy levels that build up because you dogs basic exercise needs aren't satisfied. For really young dogs that are still growing you do need to be careful with distances that they run but shorter runs on a softer surface such as grass are safe in moderation. Younger doas normally don't have the same stamina as older dogs so shorter activities at a pace they select are normally sufficient. Similarly with older dogs consider their joint and overall health when selecting the distances you cover and use your dog's natural energy levels as a guide to how much exercise they need. Overall a little effort on your behalf will make for a very happy and very content dog.

So next time you are in class and wrestling with your hyperactive and excitable dog ask yourself if you have really done enough to satisfy their exercise requirements. For a high energy dog really letting them burn off their energy needs to happen 2 or 3 times a week if you are to actually keep their excess energy in check. Once a week would be better than nothing if it is before training, but in reality it is much better to keep on top of their excess energy on a regular basis than just trying to drain it all once a week. Besides, wouldn't it be nice to have a calmer more content dog 7 days a week rather than just one. If you don't have 4 hours spare before class to take them on a long walk or you aren't a seriously fast runner then there are a couple of options that you may like to consider for your dog.

Treadmill training

If you have access to a treadmill then consider treadmill training your dog. The few hours that you spend training your dog on the treadmill will pay off in the long run. Once they are trained you can put them on it before you bring them to class. As the dog has to focus on the task it drains them both mentally and physically so they don't need to be on the treadmill



as long as they would if you had taken them for a walk. You will be surprised at how much some dogs actually enjoy this particularly if your dog is an excited/anxious dog. It is not uncommon for treadmill trained dogs to actually go and stand on the treadmill and whine or bark for it to be turned on because of how much more relaxed and content they feel after exercise.

Swimming

If you live near the beach or have a pool get them to going swimming. Swimming uses a lot more active muscle mass and therefore requires a lot more energy for your dog to maintain. It is



also a very natural action for a dog and the water can often have a calming effect on them. This is particularly useful for people with younger high energy dogs that are worried about joint damage from a lot of running or if you have a dog that is older, injured, or overweight.

It is always hard work to round them all up. If you don't hand them to me, you need to leave them in the office with a note on them saying what they are for and who to give them back too. You will only receive a trophy for the EOY if you put PDODC down as your first club, you will receive a badge however if you list PDODC as your second club on your entry form for all disciplines. Games qualifications only receive a badge.

Please give them to me throughout the year as it is not acceptable to save them all up and give them in all at once. I will record them as soon as I can and return them promptly to you.
