What to Wear

Secondary schools are expected to teach you this.

AVOID:

jeans or casual denim hats casual shoes - flip flops, athletic shoes, Vans, Converse, message or logo shirts shorts yoga pants, leggings as pants Underwear showing Short skirts or dresses high heels – 1" max hair in your eyes/face Camo or wild prints cleavage Stained, wrinkled, or frayed clothing outdoor/manual labor clothing

excessive/distracting ... anything

What to wear:

Business casual: slacks, collared shirt, button up, sweater, boring.


Think school uniform.

Dress business-y = look serious.

Suck it up and just do it. Borrow. Buy cheap. Figure it out.

1. PREP the SPEECH

- Write it out if you must.
- Have an outline, at least.
- Practice and time it.
- Know how to pronounce all the words.
- Do not read to us.
- If you use a visual aid, the letter must be 1", or make a copy for every recipient.

- Gestures, eye contact, voice modulation.
- BREATHE.
- Practice it for timing, and to avoid "ums" and "likes."
- Do NOT just read what is on the slide. That is SO boring.
- Say thank you at the end.
