Pastor's Corner! July 27, 2025

Last week, I was watching the Movie, Raiders of the Lost Ark, for the zillionth time. I love action movies. As much as I enjoy this movie, I am always disappointed in all of the characters. All of them (the bad guys, as well as the good guys) want the Ark for the wrong reason. Hitler and the Nazis want it because they believe, if they come in possession of it, they can use its power to conquer the world. The Americans (who don't understand or believe that it is God who has the power, not inanimate objects like clay tablets or a staff]) want it for no other reason than to prevent Hitler from possessing it. In their mind, it is an intimate object, which they end up placing in a crate in a huge warehouse never to be uncovered again. The hero of the story, Indiana Jones, dismisses its sacred background and considers it the crowning achievement of his Archeological Career. Along with his colleagues at the University, he believes it should have an honored place in a museum of great stature. Even after Indiana Jones witnesses the extermination of all the Nazis who opened the Ark, he continues his atheistic ways. It is Hollywood at its atheistic best, referring to God and characters who believe in God when it serves their story, but never....never actually acknowledging the legitimacy of God's existence. To do so, would mean that Hollywood would have to acknowledge God's value and moral direction.

Today's 1st Reading and Gospel, focuses on the core of every love-relationship; namely,

being honest, respectful, humble and sharing. Party "A" talks, Party "B" listens; then Party "B" speaks and Party "A" listens. This rhythm continues until both parties are in sync. Sometimes it is a joyful way of confirming one's love for each other; other times it is scary, painful and humbling, but both parties will embrace those experiences out of love for the other and because above all, they treasure the gift of their relationship. Reflect on the 1st Reading. Abraham & Sarah, along with all of their servants have stopped in the midst of their travels in the region of Sodom and Gomorrah. These are people whose character is reflected in their total lack of respect for anyone, their cruelty, their gross hedonism and their cowardliness. They do not care what anyone thinks of them; they want what they want. Not surprisingly, they behave that way towards Abraham, Sarah and their party. With this, God has had enough. He intends to destroy the people of Sodom and Gomorrah, but wants Abrham and his party to have an opportunity to escape the coming wrath. Being the good man that Abraham is, he attempts to intercede for the peoples of these two cities. I don't know if I would have had the courage to challenge God the number of times that Abraham does with God. But he does, and in doing so, He moves God from destroying two whole cities to sparing those two cities if Abraham can find just ten good citizens. That's a heck of lot of praying and listening on both party's part; but it goes on until the issue is resolved. Why? Because both parties are **honest**, **respectful** and **humble**. These are the ways in which they extend their love to each other.

When we reflect on the today's Gospel, a similar dynamic is in play; namely, persistence. Wonderfully, it is Jesus Himself who is advocating it. "And I tell you, ask and you will receive; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you. For everyone who asks, receives; the one who seeks, finds; and to the one who knocks, the door will be open." These are the words of one who wants to be in a love-relationship with us. They are the words of a God who is patient, who cares and who will listen; and who expects that our love for Him will also be characterize by genuine love on our part; by a willingness to listen to Him with trust. humility and gratitude. These are the things that should always characterize our personal relationship with God and our prayer-life. When they are, we can expect that these very same responses will characterize Our Lord's answers to us. Your brother in Christ

Share your belief with them that they would be happy in the Church and that they would be a blessing to the Church. Encourage them to make an act of faith by becoming a person of Faith. Let them know that you believe God's Holy Spirit is calling them.
