

Pastor's Corner! May 25, 2025

I would like to focus on this week's 1st Reading, from the *Acts of the* Apostles. As you are aware, the original followers of our Lord were all Jews, the vast majority of whom were faithful followers of Judaism. For them, Jesus Christ was the fulfillment of all the religious teachings and laws of the Jewish Church, which were to be trusted and strictly followed. Understandably, they understood themselves to be another branch of Judaism and expected everyone who desired to follow the teachings of Christ to embrace the traditions of Judaism. Many Gentiles converts to Christianity found this to be a real challenge, especially over issues which they considered non-essential. It became an obstacle to their conversion and a growing source of tension for the Jewish members of the Church who felt they were being asked to compromise their ancient beliefs. Today's 1st Reading reflects how the issue came to a head, when conservative Jewish converts, without consulting with the Apostles, insisted that Gentile converts must embrace Jewish Traditions, including circumcision. This would be the first major test of the Church's leadership and its reliance on the inspiration of Our Lord's Holy Spirit to resolve dilemmas in

matters of Faith and Morals. Just as the Holy Father and the Bishops resolve issues in the church today, the ancient church sought the direction of the Holy Spirit through a combination of open discussions with all parties guided by prayer. I suspect it is safe to say that those discussions and sessions of prayer went on as long as it was necessary until they were certain of the solution. Was everyone happy with their decision? probably not. Yet, it is important that we notice their decision was in response to three basic factors: 1) A refusal by members to empathize with the difficulties of the Gentile experience. 2) A refusal by the conservative Jewish Christians to acknowledge that their demands were creating an unreasonable hardship for the Gentile converts, which contradicted the spirit of Our Lord's call to Love. 3) That the Church should not be locked into any particular religious tradition to the exclusion of other groups. We can see this in the instructions which the Apostles and elders in Jerusalem outlined for the Gentile Christians: "It is the decision of the Holy Spirit and of us not to place on you any burden beyond these necessities; namely, to abstain from meat sacrificed to idols, from blood, from meat of strangled animals and from unlawful marriage. If you keep free of these you will be doing what is right.

Farewell." Basically, they are instructing them **not** to do anything that was associated with the Pagan culture of the times, or cause confusion by associating with them. If they were reminding the Jewish Christians that the Lord intended for the Church to be inclusive, i.e., *Universal;* it was also impressing upon the Gentile Christians that they have an obligation to inspire the people around them with their Christ-like life style, and not to scandalize anyone. Their job was to inspire people towards Christ, not create confusion.

As Catholic Christians, this experience is very important for us to remember. We live in a world that is quite comfortable in *compromising* in the bad sense of the word. If something is inconvenient, wrong or doesn't suit one's agenda, they feel they have the right to change the rules. We also live in a world that has suddenly turned extremely intolerant. There is no effort or intention by many to work at resolving differences or disagreements. The immediate response to someone or some group who disagrees with another is to scream, accuse, slander, alarm and basically portray the other person/group as a threat, unfaithful and someone undeserving of respect. When one feels threatened by such behavior or has been

wounded by it, it is natural to want to hurt back. Both as individuals and as a Church, we must be ready to do the difficult thing and choose to trust in the power of God's Love. Isn't this the very reason we loved Pope Francis and are excited about Pope Leo XIV? They are men who lead by insisting that all our decisions must be the product of *prayer*, *respect* and *compassion*. We will probably feel ill-equipped to handle the issue; it will take longer to resolve, and we will definitely have the scars to show for it, **but** in the end, God's goodness will always resolve the issue.
