Pastor's Corner! July 4, 2021

Happy Fourth of July, everyone! One of the reasons birthdays are such a cause for celebration is that it recognizes the preciousness of life. It might be difficult for a person to put it into words, but when a baby comes into the world, there is this basic recognition of how precious it is. Perhaps it is because that baby is so innocent and also receptive to its parent's love, and by extension, the love of family and friends. Even the most hard-hearted person is not immune to the essential goodness of an infant or a child. This experience is so profound, that it is instinctive for most to perpetuate that joy and the goodness of that person by remembering when their life began. It is not surprising that this instinct is strongest among the peoples from the Judeo-Christian traditions. They recognize that God is the source of their spiritual life. Jews understand that they would not be, if it weren't for God forming them as a spiritual people....His People. They remember all of the times they were unfaithful and faithful to their Divine Parent, and how He patiently and humbly brought them along through the centuries. Likewise, Christians understand that Israel's spiritual Father has extended his love to all the peoples of the world through the Life, Death & Resurrection of His Son, Jesus Christ. For us as Catholic Christians, the birth of that "New" Life begins at our Baptism.

Regardless of their particular denomination, is there a Christian family who doesn't celebrate the Baptism of their child or friend into this "New" Life? If all of this is true when it relates to individuals, it is also true for groups of individuals.....for nations! I am certain that for many nations, the anniversary of their birth is recognized and celebrated. However, at the risk of sounding elitist, the *4th of July* is a particularly important day for Americans. As peoples and nations go, the *United States of America* is a relatively young nation. Compared to many nations, we are still an adolescent country. Like most adolescents, we have displayed inspired maturity, character and growth. At the same time, we have also displayed a readiness to be dishonest with ourselves and others over various issues. Our present culture reveals, that more and more of our people seem to be drifting away from God; yet, as He did for the ancient people of Israel, the Father continues to watch over us; preventing us from permanently wounding ourselves and others. He doesn't do this because we deserve it; He does it because the world needs us. Throughout history, the peoples of the world didn't realize how badly they

needed the presence of God as He revealed himself through the spiritual lives of the Jewish people when they were at their best, when they were faithful to God. The same is true for us as Americans. For whatever reason, He chose us to be a model and inspiration to all other people, not because we are perfect or without sin, but because, despite all of our short-comings, when we rely on God's Wisdom and God's strength, we do so much good.....His good. TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The American summer is officially underway, and people are on the move. Signs of hospitality are everywhere. In today's Gospel, Jesus' visit home is hardly marked by hospitality. He goes up to the bema, the elevated place for solemn public reading of the Torah, and his message is poorly received. Today, we read from the descendant of the bema, the ambo, almost an "altar of the Word of God." Many ancient ambos are preserved in Italy, decorated with marble, ivory, precious metal, and jewels. Six hundred years ago, the pulpit came into use, meant for preaching rather than proclamation of scripture. Before microphone systems, pulpits were often located halfway down the church, amid the gathered people, and not so clearly associated with the altar. Today, the ambo (the plural is "ambone"!) is an expected feature of our worship spaces because the Word is once again proclaimed to the people. Before 1964, typically the readings were done quietly by the priest at the altar in Latin, and optionally repeated in English from the pulpit. With the restored place of scripture in our worship, a beautiful and worthy ambo, related in design to the altar table, has once again become a prominent and familiar feature of Catholic architecture.
