



Pastor's Corner! April 26, 2020

Today, I would like to focus on this weekend's 1st Reading from the Acts of the Apostles. It takes place weeks after the Resurrection and the Pentecost experience, when Our Lord returned to his followers in the form of the Holy Spirit. Do you notice the difference in the Apostles? Night and Day, right? They have moved from being men frozen with fear, guilt and shame, to dynamos who boldly go to the very places they were terrified to visit, lest, and speak openly, confidently and joyfully about Jesus Christ. What do you think brought about this difference in the Apostles? The stock explanation is that "they received the Holy Spirit"; "that the Holy Spirit descended upon them." That's true, but such expressions make it sound as if they didn't have any choice in the matter, or that they were ambushed by the Holy Spirit, as if they didn't have a chance to get out of the way. Nothing could be further from the truth. The Apostles [and the other followers of Our Lord] received the Holy Spirit for two reasons. #1 In humility, they admitted to themselves their short-comings; that they would never ever be capable of doing the slightest good until they tossed overboard their pride and all of the baggage that was entangled with it; this would take place during their time in the Upper Room. #2 Once they made a completely empty space within their hearts & souls; they needed to invite Our Lord in to remake it, which would take place on Pentecost Sunday. Many things needed to be brought to bear for them to do this, but I believe the two most important things they needed to exercise were **Courage** and **Humility**. Until they exercised these two powerful virtues, they would remain their own worst enemies. Once they did, Jesus's love would literally wash over them, and they in turn would be agents of Christ grace that could wash over everyone, including, every threatening and seemingly impossible situation they would be drawn into.

Today's 1st Reading is a prime example of it. Peter, along with the Eleven, stands up to confront their brother & sister Jews, for their resistance and refusal to see Jesus as the Son of God. As happens frequently, when one is confronted with their faults, his words must have stung them to the bone. He does not do this out of anger or self-righteousness; rather, he does this out of love. Surely, he sees in them himself from only a few weeks before. Surely, he understands that they need the same act of love on his part, as he needed after he denied the Lord.....3x's! It is not included in this Reading, but on that occasion, thousands respond to his challenge.

There are a number of things that we must take from Peter's act of love. #1 We will never grow close to Our Lord if we continue to make excuses for our weaknesses and faults. #2 Contrary to what our guts tell us, we won't die when we choose to become transparent before the Lord; actually, Our Lord will unburden us and we will know a kind of clarity & joy, we never thought possible. #3 As a person so loved, we must become an agent of such freedom and Divine Love. We must have the confidence that regardless of how hostile or misunderstood our efforts to draw others towards Our Lord, we have an obligation to offer it to them, and never withhold it from them. So often, Christians see their discipleship as a "personal thing", which infers that no one has the right to interfere with their version of Discipleship. Wrong! There is only one version of Discipleship and that is defined by Our Lord, not us. To those, who disagree with this, I would refer them to the Holy Thursday Apostles. To those who agree, I would refer them to the post-Pentecost Apostles of this morning's 1st Reading. No doubt, each of us are frightened and discouraged because we see only the Holy Thursday Peter in ourselves. Fear not! Just like Peter, we are a work in progress and our Lord will be as patient and compassionate with each of us, as he was with the Peter and the Apostles. We need only to imitate Peter and the Apostles, by giving him our willingness to be **courageous** and to be **humble**. Can each of us say that we do?
