Easter Sunday

Alleluia! Alleluia! Alleluia! He is risen! This joyful message is the most important part of Christianity's message to the World. There is nothing that God's love can not resolve, heal and overcome..... Nothing! Not even something as seemingly permanent as Death. For the person who is humble enough to accept God's conditions, there is nothing that God's love will not defeat; no bad thing, no contradiction, no evil that he does not have the desire to reverse.....nothing! The cynical will politely disagree. For them, life is what one can control. Life is about *power*.....intellectual power, financial power, political power, military power, social power, emotional power. When one has power, then one will be happy; one will be secure; no one can hurt you or control your options. God came into our world as just the opposite; that is to say, powerless. He came into the world as an infant, in a working-class family, from a town that had no credentials or stature. He wasn't connected to anyone in Jerusalem. His message was a call to love; by being forgiving, selfless; and generous, not only to those you know, but to strangers, to those whom you know will be unable to repay you, to those who are helpless and imperfect. He insisted that everyone is equal in the heart of the Father: Jew and Gentile; women as well as men; children as well as adults; the poor as well as the wealthy. Notice, that these demographics included the powerless. Finally, His Passion and Death were acts of being powerless. On *Good Friday*, He would not defend himself against the accusations of the mob or Herod. When taunted by the crowd on *Calvary* to prove His messiahship by coming down off the Cross, he remained there....powerless. All of this was to impress one essential thing upon us; that our life, our joy, our security can only be found in the love of the Father, not in what we can influence. Such trust, such humility, such selflessness is how we will discover the Father and His love for us. Jesus' crucifixion, death and Resurrection was the Father's promise to us that as He has done for the Son, so will He do for each one of us, if we model our choices in this life after that of His Son. It is the Father's love for us that is final, permanent and eternal. Our eternal life will be determined by the effort we make to re-mold our hearts into that of the Son's. When we do, all of our choices and actions will follow. This is why Easter Sunday is the most important date in Christianity's calendar.

Easter Sunday and the holy season that follows is a celebration of two things. It is a celebration of Our Lord's victory over Evil and it is a celebration through which we are to be inspired to action! The purpose of the last six weeks of Lent was to encourage us to use that time to identify anything, any behavior, in which we put ourselves before the Father who loves us. This is not necessarily an easy thing to do, but it is a healthy thing that we should do. Today's Easter celebration becomes a celebration of Our Lord's choice to trust in the *power* of Father's love and a challenge for each of us to do the same. Easter is the Father's proof to us, that there is only one source of Truth and Peace in our lives; namely His love. When Mary Magdala, Peter and John, departed from the empty tomb, they were charged to offer this truth to the Apostles and other disciples. Now, like them, the Lord charges us to leave the empty tomb, and with faith and out of love, share with them the reason for our "Alleluias".

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Today was once called in Latin "Dominica in albis," or "Sunday in White," because the church was full of newly baptized Christians wearing their white baptismal garments. Another old title, best forgotten, is "Low Sunday." There's nothing low about this festive Sunday in Easter, the eighth day since the first "Alleluia" rang out. In Christian tradition, the number eight is a symbol of fulfillment, transition, breaking through the seven-day rhythm of life to a new way of being. That is why many baptismal fonts have eight sides. The greatest feasts of our calendar are always extended for eight days, called an "octave." In a way, this means that this first week of Easter is really considered to be one great day. This octave day of Easter sees the best features of Easter still vibrant: joyful alleluias, lush spring flowers everywhere, sprinkling with water, and a lavish table where the Lord gives us himself as bread and wine. For Orthodox Christians, today is the Easter feast, since their tradition requires that the Christian Passover cannot begin until the days of the Jewish Passover are ended.

To fittingly observe the Feast of Mercy, we should: 1) Celebrate the Feast on the Sunday after Easter; 2) Sincerely repent of all our sins; 3) Place our complete trust in Jesus; 4) Go to confession, before that Sunday; 5) Receive Holy Communion on the day of the Feast, or at the Vigil Mass; 6) Venerate the image of the Divine Mercy; 7) Be merciful to others, through our actions, words and prayers on their behalf.
To venerate a sacred image simply means to perform some act or make some gesture of deep religious respect towards it because of the person whom it represents—in this case, our Most Merciful Savior.
