## Pastor's Corner! December 6, 2020

Who of us can imagine large groups of people willing to travel long distances, through hostile environments, at their own expense, to listen to someone who would confront them with their faults, their sins? I think most people would be willing to drive long distances, with the presumption that there would be plenty of "places to stop to get something to eat", motels to comfortably stay overnight all in order to enjoy a concert, an airshow, a football game, the seashore, etc. but not to be publicly challenged about their personal shortcomings. Yet, that is exactly what we see happening in today's Gospel regarding John the Baptist. Why would they do this? The Baptist experience is comprised of two parts. Part1: Good people can choose to do bad things; for everyone, it begins with being dishonest with oneself. More often than not, such behavior is not typical of their choices. Nevertheless, as all of us can attest, once one starts rationalizing something that is sinful, it becomes increasingly more difficult to stop. After we have made the turn onto that slippery road, we realize that we don't have the four wheel-drive to control the situations we have created. It can become so bad, that after a while, we lose all sense of the wrongness of what we are doing. Yet, in His love for us, God never gives up on us. God continues to whisper warnings into the spiritual ear of our conscience, and after time, we come to the painful realization that the reason we are not at peace is because we have been wounding ourselves; wounding our relationship with those around us; wounding our relationship with God. That's when we need a John the Baptist in our lives and that is when we realize that we need to seek him out, because he is both a man of brutal honesty and because he is a man who cares about us. The people sense that the Baptist is a man who has dedicated his life for God and for them. We must realize that he feels the same way about you and me. He loves us so much, that he gives us the truth with both barrels. It isn't painless, but it is liberating. That is why the Baptist draws people out into the desert. He is forcing them to strip away all distractions both outside of themselves and within themselves. Part2: The people come to John the Baptist because of the second part of his message. He encourages them to trust that God is not only coming, but more importantly, He is coming to love them. The Baptist assures them that God seeks to love them, provided their lives are free of all the things which, until now, they have used as a substitution for Him. His message is one of promise to them; promise that they are included

in God's plan of eternal love. For a long time, they had not been offered that teaching or encouraged to believe that God felt that way about them. For those who take the risk of exposing themselves to this experience, their lives are changed forever.

I would hope that each of us would recognize how this also applies to us. So, I encourage you my, Brothers & Sisters, to take this story to heart. There is not one of us who doesn't need to own things in our lives that still remain an obstacle between ourselves and Our Lord. We don't want it to be that way, but sometimes we are just afraid of going out into the desert; being alone with Our Lord; letting him point out those things that are wounding ourselves, and handing them over to Him. We are in the middle of Advent, a time just like those days when John the Baptist invited people out into the desert to critique their lives so that they would be prepared for the Messiah, who, through His teachings, Crucifixion, Death and Resurrection would reveal how genuine God's love is for them. All they would need to do is be genuinely honest about themselves, and that began in the desert with John. For us, within the Catholic tradition, celebrating the Sacrament of Reconciliation is a step into the desert and I'd encourage you to include it as part of your preparation for Christmas.

While proclaiming the coming Christ is a thing of joy, John's words are also harsh, reminding us to repent and prepare. People were threatened by them two thousand years ago, and some still are today. People can hear them and be turned off by "fire and brimstone," and none of us like to be told what to do. But think about it.

This year, we have all engaged in social distancing and endured hardships to protect our families and others.

Similarly, when you have company coming, you do house cleaning, meal prep, and lots of things to make the place ready for the arrival of your guests—necessary preparation. So we as individuals must make ourselves ready for the coming Christ to reside in us. This may mean repenting for sins, seeking the sacrament of penance, or taking time with a spiritual director. Perhaps it means carving out more times and places for Christ to be born in our hearts or taking on another spiritual practice. Maybe it means simply doing what the psalm asked and using our eyes and ears and mind and heart to seek Christ.
