

## Pastor's Corner! February 14, 2021

During a "renovation" of a 60+ year old caboose I own, I was hoping that we could address a few specific areas of the caboose that could no longer be ignored. In my mind, this would be a cosmetic project. I was hoping to generate as little dirt and dust as possible. The first couple of work sessions, we were constantly spending time moving stuff around because it was in the way of various work areas. Finally, a friend helping me with this project confronted me with what was becoming obvious, but which I just couldn't bring myself to do; namely, that the whole car needed to be gutted and that we needed to start from scratch. I was not happy about this because the project was no longer a cosmetic job; it had turned into a rebuild job. Consequently, everything that wasn't welded down to that 25+ton car needed to be removed, including its original oak floor. The more we stripped, the more damage within the car was revealed. The car was in serious shape. It needed a lot of its internal framework replaced and re-welded. So many things needed to be replaced, including the car's electrical wiring, sections of its plumbing and that oak floor. More than once, heat from welder's torches started small fires within the walls of the car. It was one dirty job. It lasted an entire summer and autumn. There were so many days that it didn't seem we had made any progress or that we would find the solutions to additional issues that the stripping of the car would reveal. Nevertheless, over time, my feelings shifted from discouragement to satisfaction and relief. It was not only the right thing to do, but it was the healthy thing to do.

This Wednesday is Ash Wednesday which marks the beginning of the sacred Season of Lent. Lent is that 7-week period, when the Church encourages us to do something that we really don't want to do; namely, initiate a spiritual "renovation" of our relationship with Our Lord. That's right. During Lent, we pull out our grungy clothes and begin stripping ourselves down to the frame. We do it not so much because we like it, but because after a long time, we have probably covered over spiritual damage to our relationship with Our Lord, which is no longer cosmetic; rather, it is structural....stuff that should no longer be ignored. Like any serious "renovation", Lent involves activities that are not very attractive. Lent asks for time that often doesn't seem very productive like personal prayer which gives much indication of progress and choosing the sacrifice of things that we honestly enjoy by fasting or abstinence. Lent involves activities, that on the surface seem unimportant or stuff that you already know

about such as Stations of the Cross. In other words, Lent is not about a cosmetic relationship with Christ; rather, it is about investing ourselves in the relationship He invited us into at our Baptism.

In these days before Ash Wednesday, I encourage you, my brothers & sisters, to ask Our Lord to help you make this time productive. Start thinking about things that you can do that will enrich your relationship with Our Lord. Ask Him to help you risk being more transparent about yourself than you ever have before; allow Him to reveal to you things that should no longer be ignored or excused. Ask Him to help you see those structural members within your life that need replacing or his welding. Ask Him to help you to be patient and to trust that the time and ways in which you invest yourself with Him during the Season of Lent, won't be regretted.

### Paul the People Pleaser

Last week we heard St. Paul saying that he was all things to all people. This week, we hear that he tried to please everyone. To modern ears, that sounds more like a people-pleaser. But that wasn't what Paul meant. The key to Paul's way of life is the last line of the second reading: "Be imitators of me, as I am of Christ." (1 Cor 11:1)

When Jesus spoke to Paul in his conversion, he asked why he was persecuting Jesus. Paul later began to understand that all Christians make up the body of Christ. As members of that body, we can show others what Jesus is like, by our example. That seems to be a two part process.

First, to show Christ, we have to know Christ. We can do that by reading the scriptures and praying with them. We can receive the sacraments regularly, especially Reconciliation, where we experience his forgiveness and love, and the Eucharist, where Jesus unites himself with us, so that we can become more like him.

The second part is acting like Jesus. Forgive people who hurt us, care for the sick, the dying, the poor. Don't be afraid to tell people what God has done for you; encourage others to be grateful for what God has done for them.

Paul obviously didn't please everyone, or he wouldn't have ended his life in prison. He was more interested in imitating Christ. If we can imitate Paul in that way, we can't go wrong.
