Pastor's Corner! February 28, 2021

Over the last 3-4 weeks, most of you received two mailings from the Archdiocese soliciting your financial assistance. Both involve two “Collections” that have been taken up long before you and I were born: **Catholic Charities** and **The Annual Seminary Appeal for St. Charles Seminary**. One of the wonderful things that defines the Catholic Church in Philadelphia is the incredible loyalty of its people to the numerous missions of the Philadelphia Church. These two appeals are the poster children of appeals. The Archdiocese of Philadelphia is made up of the five-county area. The people of this five County area were and are incredible. They built and maintained entire school systems on both the primary and secondary level. They built and financed St. Charles Seminary, an institution established for the sole purpose of preparing men for the priesthood who would serve the Church of Philadelphia. Many dioceses could never accomplish this. They built entire health care systems in the form of hospitals. The people of Philadelphia also inspired tens of thousands of their daughters and sons to enter the religious life in various religious orders who on their own built and staffed many of these schools, hospitals, and special care facilities. Religious orders such as the Oblates of St. Francis, the Franciscans, the Jesuits, the Sisters of St. Joseph, the Vincentians, the Sisters of Mercy , the Redemptorists, the Sisters of the Immaculate Heart of Mary, the Grey Nuns, the Christian Brothers have served our Archdiocese for years. Over the decades, **Catholic Charities**, through the incredible generosity of the people, enabled and empowered the Archdiocese to establish specialized agencies tasked with the responsibility of addressing the needs of dozens of groups who had no one to advocate for them; no one to support them; no one to represent them. They established orphanages for abandoned children and children from broken homes; they founded specialized homes for young people who struggled with disciplinary issues; separate homes for both girls, boys and adults who suffered serious mental issues or physical handicaps from the time of their birth {e.g., the blind and the deaf} and were way beyond the skills of their parents. They did this during a long period when there was very little offered by the State. All of this is part of the heritage of the lay people of the Archdiocese; they were your great grandparents, your grandparents, your parents, and now you! It is your heritage.....your legacy and you should be very proud of it. Through depressions, recessions, World Wars, periods of social unrest and a Cold War, they never failed

to look after those who couldn't fend for themselves. Most of them did this when they were struggling with their own financial problems.

As a person who benefitted from such faithfulness, trust and generosity for ten years at St. Charles Seminary [1967-1977] and as one who has witnessed thousands of vulnerable children, adults and families protected and helped to have a dignified life, **I ask you to be as generous as you can**. This is A Test

I used to wonder how God could lie to Abraham about sacrificing his son Isaac. But the story begins by telling us God put Abraham to the test. Abraham himself seems to know it's a test. Apparently, I'm the only one fooled by God.

I don't know if I would have passed the test. I would have at least argued with God about it, begging him to spare my son. Yet in our second reading, St. Paul reminds us that God did not spare his own son. (Rom 8:32) He passed his own test. Jesus was sacrificed so that God could show us how much he loved us. If God loves us so much that he gives his Son to die for us, why would he not forgive us? He doesn't. But he is still testing us.

What does that tell us about life? You may have noticed that things don't always go your way. Does that mean those tragedies are our fault? No, God gives everyone free will and some people choose to do wrong. God intervenes sometimes and lives are saved. Other times, God intervenes by saving us after death with our resurrection. As long as people doubt God's love, there will be tests. That's why it is so important to proclaim the Kingdom: so that someday all people will know God's love and not need to be tested.
