Pastor's Corner! July 18, 2021

During the summer, numerous families or groups of friends will often host a summer “Christmas” celebration. Most people enjoy them, because it is novel. Call me Old School, but those celebrations don’t attract me, because Christmas is so special to me that I associate it not only with December, but with the weather, the climate and the darkness of the winter. Somehow, celebrating Christmas during a heat-wave or on a deck in shorts and flip-flops just doesn’t do it for me. However, that’s me and I don’t want to be a downer on any of you who enjoy these summer celebrations. What triggered this little editorial was today’s First Reading from the Prophet Jeremiah. The quotation he includes with his prophecy is an important one that is invoked during the Season of Advent. “Behold, the days are coming, says the Lord, when I will raise up a righteous shoot to David, as King he will reign and govern wisely, he shall do what is just and right in the land.” All of Christianity interprets this quote as a reference to the coming Messiah; namely, Our Lord, Jesus Christ. It is a foretelling of the transformative effect which the Messiah will have on the Israel and the peoples of the world. Regrettably, many of the religious peoples of the world misinterpret this quote, in that they presume that the Messiah will accomplish all of this on His own; that, as God’s children, we need only to stay out of the way and watch. Is that how love-relationships work: one party does all of the giving, all of the sacrificing, all of the initiating; while the other party does all of the receiving, all the enjoying, never getting off their spiritual couch to respond and share the other’s selflessness? If we seriously reflect on Our Lord’s actions from last week’s and this week’s Gospels, we must realize, that as Messiah, this is not His vision of how people are to be in relationship with their God....their spiritual parent! What does He do? Last week, he impresses upon the Apostles {who represent us} that they must cultivate the compassionate love within their own hearts, which he exercises with all of the people whom they encounter each day. Today’s Gospel is a perfect example of it. Our Lord and the Apostles are exhausted by the marathon pace which Jesus has set for them over the preceding weeks. They need a break and some time to be refreshed. As they get off their boat, thinking that their mini-vacation is about to begin, they encounter hundreds of people, who literally walked around the shores of the

Sea of Galilee to find him and place their needs in His hands. “When he disembarked and saw the vast crowd, his heart was moved with pity for them for they were like sheep without a shepherd; and he began to teach them many things.” Regardless of whether it is July or December, this is what Christmas is about and what we are called to extend to all of the people in our lives. My brothers and sisters, we live in a culture, where, most people do not even know they need a Messiah, never mind knowing what kind of Messiah they need. We are the ones whom Our Lord sends. We are the ones whom He asks to get off the boat, when it seems that He and everyone else is asking too much of us. Like the crowds who seek out Our Lord, there are people in our world who are belatedly discovering/owning the truth that there is a God; that He has been loving them, and that the reason for their unhappiness is that they have been letting Him do all of the loving and they have been doing all of the taking. Now, they want to change, but they don’t know how to go about, nor do they know what kind of person they need to become in order to keep this glow they experienced when they listened to the words of this holy man from Nazareth. Sometimes, the honor of loving people can be intimidating; it asks so much of us.....truly, it asks everything of us. Let us always trust, that when we dare to be like Our Lord; when we dare to love as Our Lord, we will have no regrets, but only the satisfaction of being an extension of him.
