Pastor's Corner! March 7, 2021

During Lent, the Church offers us the option of choosing from two sets of Readings: The 1st set is the traditional readings established for Lent. The 2nd set are readings are geared for those participating in RCIA programs. As we did last year, we will do this year and reflect on the 2nd set of Readings, the Readings geared for those in the RCIA. These Readings, especially the Gospels, are rarely heard during the normal cycle of readings; yet, they are moving stories, because they reflect on people, who were on their own journey of *conversion*. This year there is no one from St. Lawrence Church preparing to be received into the catholic Church. I am excited to report that a young woman approached me a few weeks ago and expressed her desire to become a Catholic and will be enrolled in our 2021-22 RCIA program. All of us should be so excited for her. If you know of anyone who has shown an interest or inclination towards becoming a catholic, encourage them to look into it. Encourage them to give me a call, and I can offer them both information about our RCIA program, in admission to our approach to their journey should they choose to enter into it. There are hand-outs in the vestibule of the church that offer "starter" information. Let us return to the today's Gospel, the story about *Jesus and the Woman at the Well*. There are many subtle insights into this story, but I would suggest that we focus on the following:

Mark tells us that she is a Samaritan; someone who has a prejudice against Jews; a people whom Jews are just as prejudiced against. They won't even acknowledge the presence of each other, never-mind speak to one another. She expects to have a negative experience with Jesus, simply because "he is one of them". She is also a person who has a lot of spiritual baggage, in terms of having had multiple relations/spouses over the years. This is why she comes to the well during the hottest time of the day. She doesn't want to deal with the prejudices of her own people. Because of all of this, chances are she doesn't have much self esteem and probably doesn't think God does either. All of this argues for the belief that she is beyond reach of God's love. Because she has not lived in a way that is acceptable to either God or her people, she would appear to be a hopeless person. It would also seem that she has spent years building a spiritual wall around herself that neither she or Jesus can break-down.

Notice that Our Lord succeeds in this, because He doesn't allow his heart to be prejudice against anyone; regardless of how perfect or imperfect they are. When he encounters her, he sees a sister in need of healing; he is not distracted by things that aren't important; namely, that she is a Samaritan, a woman, a person who has spent a good part of her life ignoring her religious beliefs and morals. Jesus only sees her wounds, and knows that with patience, wisdom and a respect she can be inspired to contribute to the healing of those wounds, if only she just make the effort to be honest with herself and cooperates with Our Lord as he guides her through this conversation.

Notice too, that once she allows Jesus to help her to unburden herself of all the junk in her life; she instinctively becomes a disciple.

Liberated, she goes back into town and tells everyone who will listen of her experience and she invites them to join her as she returns to Jesus.

My sisters and brothers, the *Woman at the Well* story is not just her story; nor is it the story of anyone who is not a Christian or Catholic; it is everyone's story. It is our story because, like her, each of us are still on our journey to the Father, with the help of His Son. At the heart of that journey is the call to *conversion*. This is the purpose of Lent. It is a time when we look for Our Lord and allow him to draw us into conversations we probably don't want to have. Yet, if we respond with the humility of the unnamed woman at the well in Sychar, we will discover how He alone has the Love to unburden us of our troubles. It is the 3rd week of Lent. Let each of us look for Our Lord and be ready when He asks us for that drink of water.
