Pastor's Corner! May 16, 2021

All three of this Sabbath's scripture readings hold much for us to reflect on. However, I would like to focus on the second reading from the First letter of John; particularly, the final two sentences. "We have come to know and believe in the love God has for us. God is love, and whoever remains in love remains in God and God in him." All three readings make reference to Jesus' public life, to the "Spirit", to "Truth". Whether we realize it or not, all three of these dynamics are linked by the virtue of Love. For the Apostles and the early Christian communities, discipleship could always be reduced to the most fundamental of virtues: **LOVE!**

In our culture, *Love* is often referenced to the point of abuse. Many people associate it with anything that feels good or that doesn't object to choices and behaviors which are wrong. To think this, is to accept the belief that a loving person doesn't have to be accountable; one merely means to *intend* good. Those choices revolve not only around what one does, but also around what one chooses not to do. The early generation of Christians, whose memories of Jesus were still fresh in their minds and hearts, understood this. They were so impressed with the Spirit of Jesus' Love, that they courageously imitated it in their everyday lives in the midst of brutal persecutions that went on for decades. Through their faith, they believed that "the Father sent his Son" to the world. When they experienced the Son in all His humility, patience, compassion and courage, they had no doubt how much they were loved by the Father. "They had come to know and to believe in the love God has for us." Once they came to this realization, there was no confusion as to how they should live their lives or for whom. "God is love, and whoever remains in love remains in God and God in him."

My sisters and brothers, a new week lies before us. It will be filled with all kinds of responsibilities, experiences and obligations. This new week will involve people we know and love; it will also involve people who are strangers to us or who are indifferent to us or worse, do not have our best interest in their hearts. Some of these things we will be able to control; others will involve things we can't control. What you and I must ask ourselves is how will I respond to them? Maybe, the needed response will be for us to step toward them when they are not at their most attractive. Maybe they might need for us to exercise great patience and listen to them. Maybe the situation might require that we turn the other cheek. Will my response reflect the

Father's *Love*? Somehow, will each of the people involved in these encounters step away realizing that they just experienced or benefitted from God's love? Will they be as inspired to be more God-like after they experience the goodness of Our Lord, that only you could have given them.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Today's celebration varies from place to place. In some parts of the United States, people gather for the Seventh Sunday of Easter, while other places celebrate the Ascension of the Lord. Several years ago, regions of bishops were permitted to decide whether to retain Ascension Day on Thursday, the fortieth day after Easter, or to move the celebration to the nearest Sunday. This new flexibility in the Christian calendar has to do with the desire to gather the Church to celebrate its central feasts fully, and with the Eucharist. Increasingly, as priests serve remote and scattered parishes, this is not always possible mid-week.

The Ascension is a key moment for grasping what life in Christ is all about. It is not about a departure, but rather a plan for presence. We who are nourished by the Lord's body and blood in the Eucharist are transformed to be his abiding presence in the world. That is a truth so worth celebrating that we can adjust our calendar in order that the fullest possible gathering of the Church can be achieved.


