

## Pastor's Corner! May 23, 2021

Understandably, the story of Pentecost catches a lot of people's attention, regardless of whether one is a believer, indifferent to God or an atheist. Everything within the Pentecost story speaks of **P-O-W-E-R**. There's the powerful wind that blows through the *Upper Room*. Then there are the "tongues as of fire" that appear over the Apostles' heads. Then, the Apostles were filled with the Holy Spirit; they "began to speak different languages." Most impressive of all, is that the Father was returning to the very people who had betrayed his Son, and still offered them His love. Nevertheless, there is one aspect of this story that most people overlook and which is just as important; namely, that the Apostles had not given up...they may have run, but they did not run away. They stayed together and waited for Our Lord's next move. They were a wounded community; definitely a flawed community, but the only way God's *Holy Spirit* would come to them was as a **C-O-M-M-U-N-I-T-Y**, as a believing body. How effective do you think God's Holy Spirit would have been if He had to track each of them down individually? It is an essential part of Catholic theology and spirituality that one of the essential ways in which we encounter Our Lord is within Community. Faith is built together. Faith is strengthened together. Imperfect faith can only be healed together. Faith does not come into existence or thrive in a vacuum. Certainly, there is an important place for our personal relationship with God, but what anchors that personal relationship is how we encounter Our Lord within a faith community. We speak of the "Community of believers", "Community of Saints", "the College of Cardinal/Bishops". When issues of our beliefs and teachings arise, our Bishops meet as the successors of those original Apostles who met in the Upper Room on Pentecost Sunday, i.e., as a Community. Like the Apostles in the pre-Pentecost weeks, they stay together as long as necessary until the Holy Spirit helps them to get it right. It is our belief that God speaks and empowers us best when we pray and act together. This is how we understand God's command to Moses and the Israelites through His commandment to "Keep holy the Sabbath". He doesn't need to hear from us; it is we who need to stay close to Him! It is wrong for us to be unavailable to Our Lord's Holy Spirit by not coming together, praying together, listening to Him together.

There are circumstances which prevent some sisters and brothers from being able to join the community: poor health, inability to drive or be driven and distance. Certainly, the present dangers of the Covid-driven Pandemic are serious reasons. Has not our experience of the limitations caused by the Pandemic taught us how poor and malnourished we are when we are unable to gather with each other in Faith through our celebration of the Eucharist? Our celebration of the Eucharist is not some kind of sentimental trip down *Memory Lane*; rather it is our common effort to return to Calvary, the Tomb, the Upper Room, waiting, watching, hoping, praying for the Lord's presence. Each time we do, we are affirmed by each other's Faith.

So, my brothers and sisters, let us not look past how critical our life as a parish community is, especially as it is anchored by its celebration of the Eucharist. Despite our short-comings, we contribute to the health of our spiritual family by how much we live the Eucharist. When we do, we will enrich the faith of those in our Parish and in the larger Church; and we, in turn, will be enriched by their faith. That is the Divine **power** which our world hungers for, but all too often is afraid to believe in.

### **TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION**

The roots of today's "birthday of the Church" are in an ancient Jewish festival of springtime harvest, seven weeks after Passover. Now, seven weeks after Easter, our great fifty days of rejoicing come to an end. In the countries where the Church first came to life, this is a time of harvest, and the first fruits appear: apricots and lemons, cherries and strawberries. Even in our gardens, herbs are abundant and asparagus, that close relation of the Easter lily, comes fresh to our tables. The earth is laden with so much new life, and that has always been a sign to Christians of Easter's glory. Pentecost means "fifty" and our fifty days of Easter joy are complete. This Sunday is a day to savor the glory of Easter once more: picnics and cookouts, walks by the water, time in the garden—are all ways of extending the feast. Notice the paschal candle today, still burning during Mass. Our Easter celebration now complete, the candle will soon be moved to a place near the baptismal font, and be lighted at baptisms and funerals as a silent witness to Christ's abiding presence.


