Pastor's Corner! November 1, 2020

All Saints Day!

On this weekend, we celebrate ***The Feast of All Saints!*** The history of the Church is rich with the lives of specific women & men whose efforts to embody the life of Our Lord grabbed everyone's attention. They were and are inspirations. In fact, the extent of their efforts to put Our Lord's teachings into action was so profound that their names, backgrounds and accomplishments have been passed on from generation to generation; the presence of God in their lives simply couldn't be ignored.

Nevertheless, there is a second group, of saintly people which the Church also feels must be recognized. They are a much larger group and are largely anonymous; yet, they are individuals, whose lives were characterized by quiet and simple effort to model themselves after the Master. They were characterized by humility, a silent courage, plus a willingness to always put the needs of others before themselves. They were persons of prayer and simple piety. They were persons centered in the Eucharist, and they never drew attention to themselves. Who are these people? As I said, so many of them we never knew. They were the millions of Christians who refused to deny their Christian faith whether that was in the Colosseum of Rome; in far off lands as religious & lay missionaries; in Nazi concentration camps. They were in political prisons of the Communist, or has happened in recent years in the Mid-East, martyred at the hands of ISIS. Others, we knew and know. They are friends, teachers, parishioners and especially family members. We may have recognized something special about them when they were alive, but often, it was only after they had returned to God and we were celebrating their eternal life during their funeral Mass, that we recognized the extent of their choice to be a holy person. It was only then, when we are sharing stories about them and grieving their absence that we realized, that here was a person who was such a gift. Would we not make the observation that they "were a Saint"? The ***Feast of All Saints*** is about them!

All of this leads us to an important question, a serious question. "What about me?" What am I doing with the gift which an Apostle or Grand Mother or Uncle left me? Do I dare attempt to be as patient or forgiving or generous with my heart for those around me like they were? There holiness stemmed from a basic choice to be a person of daily prayer and to center their lives in the Sacraments of

the Eucharist & Reconciliation. We may have laughed about their little holy book crammed with dog-eared Holy Cards which contained short prayers on the back-side; the rosary beads that were always in his pocket or her purse, or the Novenas they prayed; yet, they were ways in which they connected with their Lord. How are we grounding our lives in a serious effort to become holy? Basically, in what way do I make time with the Lord? Each of us are called to become a saint; this is not an option! Becoming holy is not easy; but, it is not complicated either. It doesn't require great intelligence; what it does require is a willingness to be genuine, to be humble and to believe that Our Lord is the true source of happiness in both this World and the next! Perhaps that is the greatest gift which these loved-ones have given us; namely, the gift of their example and their convictions. One last thing! We must trust, that we are not alone in our spiritual journey. We have them....the Holy Ones! They are just as present to us from Heaven as they were present to us when we were spending time with them in the kitchen, in the car or in church.

SAINT MARTIN DE PORRES (1579-1639)

November 3

An old illustration pictures Martin de Porres, finger to his lips—"Shhhh!"—as several mice peek out of sacristy vestment drawers, preparing to join a rodent "procession" following him out of church! Martin's rescue of these unwelcome guests, and statues depicting him, broom in hand, feeding a dog, cat, bird, and mouse from the same dish symbolize his life and sanctity. Initially denied entrance by the Dominicans because of his mixed race (Spanish father, Panamanian mother), Martin cherished society's marginalized. For him, menial tasks, lovingly done, were sacred. Great and lowly alike feasted on his charity. Enemies were reconciled by this "poor mulatto" (his self-description), kind even to those whose racism demeaned him. Apprenticed to a surgeon-barber in his youth—thus patron saint of hair stylists and public health providers—Martin dispensed healing and dignity to Lima's poorest, serving in them the Christ he adored for hours in the Blessed Sacrament. By the time he died, all Peru called him Martin the Charitable, a title even those of us who will never be called "saint" might still aspire to.
