Pastor's Corner! October 17, 2021


Perhaps you noticed it; a basic pattern that has been running throughout many of the Scripture Readings over the last 4-5 weeks. Namely, that Our Lord needs to spend a lot of time reviewing spiritual issues with the Apostles, who should have grasped and embraced that part of their formation a long time ago. They quietly argue among themselves as who should be considered the greatest after Jesus' death {9/19/21}. They are miffed that someone is exorcising demons in Jesus' name without looking to Jesus or them for authorization to perform these acts of love {9/26/21}. Following Our Lord's challenge to the rich young man to sell all his possessions and give the proceeds to the poor and then follow Him, they are seriously discouraged when Our Lord lectures them about the place which wealth should have in their hearts {10/10/21}.

Today, the brothers, James and John, secretly attempt to go behind the Apostles' back, when they approach Jesus requesting, that following His return to heaven, that they be given the ultimate positions of status by sitting on His left and right. Certainly, parents reading this column can empathize with the exasperation and discouragement Our Lord must have experienced and needed to endure. Yet, they must also appreciate the perseverance which Our Lord practices, because that perseverance is driven by *Love* and by their conviction that God's Love will defeat any fears, any hard-heartedness, any resistance. If we were employers, and watched and listened to the Apostles who were applying for employment with God, how many of us would have hired them? What length of time would we have given them following more than two of these incidents? How many of us would have been able to envision each of them becoming the dynamic and powerful spiritual leader which each of them would become?

My sisters and brothers, the example which Our Lord gives us in these Gospels is precious. What makes it precious is His willingness to trust in the virtue of *Perseverance* as a powerful expression of God's love and of the power of that love when we choose to bring it to bear when we are groaning under the weight of circumstances or individuals who seem determined to undermine *good* or prevent it from being introduced in difficult situations. As disciples, each of us is called to bring this expression of God's love to bear in any situation and for any individual who needs it. It is so difficult, because those people are thoroughly convinced that your way is wrong. *Perseverance* as an expression of God's love requires the mental and spiritual

strength of a marathoner. Each of you have your horror stories, past and present. They involve marriage relationships, one of your children, parents, medical issues, unemployment. I'm sure you have the gray hairs to show for it. I hope that among those stories, you enjoy the consolation, that with Our Lord's help, you succeeded in helping that loved-one become whole and more of what we are all called to be; namely, a child of God. **Prayer is critical.** Looking to a particular Saint or to the Blessed Mother is good, but in the end, each of us needs to spend time alone with Our Lord, not only to share with Him what is in our hearts, but to listen to what He offers us from His heart. In the end, each of the Apostles benefitted from Our Lord's *Perseverance*.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

In the eyes of many, the papacy is a peculiar institution. Still bedecked with some of the regalia of medieval princes, contemporary popes have worked to define their role in ways that give them influence over the world both within and outside the Church. The trappings of royalty, never really a good fit for the successors of Peter, could render a pope distant and irrelevant. On the other hand, the tendency of many to think of the pope as if he were the CEO of a modern corporation is also inaccurate.

St. Gregory the Great, himself a pope, first called the pope "the servant of the servants of God." He is "first among equals" among other bishops, who by tradition exercise significant authority within their own dioceses, not depending on the pope's authority. This arrangement often puzzles those accustomed to a top-to-bottom "chain of command." History has seen popes of many styles, but most strive to live up to Gregory's definition. Perhaps today's Gospel puts it all into the best perspective: "Whoever wishes to be first among you will be the slave of all." Pray for the pope this week.
