Pastor's Corner! October 31, 2021

When a scribe asks Our Lord “*Which is the first of all the commandments?*” Quoting from the *Shema*, a collection of morning and evening prayers which fervent Jews pray each day, Our Lord responded, “*Hear O Israel! The Lord our God is Lord alone! You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind and with all your strength. Then Our Lord added “The second is like this: ‘You shall love you neighbor as yourself.’ There is no other commandment greater than these.*” In His day, the spirituality of Our Lord’s generation had become distracted and lost. Many felt that as long as they kept the *Letter* of their religious laws, regardless as their shallowness, that it kept them in good standing with God; that God was almost obligated to accept them, because that was the deal. So many had become indifferent to the *Spirit* of God’s Laws. In their mind, there was no connection between loving God, by loving His children. It wasn’t a question that their hearts weren’t sophisticated enough to grasp this concept; it was a question that they had hardened their hearts, so that they no longer felt obliged to be compassionate, to forgive, to help the hungry, to standup for the weak. No wonder there were so many people during Our Lord’s life time who were suffering; who felt that they were totally alien to their God and that their imperfect lives was worth nothing to Him. Is it any wonder, that the life and teaching of Our Lord gave them new life, a new beginning?

Tomorrow, November 1st, we celebrate *All Saints Day*. On *All Saints Day*, we celebrate those countless and anonymous Christians, who throughout time, chose to love the Lord their God with all their heart, with all their soul, with all their mind and with all their strength; and they understood that they couldn’t do that unless they loved their neighbor as themselves. My sisters & brothers, this *All Saints Day* is not a Holy Day of Obligation, but whether you celebrate this Holy Day by joining us at the 7 PM Mass on Monday evening or not, set aside some time, to reflect on these wonderful women, men and youth. They recognized the linkage between loving God and loving His children. They made it a point that their lives, their choices, their values would be influenced by Our Lord’s love and that they would not be choosy as to who received it. At the end of our lives, wouldn’t that be a wonderful thing to be accused of?

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Every four years, we engage in one of the core activities of our democratic system: a presidential election. Actually, the institution of election can be traced to traditions in the Church, and although bishops are no longer chosen in this way, abbots and abbesses (heads of monastic communities) have almost always been elected by full voting members of their communities. The lifetime appointment begins when the monks or nuns are gathered in “chapter” at the death or resignation of the abbot, and fortunately for all involved, campaigning is not allowed! The members of the community discern, with prayer to the Holy Spirit, who among them is the best suited for leadership. Once chosen, the new leader requests the blessing of the local bishop, who usually presides at a ceremony of consecration or investiture. The ballots are always secret, and a simple majority must be achieved.

In our American system the Electoral College is the determining voice in the presidential election, not the popular election on a November Tuesday, just as the monastic chapter is the electorate. Today, most religious orders elect general superiors in “chapter” by delegates of the professed members, and usually for a term of six years. A few, like the Jesuits, elect for life. At least we don’t have that weight on our shoulders when we choose a president. Four years at a time will do!

Prayer after Communion

The rites following the reception of Communion are very short. It is as if the Church is saying to us that the only way to respond to this great gift is to go forth and live it! But there are some significant rites yet before we are sent forth from the Mass. After Communion, we pray together in silence or sing a hymn; both are ways to thank God for the gift of the Son. Then the priest prays another collect, the Prayer after Communion. This prayer, usually very short, gathers our prayers into one. It reminds us of what we have already experienced: in receiving the Eucharist, we have received a foretaste of the heavenly banquet; we have eaten the bread of angels. This reality, this knowledge, should transform us, so that we may journey through this life with our hearts set on eternal life, and find in the Eucharist—which is food from heaven and daily bread—the strength and hope we need to work toward God’s kingdom of justice here and now.
