Pastor's Corner! July 13, 2025


Some Scriptures are challenging to understand throughout the Bible, but many more are straightforward and mystery-free—today's Gospel is one of them. The scholar of *Jewish Law* is accustomed to looking for difficulties where there aren't any. On the other hand, our Lord is determined to demystify a person's relationship with God, making it less intimidating, less stressful, and generally revealing the Father exactly for who He is: approachable, generous, and loving. In today's Gospel, Our Lord uses one of His most memorable Parables: The Parable of the Good Samaritan. In twelve sentences. He re-institutes the central belief of Judaism, which holds that God is Love. and because He is, He loves all He creates, including Gentiles. Secondly, because He loves each of us unconditionally, He expects that, as His children, we will love each person unconditionally, regardless of how difficult it is. The Samaritan displays this beautifully. In caring for this victim of violent bandits, every minute he spends caring for the victim he exposes himself to the very same danger from the very same criminals, whatever schedule he was on, is ruined when he stops to care for this man; the victims soil his garments

sweat and blood; he gives up the convenience of riding on his own donkey, walking so that the victim does not need to walk in the heat of the day; he must seek out an Inn to put this victim up for a number of days; he pays the Inn Keeper in advance in cash for the care of the victim; we never hear one word or gripe of complaint for his inconveniences; he draws no attention to this great act of compassion; and finally, he does all of this for a person whom he was taught to reject, because he was a Jew.

My brothers and sisters, there is no mystery here, and anyone who finds mystery in this teaching is no better than "the scholar of the law". Our Lord's teaching is clear.... we have no right to abandon anyone in need of God's compassion...... No Right! It doesn't matter what their background is, their level of education, political party, sexuality, religion, their economic state, what school they attend or graduated from, their ethnic or racial background, whether their pregnancy is outside of marriage, whether they have mocked or rejected our Catholic beliefs, whether they have withheld God's love from others, or what level of inconvenience their troubles cause us. We may not be able to do everything for them, but we always have a responsibility to make

ourselves available to them in whatever way we can, and, we do this because we remember how often and in how many ways, God has loved us. It may not be convenient or pleasant or "clean"; we might feel all alone or abandoned by others who are bystanders. But, if we have the Faith, we say we have, we won't suffer from a short memory, and we will remember Our Lord's words, "Go and do likewise!"

It sounds so elitist but isn't intended to be. Choosing to become a Catholic is a Big Decision. It is a big decision because it involves a *commitment*, a word that usually scares the begeebees out of people.
