Pastor's Corner! January 5, 2025

Once more, we are treated to another beautiful and powerful Christmas Gospel, this time from St. Matthew, as he recounts the story of the Magi's search for Messiah and their visit to the Holy Family. A lot is going on in this story, which we should reflect on. #1 The Magi are internationally respected men, including by the Jews. Normally, people, including people of power, come to them, not them to others. #2 For all of their intelligence and influence, they are humble men who believe in God and that everyone, including themselves, should respect and heed God's wisdom and direction. This explains their exhausting search for the Child Jesus in a land where their religious beliefs are not taken seriously or appreciated. #3 They travel a long, long distance during their search, at their expense and through a wilderness that is notoriously dangerous because of bandits, who would not hesitate to kill them for whatever valuables they were carrying on their camels. #4 They bring extremely valuable gifts, which are given only to those of great honor and power who are perceived worthy of them.

Just as in St. Luke's version of the Holy Family's visit by the Shepherds, where the reader focuses on the Shepherds and not so much on the Messiah or Holy Family, St. Matthew draws our attention to the Magi. Why? Because the shepherds and the Magi were stereotyped. The prejudices of St. Luke's and St. Matthew's culture projected the Magi as people unfamiliar with God, incapable of being in a relationship with God, and therefore rejected by God. For all of their courageous efforts to follow the teachings of Jesus, the communities of St. Luke, and especially St. Matthew, sometimes struggled with being flexible when it came to those "who were different." They would forget that the very reason the Master got into so much trouble with the religious authorities was that He insisted that everyone is a child of the Father. Because they were, they deserved every chance to be received into the family of believers. This didn't mean Christians had to water down their understanding of Jesus and His teachings. Still, it did mean that every one of them had a responsibility to patiently and humbly respect where "non-believers" were during their own journey to God, especially if it was obvious that their search was genuine. In some ways, I am embarrassed by the Shepherds and the Magi because they are innocent; they trust that everyone appreciates their efforts to discover Him and that they will be patient while they are in the midst of

their search, many times of which would go off in the wrong direction.

My brothers and sisters, we live in times when people of any religious faith are frequently stereotyped. Because of that, they suffer from the prejudices of those who refuse to acknowledge the fundamental goodness of their religious beliefs. It's hurtful. Yet, the example of Our Lord is to be patient and forgiving of such people and their behavior. How many of us can say that none of our children, grandchildren, nieces, nephews, siblings, or spouses aren't the Shepherds and Magi of our family? Every day, let us ask Our Lord for the humility and patience to maintain our relationship with those who are skeptical about what Our Lord can bring to their table. As difficult as it sometimes is, let us ask Our Lord always to welcome them to our stable so that, like the Holy Family in Bethlehem, they may experience the presence of the infant Messiah in our patience, our effort not to judge or reject, but always to make sure they know they are welcome in our heart regardless of how perfect or imperfect they may be.
