<u>Pastor's Corner!</u> November 9, 2025 Dedication of the Lateran Basilica

What is all this fuss about buildings in today's Readings? Both the ancient Jews and Catholics felt strongly about the magnificent Temple in Jerusalem, as every Christian feels about their church. After all, when all is said and done, they are only bricks & mortar, steel, tile, paint, glass, and art. What is it that gives them the importance which we attach to them, as well as to every church and synagogue, where a spiritual family gathers to encounter their God? The answer to that question may vary from person to person and group to group. Still, two common threads run through these powerful attachments to synagogues and churches: one is sentimental, the other is spiritual. Over the last 20 years, the sentimental Thread was one we heard from thousands of people during the two waves of parish and church closures: "This is where I was baptized" ... "Where I received my 1st Holy Communion", "Where my parents were married", "Where we celebrated our grandparents, aunts, uncles, spouses, and close friends' transition from this earthly life to the Eternal Life, which they had always believed in and lived for."

"This is where we all gathered on 9/11!" As it was for the ancient Jews and for us in our spiritual life, our synagogues and churches were — and are — the places that center us. Many people drift away from God during the course of their lives, but when there are events in their lives {good or bad} that are more powerful than them, events that transcend our puny lives, there is an instinct to gather with each other, which kicks in. As the Holy Mountain was the place where the Ancient Jews would go seeking the presence of God

during the arduous journey of their Exodus, so too are our sacred places the places where we journey to encounter God. This is where the 1st Thread intertwines with the spirituality of the 2nd Thread. What is essential to understand is that it is not the building or the place that is important; rather, it is the gathering in mutual Faith that is important... it is that concentration and sharing of Faith, flawed as it might be, that God comes for and will work through. Notice that neither God nor the Israelites needed a building to encounter each other while they were wandering for years in the desert. What was essential and is a genuine faith in His goodness, a sincere effort not to waste His goodness; an effort to surrender to the changing effects of His goodness, and most importantly, exercising the courage to share

My sisters and brothers, I don't know if you notice it, but over the last couple of years. there are more and more people visiting St. Lawrence Parish in the effort to celebrate the Eucharist each Sunday; they are searching.....searching, not for a place, but for a spiritual family in which they can plant their spiritual roots and encounter Our Lord. More and more of them are coming back every weekend. It's not because we have a breathtaking church; it is because they are encountering God through the simplicity and genuineness of our efforts to live the Gospel. We are not perfect; we cannot claim to be sinless. But within our parish community, I think they have found a spiritual family that is comfortable with God and that is not afraid to share that comfort with others. It is not the simplicity of our building; rather, it is the simplicity of the Faith of its people. Your Brother in Christ,
