Pastor's Corner! July 28, 2024

You're right if today's First Reading [2nd Book of Kings] and Gospel [John] have the scent of Holy Week. They might not be the exact Scripture Readings that are used during Holy Week, but each of them anticipates the Holy Eucharist, which Our Lord instituted at the Last Supper on Holy Thursday. The celebration of the Eucharist is many things: it is a blessing from God and a gift from God; in a mystical way, it captures Our Lord's good news and His challenge to you and me to live out that good news. The Eucharist enables us to return to the Last Supper, to accompany Our Lord in the Garden as He is arrested, and to ask ourselves if we would have identified with the Master while he was on trial before Pilate. Each celebration of the Eucharist reminds us that if we dare to become like the Lord, there will be arresting mobs in our lives who reach out for us. The Eucharist is our opportunity to respond to our own Calvaries; it challenges us with the question, "Would I have had the strength to identify myself with Him, or would I have fled like to the Apostles." And when we fail to respond with the faith of Our Lord, the Eucharist also reminds us that, with God's help and

because of His unreasonable love, we can renew our efforts again. The Eucharist is also the opportunity to experience Our Lord's desire to heal. The Eucharist brings us, with our shallow efforts, back to the Upper Room with the hiding and shamed Apostles on Easter Sunday morning.

Above all, the Eucharist is something that is lived. It is a meal, but not a buffet! The Eucharist is not something where we pick what we like and find enjoyable and pass on what we are uncomfortable with. That is not discipleship!

Today's Scripture Readings provide us with one more wonderful aspect of the Eucharist: being in a relationship with Our Lord as a Loving Parent. Like a loving parent (I am thinking Mother), She loves us enough to feed us. She knows what we need to feed on. And She knows better than we do when we need to be fed. The only thing we need to do is accept her condition: What we need is true nourishment. Where we will find her table to be nourished. With whom do we share that nourishment? The Eucharist is not for the finicky; it is for those who are serious about God, who are grateful for His love, and who accept the truth that He knows what is best for us. Notice that through the Prophet Elisha and through His son, Jesus, God feeds his

people during impossible situations. In Elisha's time, a prolonged regional drought had caused incredible starvation. In the case of Our Lord, the mountain where the people tracked Him down was in the wilderness. Whatever food and water they had carried were certainly consumed before the end of that day. Yet, their hunger for God was so strong that they would risk anything and everything to acquire it. There was no way God was going to allow his children to be without that love for one more moment. This is the point of both these stories. God's love for us is so serious and genuine that he will always be there for us when we are spiritually starving. If only we could go to Him and trust in what, when, and where He would provide it. My brothers and sisters, in good times or bad times, whether in times when we are spiritually starving or feasting, let us always seek out His life, His correction, His direction, His healing, and above all, His nourishment, which we can only find in our celebration of the Eucharist and in our living of the Eucharist.
