#### Pastor's Corner! September 28, 2025

Following the conclusion of the 2nd World War in the Pacific, my father was discharged from the Navy, and within a few months of returning home to Delaware County, was able to land a good job with the Rehms Company, a Philadelphia company. During WWII and immediately following it, Rehms benefitted from several military contracts; their future looked secure. However, as frequently happens following many wars, the national economy started to suffer, and Rehms was forced to consolidate its operations out of the State. They didn't inform their employees until the day they were going to shut the factory down. On that day, my father suffered a severe hernia, which required surgery and rehab. At the time, I was probably in 2nd grade. Before all this happened, two brothers, who, like my father, had been recently discharged from the U.S. Navy from their service during the War in the Pacific, had approached my father about working for them. They were starting a machinist company, working out of their father's garage. Because my father was happy working at Rehms, he declined. The day my father lost his job at Rehms, he called the two brothers and asked if their offer was still there. It was. On top of that, they told him the job was his once he was cleared from his surgery, which was in the mid-50s. By the mid-70s, their tiny business would morph into a multimilliondollar company.

There are tens of thousands of people who suffer terrible misfortune and never have the good fortune of my father or those two brothers. The parable in today's Gospel touches on such misfortune, particularly in the person of Lazarus. We are never offered an explanation for his poverty, nor the ailments that usually follow close behind those who are so poor, which inevitably affect their diet, their stamina, their appearance, and ultimately their failing health. All we know is that Lazarus can no longer fend for himself and needs the kindness and unselfishness of others. Our Lord contrasts Lazarus with the "rich man", who wants for nothing. Financially, the rich man could probably care for dozens, maybe hundreds of Lazarus' if he chose. Instead, the rich man decides to cling to his wealth, with its excellent food, clothing, and status.

What a contrast to the two good brothers, who probably didn't have any more cash in their pockets than my father did the day he lost his job. Cruelest of all, the rich man won't even acknowledge Lazarus' existence by allowing him to eat the scraps of food that fall from his table. Proof of how utterly desensitized the rich man has become by his wealth, he is prevented from gaining the slightest relief from his eternal punishment with just a drop of water. When he asks God to get Lazarus to do the work, he still sees Lazarus as beneath him.

My brothers & sisters, this parable is meant for us. Let us not forget the victim, Lazarus, and let us not forget the

lesson of the rich man. The person who refuses to presume the goodness of every needy person, to respect them, and who refuses to take responsibility for their care will suffer the same withholding of love from God at the end of time. In our culture, it is very easy to gloss over people's suffering, to resolve their dilemma by saying "they need to get a job". For most of us, our understanding of their troubles is intellectual, not a physical experience. Mass Media can inform us of these troubles, but it is unable to convey everything about the experience of poverty. We must make the effort to be present to them, where they can look us in the eye, where we can see their poverty, smell their poverty, and come to appreciate what it is like for the impoverished to go to sleep and wake up with their hunger. If we are careless, we can unwittingly become exactly like the rich man who ceases even to be aware of suffering when it was beneath his very feet. Indeed, the suffering of just one person, never mind hundreds of thousands, can be overwhelming to the point where we don't know what to do or where to begin. You and I may have many people and circumstances to pray for and bring to Father Abraham. Still, each of us must make the effort to own the responsibility to care for the poor, the sick, the hungry, the marginalized, the humiliated, and the powerless. You and I may not have created their poverty, but we can surely contribute to their relief. Ir. Miller John
