#### Pastor's Corner! August 10, 2025

In His efforts to teach about humanity's relationship with God the Father, Our Lord turns to an experience common to all peoples of His day; namely, the relationship between the wealthy [who had the power of their status and wealth], and the ordinary person of their society, which constituted a good 95+% of their society. Keep in mind that the ancient world was a class society. There were the "haves", and then there were the "have-nots". The haves had absolute power, influence, and authority over the *have-nots*. Many of the *have-nots* might have been free persons, but the lives of most were often influenced and affected by the *haves*. Status was everything! For us, who have never known any political culture but that of a democracy, this is difficult for us to understand and to incorporate into our appreciation of the societies of their time. That is why many of us have a difficult time appreciating Our Lord's choice to use this life experience as an analogy for being in relationship with the Father. Many of us probably wished Our Lord had turned to another analogy to make His point, but He didn't. So, where is the wisdom of Our Lord hidden in this story? The answer to that is that it is found in the very human experience where what starts as a professional relationship, over the combination of a long time, coupled with faithful, genuine and loyal effort on the part of the servant/steward the two parties

come to appreciate the respect, trustworthiness and loyalty to the priorities of the master, to the point where the master never has to look over his shoulder or double check on the efforts of the servant/steward. The master realizes that his servant/steward behaves this way because he respects the master and shares his best interest and that of his family. Crazy as it sounds to some, a bond develops between the two of them and their families. One does something for the other, not because they have to or because that is what society insists on, but because they want to.

"Blessed are those servants whom the master finds vigilant on his arrival. Amen, I say to you, he will gird himself, have them recline at table, and proceed to wait on them.....You must also be prepared for an unexpected hour. The Son of man will come."

Our Lord is telling everyone that when we live, God's love reverses everything; it transforms everything in a way that society is afraid to trust. It is essential to acknowledge that God's love is **not** instantaneous. It's an oxymoron, but God's love is like a corrosive, but a *good* corrosive. When offered again and again to the same person or group, it corrodes the bad, the non-God-like. It transforms that relationship into something it was always meant to be: one characterized by the freedom that comes with both parties *offering* God's love and both parties *receiving* God's love.

My sisters and brothers, let us begin each day with a prayer asking Our Lord to give us the courage and humility to love those around us with His love. Regardless of how scary or useless it might seem, let us ask Him to help us trust in the subtle power.....the "corrosive" power of His love.
