

1957 Chevrolet Bel Air



In 1956, I went to the Girls' State Basketball Tournament in Des Moines where I saw a beautiful red 1956 4-door hardtop Chevy Bel Air in a used car lot and I fell in love with her (Ahhh-Neil's first love). I came home after the tournament and told Dad about it. A week later Dad told me that we were going to Oxford where there was only one car in the showroom. It was turquoise with a white top, 4-door sedan. I told Dad that I like the color but I would prefer to order a 4-door hardtop instead. It was \$40 more than the sedan. I asked Dad if I could have the power pack engine with dual exhaust, dual rear antennas, fender skirts, and dual mirrors on the front fenders (cool for the day with dice on the inside mirror). One hour of calculating went by and the salesman said it would be \$2,300. Then Dad ordered it. (Mom ordered a new accordion that same year and it cost \$2800. I still have her accordion).

In one month we got the car and I was driving it to school. I drove her to the Dance Mor Ballroom located in Swisher. Right in front of the dance hall I squealed and burned rubber for one block to impress my friends. Just outside of the Swisher city limits, a red flashing light popped up in my rear view mirror and the city cop promptly pulled me over. He had me drive back to the front of the dance hall where he gave me a ticket in front of my friends!!! The cop looked me right in the eye and said "Neil you need to put a brake pedal under the accelerator pedal." Karen and I dated in the Chevy and I drove her to Devry Technical school located in Chicago for two years. We got married and drove the Chevy to Yellowstone Park for our honeymoon. We were so poor that we slept in the car on the way out and on the way back from Wyoming.

I sold the "57" Bel Air and bought a 1963 Chevy when we had our family. The automobile I drive now was located 30 years ago at Beckers Salvage on Hyw 30. I brought it home and started restoring it. I had a bunch of parts in the house for restoring the car that I lost when the house caught fire and was destroyed. So I had to find all those parts again in order to start on the restoration. HISTORICAL VEHICLE

Armstrong-Siddeley Sapphire



The Armstrong-Siddeley Sapphire was produced from 1953 to 1958. The six-cylinder 209 cu in engine had hemi-spherical combustion chambers and with the optional twin Stromberg carburetors, which increased the output from 125 to 150 hp, had a top speed in excess of 100 mph. The front suspension was independent coil springs with a rigid axle and leaf springs at the rear. The Girling hydraulic brakes used 11 inch drums all round. The body was available as a four or six window style at the same cost and with either a bench or individual front seats. The seats were finished in leather, with the dashboard and doorcapping's in walnut veneer. A heater was standard. It was introduced with the choice of a Wilson electrically-controlled four-speed pre-selector or four-speed synchromesh transmission. It became available with automatic transmission with the introduction of the Mark II in 1954. Models for export to the U.S. were always delivered with twin carburetors.

Because of limited space in the newsletter for pictures, additional pictures and text will be put up on the recently activated "Face Page". We will also be working closely with the webmaster to incorporate touring events (pictures) that will be displayed on the Website front page slide show and tour drop down menu window.

TOUR ETIQUETTE GUIDE

Touring season will be here soon and the Tour Committee has been very busy planning exciting trips and activities. Tour Planners put a lot of effort into making their event memorable and run smoothly for the participants. The emphasis is on safety, scenery, and a fun driving experience. Please practice the following etiquette to help ensure a great event for everyone.

- Arrive 15-30 minutes before the departure time in order to attend the drivers' meeting and check in with the
 Tour Planner to pick up your tour packet or instructions. Listen to the Tour Planner's instructions, as there may
 be last minute changes to the directions or other important announcements. Fill your gas tank before you arrive.
- The Tour Planner will lead the group, followed by Model A's and other faster antique and vintage cars. Modern cars are welcome on the tour but they must follow at the rear of the tour. If a tour member passes the Tour Planner or splits off from the group, that member will be considered as having left the tour and may or may not be allowed to rejoin. If you need to leave the tour early, please notify the Tour Planner and leave at a rest stop so other cars behind you don't follow you by mistake.
- Be responsible for the car BEHIND you and make sure they see you turn. If you can't see them, slow down and/or consider pulling over at a safe location. Leave a five-car length between cars so on the two-lane roads they can be safely passed by people not in our group. Don't follow too closely and don't lag too far behind.
- Cell phones will be the primary way of communicating during tours. The Tour Planner will compile a list of tour member cell phone numbers and distribute it at the start of each tour.
- Rest Stops will be taken approximately every 60-90 minutes. Depart in the same order as before. Be ready to leave on time after each pit stop or break.
- Participants are expected to carry a reasonable assortment of tools to address minor repairs on the road.
 Tools/spare parts may include tire jack, lug wrench, tire iron, screwdrivers, vise grips, side cutter pliers, hammer, adjustable crescent wrench, band wrench, electrical test light, jumper wire w/alligator clips, radiator stop lead, RTV silicone, rags, electrical tape, duct tape, spare tire, fan belt, fuel filter and hose, WD 40, and a quart of engine oil.

Frank Machek Leaves a Legacy at Camp Courageous Story

written by Jane and Harry Hawley as a tribute to their dear friend Frank Machek



Frank Machek lived within modest means, never allowing himself any creature comforts. His small two-bedroom home with less

than 800 square feet had no updates or modernizations since he moved there with his parents in the 50's. Harry and I gave him a microwave and two chairs for his living room. Our daughter, Michelle, gave him a twin bed to sleep on...all because he would not spend any money on himself (and we thought he could not afford it). He cooked for himself, rarely giving himself the treat of eating out. When Harry and Frank went on car trips and ate at a restaurant, Frank had to ask Harry to order for him because he had no idea what to get. More often than not, Frank would only buy food from vending machines at rest areas because he thought convenience store clerks always cheated him with the change. He did not smoke or drink, and I never heard him cuss. He was a quiet, simple man. Frank was the caretaker of his mother, Teresa, for the last 15 years of her life. He worked the night shift at Rockwell so he could put his mother to bed and return to tend to her during the day. She was unable to care for herself and Frank had to feed, bathe, dress, and toilet his mother. He could not be away from home for more than two hours in order to meet his mother's needs. The day he was discharged from major surgery he drove himself to Jefferson, Wisconsin, walked around a swap meet, and returned the same day just so he could be there to take care of his mother. He never asked for help and never complained. Our family shared holidays and happy times with Frank for the past 20 years. Frank was an only child and had no close relatives so we decided that we would share in his care, help him make decisions about his care, and be by his side as much as we could when he became ill. On Easter of 2017, Frank was very

sick but waited until the following day to ask Harry to take him to the emergency room. He did not want to bother us during our family gathering. Frank was the most selfless person I have ever known. Frank's mother told him he had to leave his money to a good cause. We knew he was leaving some money to Camp Courageous, a decision he had made after a visit to their campus for a car show. Frank was a member of the Cedar Rapids Antique Automobile Club of America and Speedster Club for many years. During his lifetime, Frank owned a variety of antique vehicles. Some he kept and many he fixed up and sold to make a little pocket change. He saw the sidewalks and ramps made for the wheelchair bound kids and decided this was his good cause. We had no idea the amount he was donating until his death. Frank passed away on May 13, 2017. He was 83 years old when he passed, never having any fear of the unknown world of death. He told Harry that they had a good run. Frank was speaking of the many speedster trips they had taken and the antique cars they had painstakingly restored. He wanted none of the cars for himself, but simply the companionship and sharing of common interests with Harry.



Frank had a love for antique motor cars and thus a love for the Cedar Rapids Antique Automobile Club of America. The story of Frank's gift to Camp Courageous was recently shared with this wonderful group. Many of the members are excited to come to Crusin' for Camp Courageous this May and to sometime bring some of there antique motor cars to Camp to give the campers rides.

BELL'S CORNER

A Oldsmobile Trip from a Girls Perspective

Miss Amanda Preuss, of Sacramento, California drove a 1917 Oldsmobile Model 44, eight-cylinder roadster from San Francisco to New York via the Lincoln Highway in 11 days, 5 hours and 45 minutes, establishing a transcontinental record for women. For the next several months we are going on a trip with Miss Preuss touring adventure and see what driving was like from a girls perspective. I predict that her story will interest anyone with a drop of red blood in *his* makeup.

The Adventure Begins

Finally the day came in which I was to set sail for New York City, 3,331 miles away, and to attempt this feat, by myself, in the shortest time possible. Was I ready for this adventure, only time would tell. As I rolled away from the starting line that morning of August 8th, the seriousness of this adventure suddenly came upon me. I realized for the first time, what it was really about, –that I was facing a venture, success in which meant achievement, approval, honor; and that failure meant disappointment and oblivion. Not only my own name, but the name of the Olds Motor Works was at stake, a name worth every effort to sustain. An intense gravity seized me, and from that moment I fought a battle–to win.

The starting miles were uneventful, the beautiful, hard, macadamized roads of California carrying me into Sacramento with ease and dispatch. At the capitol I was received by a delegation of state officials, headed by State Treasurer F. Richardson and a host of my old friends. It was 1:30 pm, before I could tear myself away to set sail for Reno, with the Sierra Nevada's ahead.

As I approached the foothills of the mountains the road became steep and tortuous, going ever upward, from precipice to precipice. Around one curve after another I flew, giving the car more gas every time I glimpsed a little straight stretch ahead. I took some awful chances. However, I had absolute confidence in my car, and so did not hesitate to run any risk.

Passing over the Sierras, I negotiated three snow drifts, the last one at the summit over 7,000 feet above the sea. Coming out of this drift, the road drops 1,800 feet in less than a mile, curving wickedly toward Donner Lake, in the heart of the mountains. Thanks to the car, I negotiated it safely.

From then on it was easy sailing into Reno, where I arrived at 8:15 pm. I had covered 270 mile the first day, including a mountain range 7,000 feet high, which I thought not at all bad.

The next morning I started for Ely, Nevada, passing through the Fallon Sink. It was plough, plough, plough, through heavy sand all the way. At one place, despite the magnificent pulling power of my eight-cylinder motor, which had carried me over the Sierras in high gear, I had to travel fourteen miles in first and second speed.

After passing through Salt Wells, which is merely a gasoline station. Much of this part of my trip was rather tiresome. The country all around looked as though it had been painted with a giant whitewash brush. One alkali bed after another,—and not a living thing to break the monotony.

Five hours of travel in this alkali land brought me to "Frenchman's Camp," consisting of one house and a well. The well bears a sign, "if you don't want to pay for this water, let it alone." This, however, is not as inhospitable as it seems, as the water had to be hauled a great distance.

I myself did not drink the water, as I carried potable water for drinking. I did however, buy water for the car, paying five cents for it. I needed less than a pint to fill the radiator, though I had traveled 150 miles through heat and deep sand.

At seven in the evening I reached Austin, but decided to press on, after buying gas and oil.
