Working Together Program Thrives

The new ROA & ROTC Working Together Program is something special. No other program like this exists in the State of Michigan. It provides ROTC cadets with leadership skills to help them succeed as officers; and presents officers with opportunities to share their leadership experiences with a new

generation of officers and to enjoy continued involvement with old and new military friends.

The idea for the Working Together Program started in April 2024. LTC (RET) Louis Wilson attended the University of Michigan Tri-Service Awards Ceremony and met cadets and cadre. The UM Army ROTC Wolverine Battalion had a new professor of military science (PMS), CPT Louis Goldstein assigned. Informal discussions sparked an idea to bring experienced officers into contact with students. If it was to succeed, the cadets had to have input and ownership of the program. Two cadets, Jonathan Li and Ethan Wilmot, volunteered as points of contact to gather cadet input. They suggested monthly meetings at a day and time that fit the students' class schedules. To allow time to organize, the first meeting was set to take place in January 2025.

LTC Wilson recruited officers to participate. He was greatly helped by BG (RET) Mark Montjar, who contacted several friends, who were also generals. An initial group of 6 generals and 6 field grade officers comprised the group. MG US Army Joseph Marsiglia and several other officers from the Army, Navy and Air Force attended in person. ROA-MI EXCOM members and Naval officers CPT Ventz Potochik and CDR Jim Semerad took part. As several of the officers lived far from Ann Arbor, they were linked to the meetings via ZOOM. The officers provided copies of their military bios. CPT Goldstein provided the UM meeting rooms, ZOOM meeting administration, and coordination with the cadets.

The officers provided informal guidance and wrote reference letters for

admission to civilian graduate and military programs. The ROTC curriculum provides a solid base of technical skills. The Working Together Program provides an additional level of leadership skills in working with people, real world experience, and military careers.

Many positive outcomes resulted for both the cadets and officers. The cadets gained leadership skills and created connections with officers to assist their careers. The officers enjoyed involvement with military friends and shared their experiences to develop future leaders. The ROA may benefit from increased involvement in ROA events with the retention and recruitment of ROA memberships. The program was beneficial and fun for all who participated, and may lead to long term friendships. Selfridge to Be Home to New F-15EX Fighter Mission

Senator Gary Peters released the following article in his email newsletter newsletter@peters.senate.gov.

As someone who had the privilege to drill at Selfridge Air National Guard Base for more than a decade in the U.S. Navy Reserve, and who has fought for years to bring a new fighter mission to the base, I am thrilled to welcome 21 brand new F-15EXs fighter jets to Selfridge. These new fighters will ensure that Selfridge – and Michigan – remain central to our national defense for decades to come.

Selfridge is located close to the worldclass training venues we have in Northern Michi-



gan and home to highly skilled pilots, crews, and maintainers. It has massive economic importance to our state, supporting nearly 30,000 jobs. Selfridge is a top-tier asset to Michigan and our entire country and the ideal location for an advanced fighter mission. That's why I've repeatedly led our state's delegation in meeting with and urging top Defense Department officials across both Democratic and Republican Administrations to replace Selfridge's A-10 mission with a new, long-term fighter mission.

I've also used my position on the Senate Appropriations Committee— the committee responsible for government spending— to push for the funding needed to make additional F-15EX fighter jets for Selfridge, and used my role on the Armed Services Committee to bring home \$28 million for a new aircraft hangar on the base that can house these fighters.

In addition to securing a new fighter mission, last year we announced that the U.S. Air Force selected Selfridge



to host a new, full squadron of 12 brand new KC-46A refueling tankers to replace our eight aging KC-135 refuelers.

Michigan has always stepped up when our country needed us, and Selfridge is the best choice to base these new, next-generation aircrafts. With the help of our partners in the state and Macomb County, I'm proud of the work we've done together to keep Selfridge at the forefront of our national defense. I'm going to continue fighting to secure the future of the base.

Army Establishes New Fitness Test


The U.S. Army announced the establishment of the Army Fitness Test (AFT) as the official physical fitness test of record for all soldiers, replacing the Army Combat Fitness Test.

The five-event AFT, is designed to enhance Soldier fitness, improve warfighting readiness, and increase the lethality of the force. The AFT consists of the three-repetition maximum deadlift, hand-release push-up arm extension, sprint-drag-carry, plank, and two-mile run.

The events are performed in a specific order. The RAND Corporation analysis and Army data from nearly 1 million test records helped to form the new standard.

Phased implementation of the AFT will begin June 1, 2025, with new scoring standards for Soldiers in 21 combat military occupational specialties (MOSs) taking effect on January 1, 2026, for the active component and June 1, 2026, for the Army Reserve and National Guard. The test has two standards: combat and general.

The AFT combat standard is sex -neutral and age-normed. Soldiers serving in combat specialties must achieve a minimum of 60 points per event and an overall minimum score

of 350. Soldiers in combat arms are required to take the AFT – Combat Standard. The AFT general standard is performance-normed by sex and age groups. Soldiers serving in combatenabling specialties must attain a score of at least 60 points per event and an overall minimum score of 300.

T he Army is also adapting its policy framework to support implementation, including support to Soldiers with medical profiles and governance to monitor the impact of the new standard on readiness, retention, and end strength.
