

STOPPER THE PRESSES!!! **AN INTERESTING CLOSURE GETS SCRUTINY BY GREGG WILSON**

Gregg has been busy searching out unusual closures and recently came across this one.

Anyone ... a little help?

I just got this bottle in an eBay auction - I thought it was a strange one by the seller's photos and now with it in hand I'm positive. Not listed by David Graci's book "Soda and Beer Bottle Closures 1850-1910" or on Tod von Mecho's web site www.sodasandbeers.com, even the Bottle Blog www.antique-bottles.net doesn't recognize it (in the Forum section go to "Sodas" and click back to older posts to find it). It is a version of the popular "Lightning" style but beyond that, I'll let the photos do the explanation. There were more than 300 bottle stopper patents awarded in the 1880s alone, so I've got some searching to do!

And after more research he found the actual patent itself and thus was able to classify this unique bottle on which this closure only exists on!

According to Tod von Mecho my stopper bottle will be cataloged as:

Bate Closure, circ: 1875-1880, Occurs on 1 bottle,

Invented by: Wallace H. Bate,

American Patent: September 14, 1875, Number: 167,633,


This patent was awarded to Wallace H. Bate of Norwood, Massachusetts. The approach was to use a cam lever, secured under the lip by a wire, that would force the rubber lined stopper into the mouth of the bottle. This would have been an early competitor to the Lightning stopper, patented a mere 8 months prior. Part of the rights to this patent were assigned to Mathias Radermacher of Boston, who appears to be the sole user of this stopper.











N.D. HILL AND PORT TOWNSEND-WHERE BOTTLES AND BUILDINGS MEET By Scott Gibbons

I had the opportunity to visit Port Townsend this past week and was reminded of some bottle related coolness this town holds. There was a considerable amount of *construction and excavation going on* in the down town area, so who knows what has and is going to be uncovered over the next few weeks. In addition, a really cool building remains that most diggers and collectors of WA state bottles would be familiar with: Nathaniel Davis Hill, or better known as N. D. Hill.


From research on the PTGuide.com website uncovered how this structure and business rose in the community:

"In 1888, at the age of 65, Nathanial Davis Hill undertook the ambitious development of the corner lot at Water & Quincy streets.

One of the two most ornate structures in downtown Port Townsend, this building was designed by noted Seattle architect Elmer H. Fisher. It is principally Italianate in design, but also shows Grecian and Romanesque influences. He designed a skylighted central court, square-headed windows on the lower floors and small-scale Romanesque arches on the top floor. The exterior roof line is well known in architectural circles for its richly decorated eaves with their underlying corbels. Built by Hill, a retired pharmacist, in 1889, at a cost of \$25,000, the building remains a beautiful example of the grace and affluence of early Port Townsend."

Detail of building and street area from Mar 1890 Sanborn Map, available via King County Library Online resources: www.KCLS.org "Hill arrived in the Northwest in 1852, and after a stint of farming and managing an Indian agency on Whidbey Island, he came to Port Townsend. Ultimately he became one of the most successful and well-respected men in the Washington Territory. He was the first manufacturer of medicinal drugs in the area. He was also involved in banking, railroads, saw mills, and telegraph companies. As a territorial representative and county commissioner, Hill became one of the leaders in the drive for statehood.

Hard times fell on Port Townsend in the 1890s, and the Hill family sold the building. Thus began a long period of poor maintenance and neglect. The building was finally placed on the tax rolls, where it remained for many years. In recent times the building has been recognized for its historical importance and is now enrolled on the National Register of Historic Places.

A complete program of renovation and restoration has been undertaken and currently continues. The foundation has been strengthened, the masonry repaired, a new roof has been applied, and a sprinkler and alarm system installed. The interior walls and woodwork have been restored, with close attention to authenticity. The AAA-approved Waterstreet Hotel occupies the entire second floor. It is the result of a 1990 renovation project. The brickwork and metalcraft are considered fine examples of late 19th century craftsmanship."

From reviewing David Bethman's A Pioneer Drug Store, "One of the most prominent druggists of Washington was Nathaniel Davis Hill, of Port Townsend. He was born in Hatboro, Pennsylvania, in 1824. His father, John Hill, was a physician and druggist, and N.D. Hill gained experience in his father's drug store."

After serving in a number of positions of importance, the history of ND Hill as a pharmacist officially begins in 1868 when N.D. moved from Whitbey Island to Port Townsend in 1868 when he took over the J.J. Harned & Co business. Bottles in David's book show a span from 1875-1893, with evolutions in names, type set, colors, and styles.

BOOK(s) OF THE MONTH




This month I feature two new additions to our library, purchased on eBay from a former WBCA member, John Packard.

Ron Fowler's "Washington Sodas - the Illustrated History of Washington's Soft Drink Industry" first edition 1986 published by Dolphin Point Writing Works of Seattle, WA. Superbly researched, this book covers all known sodas (and a few beers) from our state, with as much information on the bottlers and advertising as the bottles themselves. Ron includes very specific information describing the bottles with rarity and values as well. A great read.

Dan & Gail DePasquale and Larry Peterson "Red Wing Stoneware - an Identification and Value Guide" an updated 1990 version of their 1983 printing, published by Collector Books of Paducah, KY. This is a great introduction to collecting the popular Red Wing pottery. Loaded with photos of everything from cuspidors (spittoons to us country folk lol) to 20 gallon jugs, kitchen ware, miniatures and advertising.


