Midship Pipeline Donation

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla. – (Dec. 19, 2024) Midship Pipeline announced today an \$80,000 donation to the American Legion Department of Oklahoma. Local American Legion posts in the eight counties where the pipeline operates will each receive \$10,000 to meet critical needs as the American Legion lives out its mission and advocates for every generation of veterans, service members and their families.

“The American Legion is the largest U.S. veteran’s organization, and the local posts are the heartbeat of what the Legion does,” said Commissioner Brett Martin, American Legion’s representative and chairman of the Oklahoma Veterans Commission. “The local posts across Oklahoma serve the unique needs in their communities and provide essential services and resources to our valued veterans, service members and families. A gift like this from Midship will go a long way in empowering and enabling these eight posts to deliver on the mission of the Legion as they support their communities and Oklahoma’s valued service members and veterans.”

The Midship Pipeline is a 200-mile natural gas pipeline that connects gas production from the South-Central Oklahoma Oil Province (SCOOP) and Sooner Trend, Anadarko Basin, Canadian and Kingfisher Counties (STACK) plays in the Anadarko Basin in Oklahoma to growing Gulf Coast and Southeast markets via deliveries to existing pipelines. The pipeline was placed in service in April 2020 and continues to operate safely and reliably.

Midship has now donated nearly \$900,000 to community organizations and programs across the eight counties it traverses, supporting first responders; agriculture education; science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) initiatives; rural hospitals during the COVID-19 pandemic and community beautification and restoration projects.

“Midship is passionate about supporting the communities in the eight counties the pipeline operates and is honored to make this gift to the American Legion of Oklahoma as it provides vitally important services to Oklahoma veterans and service members who have sacrificed so much for our country,” said Matt Barr, representative for Midship Pipeline. “We recognize the importance of the critical work the Legion does in the communities it serves and hope this gift further empowers them to continue changing the lives of our veteran and service member heroes in Oklahoma.”

Midship worked with the Oklahoma Department of Veterans Affairs and the American Legion Department of Oklahoma to identify eight local Legion posts and help determine where the donations could best be utilized. The posts receiving the \$10,000 gift are Post 5 in Kingfisher, Post 34 in El Reno, Post 54 in Chickasha, Post 23 in Lindsay, Post 55 in Duncan, Post 39 in Durant, Post 164 in Tishomingo and Post 65 in Ardmore.

Rep. Dick Lowe expressed his gratitude in this season of giving.

“Midship’s many investments since its inception demonstrate its commitment to Oklahoma and communities along the pipeline. These timely and generous donations exemplify what a truly impactful community partner they are.”

AWARDS

The links below should give your Posts all the information they need to nominate deserving individuals. There are a few very important things that have to happen along the way. The nominations for the individual awards have to have an endorsement of some type from the nominee's Department Chief before the nomination can be considered. If the Fire Chief, Police Chief, City Manager or VA Department Director say no, it stops right there. Don't argue, don't alienate the Department Head. We don't have to like it, but we do have to respect their decision.

The Deadline for ALL Award Nominations is April 30th. May 1st the Awards Committee starts the selection process. May 1 Nominations cease.

If a post wants to be considered for a Pillars Award or the Post of the Year Awards a hard copy of the Post's, Consolidated Post Report (CPR), must be mailed to the Department Headquarters. The Department does not have the capability to download CPR that are filed electronically. I'm sorry but that is the way it has to be. If your Post wants to be considered for Pillars Awards and Post of the Year recognition, you have to mail a hard copy of your CPR to the Department before their suspense date.

Local residents honor America's military veterans

In December 32 years ago, a wreath maker from Maine named Morrill Worcester decided he wanted to honor veterans with his surplus of wreaths.

Worcester arranged for the wreaths to be placed in the Arlington National Cemetery in an older section of the cemetery that had fewer visitors. According to the Wreaths Across America website, Worcester visited the Arlington cemetery when he was 12 years old, which proved to be "an experience that would follow him throughout his life and career, reminding him that his good fortune was in large part due to the veterans who made the ultimate sacrifice for their country."

In 2005, when photos of the wreath-covered tombstones began to circulate the Internet,

"We are proud to join 3,700 other cemeteries across America and abroad to be part of this tradition," Floyd Branson, commander of the American Legion Post 129, told participants Saturday during the local Wreaths Across America event. "All of us have the same purpose today – to remember, to honor and to teach. Remember the freedoms we enjoy have come with a price. Honor the men and women who pledged to give their lives so we can live in freedom. Teach our children that one day, they may also have to stand against tyranny and oppression."

Carrie Wilhelm said her family learned about Wreaths Across America last year when the nonprofit organization Stillwater Chapter of DeMolay was invited to participate in the laying of the wreaths.

"After the program, I watched my son, Noah, and the other young men from DeMolay carefully lay the wreaths on the veteran's grave, kneel, say the veter-

an's name and have a moment of silence," she said. "It was incredibly touching to see how many volunteers participated. Being a part of Wreaths Across America makes me very proud, especially when I see a younger generation learning about the significance of our veterans and taking the time to honor them."

Wreaths Across America is especially meaningful to Maggie Simms.

"My husband spent almost four years in the Army Corp of Engineers. It is meaningful for me and my family to be able to honor him with a wreath at Fairlawn Cemetery," Simms said. "I lost an Uncle in WWII, and the presentation of the wreath for those missing and killed in action is significant for my family."

Wreaths Across America co-chair Carolyn Gang said it best in closing.

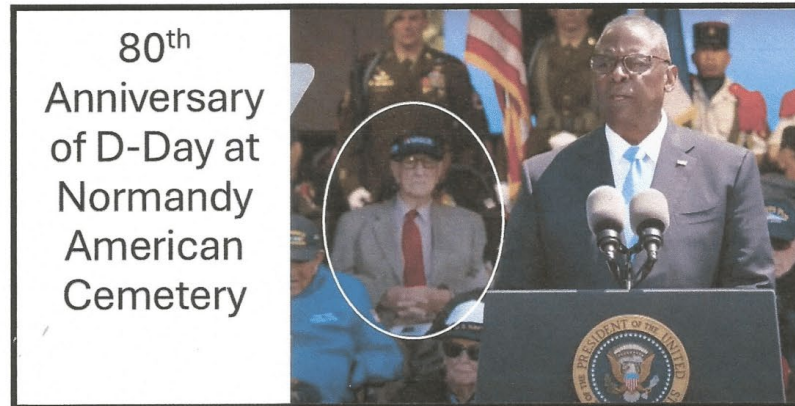
"We are here to remember not death but life," she said. "We are not here today to decorate graves. We are here to remember and to be grateful."
