


FROM THE DEPARTMENT COMMANDER Brett Martin

Team Oklahoma,

It is a new year and we as a Department of the American Legion have gotten our USS Department of Oklahoma back on course and we are picking up speed as we sail into the future together as a great American Legion family. Our future is very bright, thanks to your hard work and dedication. 2023 saw lots of change in our department but change that was necessary for us to stop the nosedive. To date we have not missed one National membership goal. We have 3 new revenue streams coming online in January bringing other revenue sources into our department. We have been operating on our portion of the membership dues and gun raffle profits, but we have been operating at a loss. Since I became your commander, we have completed the first line-item budget review in years and have been operating under our approved budget and only doing things that **benefit all blue hats.** Our 501 (3) (C), Four Pillars of Hope" will come online this January and will open other opportunities that we were not eligible to receive before. We have made lots of personnel changes, but that is a good thing. We will have a new Adjutant, Vice Commander West, and Admin assistant by the 8th of Jan. We are working with the Red Cross and are in the process of getting 2 full-time volunteers to work at Department Headquarters. As an example, the Red Cross volunteers currently run the Tinker Pharmacy and the Air Force has asked them to fill more vital roles across our state. This will ensure our Department Headquarters is on the top of everything and at no additional cost.

We will start the roll out of the new Post computers later this month which will put our department on the leading edge of connectivity! Oklahoma's Boys State Program is ahead of schedule. Our goal of 400 is attainable and I encourage you to send one more boy than your Post sent last year! Our SAL is on the move heading to the top 10 in the nation and if your Post does not have a SAL squadron, please start one in 2024. Our new and improved VSO training will be offering more classes around the state as we push to get 41 Legionnaires their PIV card and put more qualified VSOs in our Post to cover our state!

I hope to see you at our midwinter conference, 25th to the 27th of January, being held at the Embassy Suites located at 3233 Northwest Expy Oklahoma City, OK 73112 (for Reservations Please Call (405) 842-6633) With your room you will get free breakfast and hors d'oeuvres & cocktails. The cost of registration is \$25 for the conference or \$50 for the conference and the banquet. Friday night's banquet will be a Western Themed, please wear your best jeans and boots. Task Force Movement: Less than two years old and growing fast

On Dec. 12, Task Force Movement (TFM) conducted a board meeting at The American Legion's National Headquarters office in Washington, D.C., to get updates on the initiative's longstanding trucking and cyber components and its newest area of emphasis, health care. Updates came from industry, agency, military and veterans groups that have teamed up to close gaps in the labor market with men and women who have served in uniform.

Unions, from those representing public utilities to elevators, continue to be involved with TFM programs and advancing veterans quickly into well-paying career paths. New board member Frank Christensen, general president of the International Union of Elevator Constructors (IUEC), for instance, touted his group's long involvement with the Helmets to Hardhats program and the success the labor organization has had with veteran employees.

The board was updated on several pieces of legislation of interest to TFM and heard reports on each of the three main arms of the initiative.

Trucking: Teresa Watson, director of the Minority Professional Truckers Association, discussed what her group has been doing for independent owner-operators and farmers in the Southeast.

Through a partnership with Cargill, the drivers can access classes on topics like profit/loss statements and communicating with shippers. Watson related instances of owner-operators going into the fields themselves to help farmers bring out their crops, and in 2024 expanded town-hall meetings will include both groups.

Jason Turner, vice president of talent and growth initiatives at ArcBest, described the "tale of two environments" in the trucking field between owner-operators and employees, and announced that 1,000 veterans have been brought into trucking careers through the company's involvement with the DoD SkillBridge program.

Cyber: New TFM Cyber Chairman Dr. Jack Dever, CEO of Lockhaven Solutions, described being "absolutely energized … by the opportunity that's out there" as he has gotten up to speed about veterans who may be coming out of the service with skills needed to fill a shortage of over 700,000 nationwide. He explained that cyber essentially equates to risk management, which touches many industries, including trucking and health care.

Dr. Yashika Neaves, chief of strategic plans and initiatives at the DoD Military-Civilian Transition Office, updated the group on the latest developments in SkillBridge. SkillBridge 2.0 is a combination of traditional training programs for the military-connected community and new ones. The focus is set to shift from credentialing to employment. Program approvals are moving again after a 60-day hold to catch up on the backlog, and Neaves said a new governance structure will bring SkillBridge more visibility, including at VA.

Health Care: TFM Healthcare Chairwoman Emily Haas said she has had many conversations with employers since this component's inception in August, including such heavy hitters as Johnson & Johnson and Northwell. Staffing needs span the industry, from manufacturing and nursing to mental health and caretaking. Conversations with individual states have also begun, she explained.

State relations will be a focal point for TFM overall in 2024, according to Board Treasurer Brandon McPherson, senior vice president of strategy and operations for Warner Music Group. Another will be the pursuit of funding and scholarships from state and national sources; the next three to four months are "our time to shine," he commented, adding that the initiative is "well-positioned" to take advantage of opportunities.

That position is thanks, in part, to board members' involvement in these fields preceding the initiative's introduction in the spring of 2022. TFM Executive Director Elizabeth Murray-Belcaster, president of EMB Consultants, Inc., says the genesis goes back to around 2010, when she and others first noted that servicemembers were coming back from Iraq and Afghanistan to an overall dismal job market – with one notable exception being trucking. That's when the work began that has led to today's TFM components. The American Legion has maintained a steady position of support for advancing veterans into specialized career fields and transferring military training time into credits for certification and licensure in those that require separate training.

TFM Chairman Patrick Murphy told the board that virtual Hiring Our Heroes job fairs, put on by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce Foundation, are set for Jan. 31 and Feb. 21, specifically in the areas of technology, cybersecurity and health care. Military-connected applicants can register for them online. Information on the Jan. 31 event that will focus on technology and cybersecurity can be found here. Information about the Feb. 21 event that will focus on health care can be found here.

Among those serving on the TFM Steering Committee is American Legion Veterans Employment & Education Division Director Joseph Sharpe.

Recent class topics included:

- The basics of saving and investing
- Strategies for college funding
- Managing employment change
- Steps to buying and selling a home

Feedback from past participants include comments such as "quality information" and "great points and suggestions to help me manage my money and ways to save and build an emergency fund..."

Future planned Wellness Wednesday Financial Education classes will include information on forming trusts, creating legal wills, estate planning, starting a small business, understanding Social Security benefits, protecting your retirement savings from inflation and more. Beyond simply managing money, planning for your financial future can offer peace of mind for you and your loved ones in the coming years.

Financial literacy produces better personal economic outcomes, housing stability, improved mental health and overall well-being. To support this effort, VA holds other types of events to help you learn about your resources and benefits, such as claims clinics, and benefits and job fairs.

Program reminders

Post programs require intelligent planning. Each year the district and the department should conduct training on both general operations and specific American Legion programs.

JANUARY Initiation ceremonies are good membership stabilizers. Keep working on membership, especially by contacting those who became delinquent Jan. 1. January is a good time to present flags and copies of the flag code to local schools. Check dates for post, district/county and state Oratorical contests. March is Community Service Month, so now is the time to plan initiatives and projects. A community assessment can reveal areas where additional effort is needed most.

FEBRUARY (Americanism Month) Host a Four Chaplains Day program. Plan school awards with local educators. Sponsor religious emphasis activities. Start planning the upcoming American Legion Baseball season. Invite a local veteran employment representative to speak at a post meeting. Consider hosting observances of Abraham Lincoln's and George Washington's birthdays. Plan an American Legion birthday program for March.


MARCH (Community Service Month) Give priority to Boys State selection by this month. Close out the membership campaign, and mail per capita fees and cards to the department. Recognize the anniversary of The American Legion's founding March 15-17. This is an occasion for post officers to focus on projecting the vision and image of The American Legion in the community, in the programs sponsored and services provided, and also on the appearance of the post home and surrounding grounds. The post should be a stakeholder in the community, conscious it represents the national organization to local citizens. Renewed attention to appearance doesn't require a capital improvement project, merely attention to detail and routine maintenance, from signage to inside and outside improvements.


APRIL (Children & Youth Month) Coordinate Children & Youth activities and recognition with the post's Auxiliary unit. Obtain Children & Youth Guide from department headquarters. Plan election of new officers, summer Scouting activities and Boys State. Put American Legion Child Welfare Foundation Week on the post calendar.

MAY This month marks the anniversary of the St. Louis Caucus, where organization of The American Legion was completed in 1919. National Poppy Week, Memorial Day, Armed Forces Day and Mother's Day form the basis for good post programs and outreach to U.S. military

personnel in communities nationwide. Consider honoring them with a Blue Star Salute. Honor veteran gravesites. Present school awards at the end of the 14 semester. Kick off American Legion Baseball and summer athletic programs. Ask school officials to approve American Legion activities and put them on the calendar for next year: Oratorical Contest, Boys State, school awards, American Education Week.

JUNE Start planning a membership drive for next year. Develop a plan engage veterans. June 14 is Flag Day, so consider surveying people and businesses in the community, asking who flies flags on patriotic holidays. The history of Old Glory would make an excellent program for a post meeting. Summer youth programs need members' support and attendance.

As we begin 2024, I think it is important to look back at 2023 and look at the work that has been done by the Boys State Team to prepare for the 2024 Session of Oklahoma American Legion Boys State.

Planning for the 2024 Session began the minute that the 2023 Session was concluded. Our staff starts by conducting an AAR of the just completed session as well as reviewing evaluations from the delegates from the session. That guides our team down the path of how we can improve our already amazing program. The vast majority of the team then takes a short break until August when the recruiting season and planning meetings begin in earnest. This break also allows several of our staff members the opportunity to serve on the Boys Nation Staff. Our executive leadership group then begins the process of rehiring returning staff, planning marketing messages, and deploying systems to do our best to make the process of selecting delegates to attend Boys State as simple as possible for you. We hope you have seen those efforts pay off in the timing of receipt of your Post Packets, the marketing you see on social media, and our ability to respond to your questions and requests quickly. This all sets us up to hopefully take advantage of the start of the new semester of school to recruit the next group of delegates for Oklahoma American Legion Boys State.

Now that the calendar has turned, while we will continue to focus on operational matters, we want to make sure that our primary focus is helping in recruiting. We all know that it is difficult to get in the door in some schools or hard to explain exactly how the program is important. If what you are doing now is working, we'd encourage you to share those processes with your fellow Posts. If what you are doing isn't as successful as you'd like, we'd strongly encourage you to start focusing on working closely with school principals and counselors in your area to have them help "select" delegates instead of simply asking the students to volunteer. By doing this, you can also work to be able to more easily reach out to the potential delegate's family to make sure they also understand how great of an honor it is to be selected to attend Boys State. This is a subject we hope to be able to discuss with you at the upcoming Midwinter Conference and also to be able to show you a few places where this process has worked incredibly well!

As we continue our push to OKBS 2024 and 400 young men on campus with us at Rogers State University, we can't stress enough how important it is for all of us to work together! Only by working as a team can we ensure that the message of Boys State is spread across the state, thereby helping make sure that the next generation is prepared to continue the American experiment for many years to come!

December is gone. It is time for you to put away your new toys and rewards for being good last year and start thinking about "Awards". It is time to talk to your Police Chiefs and Fire Chiefs, to your City Managers and Mayors. You know you didn't recognize your VA Health Care Givers last year, so you need to make up for that oversight this year.

I know there are many very good employers out there that qualify for the Employer of Veterans Award. Someone in District 8B needs to put Kingery Electric in for the Small Employer category. There are more, and we have 3 size categories. Just look around. After a Post selects an Employer of Veterans nominee they can do a press release to the local press, and the Post's nominee gets free publicity for their business. Use a carrot on a stick. Let Employers know that it takes 10% Veterans employees to qualify for the award and if they want the free recognition but don't qualify for the award, they need to hire more Veterans.

There is an award for Media Support. If you want some notoriety, nominate a local media professional or outlet for the Media award. They will do their own press release.

These are recognition of excellence awards. Those awards listed above don't require the nominee to be a Veteran. They just need to be deserving of recognition for excellence.

We have Veteran Awards; Legionnaire of the Year is one. Every Post has someone; probably many, that goes the extra yard, and honestly deserves a little recognition.

We have an award for Post Service Officer of the Year. The Department VSOs do the selection in that category, but they need a local picture of what the PSO is doing for Veterans outside of the number of claims. How many Volunteer hours does the PSO give in support of Veterans, does the PSO go to the Veterans...homes, nursing facilities or hospitals) to assist them? Does the PSO facilitate goods and services for disabled Veterans? There are many little things a PSO does outside of claims. Recognize them.


