


Department Commander's Corner Jim F. Quinn





Maybe declining numbers is the symptom, not the disease. The disease is lack of meaningful activities that people see value in. IE, lack of meaningful post activities to attract/retain people.

(Meaningful=provides value to people and communities)

Should we be rewarding meaningful post activities? Not just meeting/exceeding membership goal numbers? Maybe, something we need to have a round table about and kick ideas back and forth.

How to track meaningful post activities? What does your Post do to bring value. Membership should be more than Transactional. I.E. They paid their dues, and you hand them their membership card. The Post needs activities that are meaningful for your members and your community.

Successful and growing numbers correlation to meaningful post activities?

- Post activities leading to exponential growth?
- Is anyone keeping track of reasons for exponential growth/which posts?
- Meaningful post activities BKM (Best known Methods) knowledge base?
- How to promote community leadership/involvement through post activities?
- Posts as a pillar in community. (**If your post closed tomorrow would local community know/care?**) What do metrics really show? Measurement of effective leadership and meaningful post activities?
- If you community does not know the American Legion exist. That Post is in trouble.
- How to turn meaningful post activities into community involvement/support (2-way street)?
- "Because of our volunteerism, we can give more value to the community than just the \$\$\$ of donations."
- (Time vs. money value statement...Time is more valuable than \$\$\$)

Bottom Line: The Post must make the member feel they are getting value for their membership dues.

Did you know it's even easier than ever to support Oklahoma Boys State this year? Yes, it is! The outstanding staff of OKBS has come up with an awesome Boys State packet that you can use to make your Boys State presentation to High School Counselors and Principals at High Schools across the State to get Junior Boys and their parents to commit to attending Oklahoma Boys State May 27-June 3, 2023.


This nifty packet has a great information trifold that each student and their parents can look at that explains everything about Boys State and what will happen while the students attend. It also has sign-up information with pricing and the website where delegates can sign-up to attend. Each packet contains a flash drive that you can plug into a computer that has a nifty eight-minute video about Boys State and all the events that take place during the week that will change every student's live who attends. The flash drive can be downloaded by the counselors at the school, principals, and other school officials and by the students themselves and parents at home. It also explains that the students can be eligible for a \$12K scholarship if they complete Boys State and enroll at Rogers State University. The Boys State curriculum also includes classes on computer programing and computer gaming. Coincidently RSU offers a college degree in Computer Gaming and Programing, where upon completion of the program and graduation, young people can step into a job in this field with possibility of earning a six-figure income in some cases right out of college. [The students will be able to buy mom and dad a new car!]

If you don't have a packet or need another one or an extra flash drive, Department Headquarters has them available, just give Adjutant Rob Hough or Admin Assistant Diane Doudna a call and they can get them for you. This is a great program, and we should all support it.

Greetings Legion Family:

Let's talk about membership, if you haven't paid your membership yet you are delinquent, but you can still pay your dues and get current. If you're a Commander or Adjutant of a squadron, make sure you are processing dues as they are received and not holding them. We as a detachment have been consistently hitting our goals but we still have aways to go to get to 100% and I know we can do it with your help.

By this time all squadrons should've received a packet from the Detachment containing a draft of the proposed constitution & bylaws and letters from me. The Adjutant and some policies put out by the Department of Oklahoma are included also.

As my letter says, you have until March 15th, 2023, to letting me or NEC Chris Cook know if you have any questions or concerns regarding the constitution and bylaws. Remember this is your Detachment and all members in good standing have a voice on what happens with it.

Also, in the packet there was a letter from Adjutant Cook regarding the per capita dues for the Detachment currently the detachment per capita dues are \$10 and there was a vote at Midwinter Meetings to raise dues to \$20 and it passed unanimously. Currently the National per capita dues

are \$5 but were told they will be going up so by raising are dues now we're ahead of the game. So, starting July 1st 2023 the minimum total per capita dues you need to send in will be \$25. If your Squadron dues are below \$25 you may want to raise them to cover the minimum per capita dues.

Remember we're all membership recruiters and if you sign up 5 new members you can get a membership pin from National.

LEGION COLLEGE (OALC)

(about)

The course is intended to teach the principles and techniques necessary for effective leadership in The American Legion. Graduates will possess the skills necessary to provide program and command leadership at the Post and District level.

COURSE OBJECTIVES AND TOPICS: The Oklahoma American Legion College will provide instruction using classroom lectures, small group interactive techniques, and team building. Primary topics to be addressed include:

- Leadership and mentoring in a distributed non-profit, volunteer environment.
- Communication using both face-to-face, written, and social media methods.
- Critical thinking and problem solving.
- Team building to set and accomplish goals.
- Recognizing and effectively utilizing personality types in personnel management.
- Develop or broaden networking skills outside of the department.
- Develop, instruct, or support a Department, District, or post level training platform.
- Effective meeting management through parliamentary techniques.

TEXT AND REQUIRED SUPPLIES: All course materials will be supplied to the students before, the start of and during the week of instruction. No additional material is required but students are encouraged to explore additional outside sources on their own initiative. The use of a personal laptop or tablet is encouraged but not required. Students will be informed in those instances when only college-supplied materials may be used.

SUGGESTIONS FOR SUCCESS: Most students will find this course to be challenging both academically and individually. For some students, this will be their first experience as a member of a group of talented, very motivated individuals. Defending your ideas and positions with skill and passion but at the same time respecting the same level of passion from other students is critical. Leadership while working within a team is essential to achieve the maximum results from the course.

As Legionnaires are in Washington Conference from Feb. 26 – March 1, the nation's largest organization of veterans has assembled its legislative priorities for 2023. Among them:

- Destignatizing mental health services, and improving access to those services, to advance the Legion's "Be the One" initiative to reduce and prevent veteran suicide
- Ensuring that VA is effectively resourced to deliver "the best care anywhere" for veterans in a hybrid system that includes tele-health and community services, as well as traditional treatment
- Leveling the playing field for National Guard and Reserve veterans whose GI Bill eligibility is now restricted
- Easing the transition for Afghan allies of the U.S. Armed Forces who have come to the United States, and helping those who were left behind
- Protecting U.S. Coast Guard personnel from losing pay in the event of government shutdowns
- Changing U.S. Flag Code to permit common patriotic practices at major events and amending the Constitution to return to the states the ability to protect the flag from deliberate desecration

The American Legion's legislative priorities for the first session of the 118th Congress are condensed into a trifold brochure that can be downloaded or printed.

The American Legion Legacy Scholarship

This scholarship is a needs-based scholarship designed to fulfill a financial gap remaining after all federal and state educational grants/scholarships available to an eligible applicant have been utilized.

WHO: Children of U.S. military members who died while on active duty on or after Sept. 11, 2001. Children of post-9/11 veterans having been assigned a combined disability rating of 50 percent or greater by the Department of Veterans Affairs also qualify.

WHAT: Each needs-based scholarship provides up to \$20,000 in aid for undergraduate or post-graduate college. Recipients may reapply for additional annual awards up to six times.

WHEN: The application deadline is April 9. Scholarship awards must be used within one year.

WHAT TO DO BEFORE A VETERAN DIES

A guide to Pre-planning What to Do Before a Veteran Dies

One of the eventualities in life, that spouses and families of veterans must face is the death of their loved one who has served America in uniform. To help ease the burden on their loved ones, veterans can prepare in advance.

Important records

The first step is to make certain the family has easy access to important documents such as:

- The veteran's discharge certificate (DD form 214).
- VA documents, if any, indicating a VA claim number.
- A copy of all marriage certificates and divorce decrees (if any previous marriages).
- Insurance policies, including beneficiary designation.
- A copy of the family will (not required for VA benefits).
- Location of safety deposit boxes (not required by VA).
- Business address, email address, voice phone number and cellphone number for local American Legion service officer.

VA burial and memorial benefits

Veterans who die on active duty, or with discharges that are other than dishonorable, are entitled by law to the following benefits:

- A gravesite in any national cemetery with available space, opening and closing of the grave.
- A government headstone, marker, urn, or medallion in a national and/or private cemetery.
- A government-issued U.S. lag to drape over the casket, and for presentation to the surviving spouse or next-of-kin.
- A Presidential Memorial Certificate signed by the president of the United States.

Burial in a VA National Cemetery

Every eligible veteran who is entitled to burial in a national cemetery as long as space is available, and the following conditions are met:

- Veteran was discharged under conditions other than dishonorable.
- Veteran was not subsequently convicted for offenses involving prohibited weapons of mass destruction, genocide, and international terrorism.
- With certain exceptions, service beginning after Sept. 7, 1980, as an enlisted person and service after Oct. 16, 1981, as an officer must have served for a minimum of 24 months or the full period for which the person was called to active duty.

Headstones and markers

VA provides headstones and markers anywhere in the world for the unmarked graves of veterans who died before Sept. 11, 2001. For the marked graves of veterans who died on or after Sept. 11, 2001, double marking is authorized. Flat bronze, flat granite, flat marble, upright granite and upright marble type are available to mark the grave in a style consistent with the cemetery. Niche markers are also available for urns.

When burial is in a national cemetery or state veteran's cemetery, the headstone is ordered by the cemetery, which will place it on the grave. When burial occurs in a private cemetery, the headstone must be applied for from VA. The headstone is then shipped at government expense. VA does not pay the cost of placing the headstone on the grave. he cost is borne by the veteran's family or other party. These charges may be included in many prepaid funeral packages. VA Form 40-1330 (application for headstone) can be obtained from most funeral home directors, through veterans service officers, or through VA. his form may also be downloaded and printed out by visiting www.cem.va.gov/hmm/.

Burial Flags

A U.S. lag is provided, at no cost, to drape over the casket or accompany the urn of a deceased veteran who served honorably in the U.S. Armed Forces. It is furnished to honor the memory of a veteran's military service.

Eligibility for former members of Selected Reserves were added by Section 517 of Public Law 105-261.

The flag will be issued once only for burial purposes and will not be replaced if lost, stolen, damaged or destroyed. National cemeteries with avenues of flags, and many state veterans cemeteries, accept donations of burial lags for mass display on Memorial Day, Veterans Day and other occasions. he standard issue burial flag is made of cotton and will not withstand continuous outdoor display. Burial flags may be obtained at VA regional voices, national cemeteries and most local post voices. Overseas, U.S. flags can be obtained from U.S. embassies or consulates VA will furnish a burial flag for veterans who served during wartime, died on active duty after May 27, 1941, who served after Jan. 31, 1955, peacetime veterans who were discharged or released before June 27, 1950, certain people who served in the organized military forces of the commonwealth of the Philippines while in service of the U.S. Armed Forces, and who died on or after April 25, 1951, and certain former members of the Selected Reserves. 

BOYS STATE UPDATE!

Hello Fellow Oklahoma Legion Members!

Thank you so much for the great support you have given to the Boys State program this year. Our registration numbers continue to be a tremendous improvement over the last several years and that is thanks in no small part to your efforts. As we have worked the last several years to modernize the program and make it more attractive to the young men that are eligible to attend, you have increased your efforts to recruit those young men in like kind. That is a wonderful accomplishment, but we still need more! The Boys State team is working hard this offseason to make the program even better and we know we can count on you to increase the recruiting efforts as well. Based on the information and discussion we have had; it sounds like that is already the case!

All of these efforts have paid off as shown by the fact that we now have 72 delegates registered. When compared with each recruiting year since 2015, this shows that we are over two weeks ahead of any year in the timeframe. However, we still have space to accommodate another 378 young men and to let them experience The Week That Shapes A Lifetime.

I'd still encourage you to take a picture in front of the school or school signs when you go to visit a school and to send those pictures to our Chief Operating Officer, Jared Harrison, at jared.harrison@okboysstate.com. He will be able to take those pictures and post them online to thank the schools for letting us come visit. This helps us engage more people in the digital world we all live in. 
I am also a Veteran Service Officer the past 4 years and really enjoy helping vets with their claims.



James F. Slusher June 26,1948 - February 24, 2023



Navy Seaman 1st Class Donald A. Stott February 27, 1923 – December 7, 1941

USS Oklahoma Sailor Accounted For From World War II (Stott, D.) WASHINGTON — The Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency (DPAA) announced today that Navy Seaman 1st Class Donald A. Stott, 19, of Monticello, Iowa, killed during World War II, was accounted for on March 26, 2021. On Dec. 7, 1941, Stott was assigned to the battleship USS Oklahoma, which was moored at Ford Island, Pearl Harbor, when the ship was attacked by Japanese aircraft. The USS Oklahoma sustained multiple torpedo hits, which caused it to quickly capsize. The attack on the ship resulted in the deaths of 429 crewmen, including Stott. From December 1941 to June 1944, Navy personnel recovered the remains of the deceased crew, which were subsequently

interred in the Halawa and Nu'uanu Cemeteries. In September 1947, tasked with recovering and identifying fallen U.S. personnel in the Pacific Theater, members of the American Graves Registration Service (AGRS) disinterred the remains of U.S. casualties from the two cemeteries and transferred them to the Central Identification Laboratory at Schofield Barracks. The laboratory staff was only able to confirm the identifications of 35 men from the USS Oklahoma at that time. The AGRS subsequently buried the unidentified remains in 46 plots at the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific (NMCP), known as the Punchbowl, in Honolulu. In October 1949, a military board classified those who could not be identified as non-recoverable, including Stott. Between June and November 2015, DPAA personnel exhumed the USS Oklahoma Unknowns from the Punchbowl for analysis. To identify Stott's remains, scientists from DPAA used dental and anthropological analysis. Additionally, scientists from the Armed Forces Medical Examiner System used mitochondrial DNA (mtDNA) analysis. Stott's name is recorded on the Walls of the Missing at the Punchbowl, along with the others who are missing from WWII. A rosette will be placed next to his name to indicate he has been accounted for. Stott will be buried on March 25, 2023, in Monticello, Iowa.
