

PARISH NURSE NOTES

Well here we are entering the Season of Advent. A lot has happened in 4 weeks' time, notably the rise of coronavirus cases, hospitalizations, and deaths even here in NW Wisconsin. The timing of this surge is particularly bad (would it ever be a good time?) with this week's deer hunting season and Thanksgiving Holiday. I am pleading with you all to PLEASE LIMIT YOUR EXPOSURE to others at this time. As much as you want to be with extended family and friends just to share a meal or visit for the afternoon, **DON'T**. It's that simple. If there's something you need, call the church and we'd be willing to pick it up and drop it off at your front door. And when around others, wear a mask. Remember...I wear mine to protect YOU; you wear yours to protect ME. I know... we're all tired of COVID! But look at it as a patriotic duty... not unlike the rationing of many items for civilians during World War II. It's what folks needed to do to help the war effort and combat the enemy. Wearing masks and physically distancing is what we all need to do to protect ourselves and each other against the threat of COVID-19.

Usually at this time I am planning the annual Service of Remembrance & Hope leading up to the Christmas holiday. Certainly the virus has added an extra dimension to grieving this year. COVID-19 has taken so much, and we are exhausted and weary. These past 8 months, we've lost connections, employment, and loved ones. And we've had to manage new and multiple demands. Saying goodbye to our way of living and those we love begets a strange new landscape to maneuver. Not being able to gather to have a "regular" funeral service is something I can personally relate to and it feels so wrong. Most of us are not normally capable of handling grief as a solitary burden. Physical distancing dictates grief in isolation — with little to no closeness or hugs to console one another. And now the Christmas holiday is approaching and everyone is supposed to be festive and merry. However, it can be anything but that for those whose loss is weighing heavy on their soul, OR just due to the fact that most of us won't be able to gather to be with all the loved ones we typically see at Christmastime.

Here are a few suggestions you may want to try to heal yourself and remember those who you are missing this holiday due to death or CDC separation guidelines:

- Spend time with your favorite photos of the memories you've shared
- Talk on the phone or ZOOM with loved ones to share some special memories, e.g. "Remember the time Grandma forgot about the stuffing in the oven and it was practically petrified, but nobody wanted to hurt her feelings so we all chipped off a chunk?" Tell a favorite story about those you are missing this season or who have passed on.
- When you have your meal even if you're alone this year you may wish to set a place for those who
 aren't able to be with you. It can be something as simple as an empty glass or as elaborate as a full place
 setting.
- If the person or people you're missing are/were into nature, bundle up and go out for a walk around the block or on a wooded trail and take it all in.

As the holiday season approaches, find healthy ways to express the loneliness, stress, and grief you may be feeling. It's easy to self-medicate with social media, food, alcohol, online shopping and other behaviors that left unchecked can lead to a whole new set of problems. Letting go of how life used to be is hard. But we cannot move forward unless we are willing to leave something behind. Make this a season for introspection and reflection, identifying our grief and gratitude. Take inventory of the ways your have been blessed.

STEWARDSHIP CORNER

"The King will say to them, "Whenever you failed to help any of my people, no matter how unimportant they seemed, you failed to do it for me." Matthew 25:45, CEV.

These words of warning from Jesus are part of a series of lessons He gave to His followers in the final days before his suffering and death. In this segment, Jesus paints a picture of His judgement of all humans, and the separation of the sheep, those who would join Him for eternity, from the goats, those who would suffer eternally for their lack of action during their lives. We Lutherans believe that the reward or punishment Jesus promises are not based on our actions, or works, but on either the faith that compels us to act, or the lack of faith that allows us to do less than our best to help those who are in need. We are called to be proactive in our response to others' needs; for instance, John is instructed by Jesus in Revelation 3:16 to write to Christians in Laodicea, "But since you are lukewarm and neither cold nor hot, I will spit you out of my mouth." What action does our faith compel? Are we cold, hot, or just lukewarm? Will we be counted as sheep, or goats?

The CRISIS of CHRISTMAS

Dear Members and Friends of the Northwest Synod of Wisconsin,

Christmas 2020 will occur while we are living through of a series of crises. Here's the list: the pandemic, economic losses, protests against racial injustices, an ongoing climate crisis, and a divided country following a contentious presidential election. I'm not going to lie, it's been stressful for me, and I imagine it has been for you, too. As Christians, we have been moving through these crisis-filled days with

the expectation that God is present and God's promises are true. We move forward with hope.

The two Chinese characters for the word "**crisis**," 危机, have often been translated as "danger" and "opportunity." Others say that a better translation is "danger" and "change point." What dangers do you see as your congregation moves toward celebrating the Birth of our Savior — Christmas - in a totally new way? What "opportunities" or "change points" do you see that could propel your church forward in a positive way into God's future?

Mary experienced a theological crisis when the angel Gabriel revealed to her God's plan to enter this world by the baby in her womb. Mary's body was the center of a theological crisis - much like the theological crisis caused by a virus that has invaded the bodies of our loved ones, and the theological crisis of abused and broken black and brown bodies, and the theological crisis experienced in the misuse of this planet on which all bodies live. Where is God in the crisis? What does this mean?

In a crisis, God comes to us. John 1:1,14 *In the beginning was the Word... and the Word was God...And the Word became flesh and lived among us.* Jesus is God, divine *and* human. God took up residence and moved into our neighborhood. God goes where God's people go and is who the people are. This is the theological promise of John's gospel. God is present with us in our times of crisis and suffering. This is the foundation of Luther's theology of the cross.

God is revealed through the crisis of Mary's pregnancy and Jesus' untimely birth in a Bethlehem barn. God is revealed in the crucifixion; through the body of Jesus, hanging on a cross. God is revealed through the risen body of Jesus on Easter Morning.

No matter how different Christmas is for you this year, no matter what crisis arises, God is there, present as promised, in the WORD made flesh. May the story of Jesus' birth bring you much needed joy and hope this holiday season and may the presence of God comfort you in the new year.
