Beloved Church Family,

Since the last Sunday in August, I have been preaching from the Psalms and will continue to do so for the next three weeks. The Psalms, or Psalter, is a collection of songs and prayers spanning Israel's history and reflecting the people's experiences as they journeyed with God. Many of the hymns and spirituals songs we use in worship are inspired by the Psalms, their timeless messages expressed in verses and stanzas.

The Psalms often shape our liturgy and order of worship. For example, in the Methodist tradition, the *Revised Common Lectionary* provides four readings each Sunday, one of which is always a Psalm. This reminds us how deeply the Psalms are woven into the structure of Christian worship.

There are many genres of Psalms, making them appropriate for different settings, seasons, and celebrations in the life of God's people. While not all of them read like traditional songs of praise, they reflect the full range of human experience before God: joy and sorrow, confidence and doubt, praise and lament. Most are attributed to David, and together they give voice to prayers that cover nearly every aspect of life.

The Psalms are arranged in five "books":

Book 1: Psalms 1-41

Book 2: Psalms 42–72

Book 3: Psalms 73–89

Book 4: Psalms 90–106

Book 5: Psalms 107-150

It is no surprise that the Psalms remain a favorite for so many. They speak to us because they reflect our own lives. We know what it means to suffer, to grieve, to face injustice and oppression. We also know the joy of worship, the hope of God's promises, and the comfort of God's presence. Whatever our circumstances, there is a Psalm that speaks to us, reminding us of God's mercy, faithfulness, and holiness.

As we dwell in the Psalms together, my prayer is that you discover anew how our relationship with God embraces the whole range of human emotions. Like the psalmists, may we always turn to God, trusting that God is with us, and that God's goodness and mercy endure forever.

Find comfort in the words of the Psalms!


