Dear Chapter Fiends.

It's the Chapter Annual Sewing Retreat
Time!!! By the time you receive this news-

letter 26 of the chapter members will be at St. Christopher Conference Center on Seabrook Island for 4 ½ days of sewing and creating. This is

the event so many of us have looked forward to since we left the retreat last year. While I was completing the paper work for the retreat I realized that one quarter of the chapter membership is attending. That is exciting to see so many people enjoying this event. The plan is to go back again next year so consider joining the group. Space fills up quickly and we are limited to the group size, so once registration opens for the 2019 retreat be ready to say yes! We sew, eat, walk the beach, learn, have fun and repeat that schedule for 4 days. What a life! (but someone has to do it)

In the beginning of March the chapter hosted Rae Cumbie and Carrie Emerson for a 3 day event of fitting and making the *Tabula Rasa Jacket*. Tabula Rasa means blank slate in Latin. I always wondered where the name came from for the pattern. Carrie explained it starts as a "blank slate" with just the basic shell and you create or design any way you want to show your own style and details. Twenty two ladies got to create our own personally fitted jacket. It was amazing to see all the beautiful work our chapter does. The best part was everyone had a great fitting pattern that can be used over and over and incorporated into other designs. We had guests from other chapters join us and they were so impressed with all our chapter has to offer. In the class we discussed fitting issues, fabric selections and variations you can do with one pattern. My jacket was made from batik fabrics but others used denim, quilting cottons, linen, silk blends and wool. Some jackets were short, some long, they had different sleeve lengths and trims and all were as different as the ladies making them. If you have a completed jacket send it in to the newsletter and share your creation with the chapter.

Another fun event that at least 12 of our chapter members enjoyed was going to Sew Expo in Atlanta in early March. Even though this is not an ASG sponsored event we have started making this a tradition that so many want to enjoy together. We take classes with national educators, watch fashion shows, observe demos on new items and techniques, shop in the vendor hall and have fun being together. (Some even do outlet mall shopping on the way there!) Do I see a theme here for what our chapter likes? Fun and friends seem to be the key words. On Friday night as many as possible get together for dinner and then have Show and Tell in our hotel rooms and share the great purchases that we just could not live without. At Sew Expo I purchased a floor model of a serger that I had been contemplating buying for the last year. I got a great deal on this machine. Others also bought demo machines at very good prices. Cars were packed full on the way home but we made it. Now this leads me to the next part of this article; sewing room organization. When you have a very limited space for your sewing area and a new toy moves in this can create a problem. I researched some organization tips that I would like to share with you. Some tips will work for you and others won't but they make you think of ways to keep what you have organized in a way that is logical and practical for you.

1. Keep a 3 ring binder and page protectors to store articles and info from magazines and file by category or type of sewing; garment tips, quilting, crafts, etc.







Contest items do not need to be made solely of the ASG fabric, but the fabric with the ASG logo must be prominently featured. Order your fabric at www.myfabricdesigns.com/Artist/AmericanSewingGuild/Main with a 20% discount if you use the code: ASG20.

The winning chapter will be the one that has the highest percentage of their membership participating in the contest. The prize for the winning chapter is a National Educator event for the chapter. We already have seven members who have made items from this fabric. If you participate, the chapter will recognize you at the Annual meeting in November and you will be able to showcase your item. If our chapter wins, participants will be guaranteed a seat at the National Educator event. [see ASG submission details below.]

Wow! Part 2 of the Fabric Design contest has generated so much excitement and interest that it has exceeded our expectations. We have received multiple questions, and I love the way we as sewers think...out of the box. So this update will serve as a reminder of the contest and address some of those questions again.

Entries have already started coming in. I know that there will be many others as the deadline approaches. To comply with the many requests we have received, **the deadline for submissions has been extended to May 31, 2018**. Yes, you now have an additional two months to work on your fabulous entries.

Can one member submit more than one item? Yes, as long as the items are different in terms of patterns. For example: one member can submit a handbag, a dress and a wall hanging. As a result, the chapter will be credited three entries.

Do I have to use the gray and white version of the design?No you can use any of the color palettes offered and in any size on any fabric.

I can't seem to find a place to enter the discount code,

ASG20. To find the space to enter ASG20, first pick the fabric and put it in your cart. Scroll down, just below the listing of fabrics look on the left to enter the discount code


Can I use more of the coordinating fabric design than the winning design? Yes. The rule is that the winning design made with the dress form and the ASG logo (in any color palette and size) must be featured in the project.

Can I use the winning design solely as a lining in a project? No, using it this way does not feature the design. It must be visible from the exterior of the item.

How will you know how to credit my chapter for my entry? After your creation is completed, you will need to submit your name, your chapter name, and a photo of your creation making sure that the winning design is clearly displayed to: assgfabricdesigncontest@gmail.com no later than May 31, 2018.

Now with this information, I just know that your scissors will be clipping and your machines humming to make wonderful creations as contest entries. We can't wait to see what you create.

The duties of each of these positions and an approximate commitment of your time are described by the current incumbents in their own words. We sincerely hope you will consider lending your voice to the inner workings of our chapter.

The slate of candidates and Proxy Ballots will be sent out in the September newsletter.

The President is responsible for the overall functioning of the chapter and coordinating various committees to make a successful year for the chapter. There are 2 required forms to fill out for National HQ to send at the beginning of the year. The President works with the Treasurer to prepare the annual operating budget to assure we have the funding to accomplish all the goals for the year.

Recurring duties are scheduling quarterly CAB meetings, prepare the agenda, send out invitation/reminders prior to the meeting and facilitate the CAB meetings. After CAB meetings I review the minutes before publication. I receive monthly e-mails from the National President, some have special requests, updates for the website, a vote or a survey.

As President I write the front page article for the bi-monthly newsletter and review the completed newsletter before it goes to print. I also monitor the website to make sure it is correct and up to date and I review monthly chapter membership updates. I answer e-mails on all sorts of questions, suggestions, or problems and forward these on to others, if appropriate.

As President I sign contracts for the chapter and oversee the coordination of events to assure everything is covered including decorations, nametags, directions, reservations, food (if necessary), table favors, door prizes, speakers, equipment, room set up, etc. There are usually 4-5 events per year.

On an average I spend about 7 hours a week on ASG related items, and about 8 hours additional per event. It just takes some organization, planning ahead and willingness to travel for meetings. I have a small area in my den for ASG files, records and supplies. BEST OF ALL: I get to attend the Annual National Conference to represent Central Savannah River Chapter!

The 1st Vice President's duties are quite different from what is listed in the regs. The 1st Vice President is also a voting member of the CAB. I assist the President as needed/requested including standing in her place if she is unable. I coordinate the silent auction at the annual meeting to include soliciting dona-

tions, receiving donations, recording donations received, setting up and overseeing the auction at the annual meeting, collecting monies from members for the auction items and sending thank you letters to those who donated items. Technically I'm supposed to oversee a variety of the committee chairs - but we have such good leadership in those roles, so I don't really need to do anything but will assist as needed.

The **2nd Vice President** is a voting member of the CAB. It is interesting and you can meet many interesting people. The time I spend every month not including CAB meetings is about 2 hours. You can do more if you want. The duties include keeping in touch with neighborhood group leaders; help set up new groups; visiting neighborhood groups; help NG leaders with ideas for programs; be ready to share your love of sewing with everyone you meet.

The **Secretary** is a voting member of the CAB. As such she is required to attend the quarterly meetings and the annual meeting. She records the minutes of all meetings and posts them to the internet. The secretary sends out all correspondence including cards for members who are sick, have experienced a loss or other circumstances. Outside of time spent at the meetings/going to the meetings, it takes about 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ - 2 hours per quarter.

The *Treasurer* position involves a little more that just collecting money and writing checks. You need to keep an accurate account of all funds received and all funds spent by the chapter. Some months are busier than others, depending on the chapter's activities. Duties include: Balancing the checkbook with the Bank's statement; prepare the Quarterly Financial Report and send it to Head-quarters; prepare & deliver the Treasurer's report for every CAB; prepare the annual budget and get it approved by the CAB. Keep the chapter spending within the guidelines of the approved budget. You are the registrar for all special events that the chapter holds, collecting fees, keeping accurate records of who is attending and paying all the bills.

Neighborhood Group (NG) Coordinator Report Ellen Macklin

How have you all been doing on your ideas for our chapter scrap challenge? I have come up with awesome ideas and then realize I'm recycling. Sometimes I think we could do a neighborhood group on recycling all kinds of "stuff." If you are interested let me know. Another fun group would be heirloom sewing or costumes.

I'd like to know if any of you would like to help in sponsoring some meetings to generate new members. I know you have friends that learned to sew when they were young and more than likely were discouraged as were so many women I know. I took Home EC with a young girl who had to remove a full length zipper that she had pick stitched. She loved the new knits (1970) and she had a beautiful pink

that was so beautiful on her. Our teacher would take the tape measure and found one spot out of sync. No one but the teacher saw it but it had to come out. Needless to say that young girl who was so discouraged she never wanted to pick up fabric again. She had to redo it three times! I encourage you to especially reach out to those who lost a creative outlet this way!

Our chapter loves challenges so I'd like to challenge each NG to send me a super idea for a recruiting tool. I'm sure we can get venues and show our passion to one of those who got lost along the way. What do you say, want to help the cause? Call me.

What's Been Happening in West Columbia:



- 2. Roll elastics and ribbons and secure with a binder clip. Mark yardage on the roll.
- 3. Wrap multiple styles of trims on cardboard and store in a narrow space.
- 4. Use mugs, cups, jars and glassware to store pens, rulers, scissors, buttons and small tools.
- 5. Keep attachments for each machine in a separate box with the machine it belongs to.
- 6. Store rolled up batting in baskets or tubs and save valuable shelf space.
- 7. Keep a silverware tray at your machine and/or cutting table to store the items you use the most.
- 8. Maximize all the space you have. Use corner cabinets or desks and push tables against the wall for better use of floor space.
- 9. Use see through containers with drawers to store things and place them under tables. Store items in smaller bins to keep them more organized rather than in one large bin where they get jumbled together. Use clear bins to easily view what is in the bin.
- 10. Hang a pegboard on a wall or on the back of a door and store anything that hangs; thread racks, rotary cutters, scissors, packs of trim, patterns in clear baggies with a punch hole, quilting rulers
- 11. Keep a chalk board or white board visible to make notes of projects or due date. Use batting scraps as an eraser! Batting scraps are also great for cleaning and dusting.
- 12. Put a shelf on a wall over your work space to store books, magazines and patterns. They are still easily accessible but not taking up prime work space.
- 13. Store an oversize ironing board upright in a narrow space when not in use.
- 14. Every space counts. Use even the smallest area to store something. Just remember where you put it! Put buttons in a jar, beads in small plastic containers, old wood cigar boxes are great for little items like packs of needles or presser feet. Never pass up any cute container, it may be just what you need.
- 15. Most of all personalize it for you, decorate with your favorite color and things that make you happy. Tack up a wall hanging you made, your kids artwork, or pictures of ideas you want to make or a fabric you love that you need to match.

Organizing is time consuming and a frustrating process but once it is done you will be so much happier with your area, whether it is large or small, in its own room or a corner of a room, upstairs, down stairs or where ever. Be happy with what you have and make the best use of it. We are so fortunate to have to worry about how to store our many items yet there are so many that would be happy to have a simple machine that works. Enjoy what you have and create in a space that pleases you.

The next chapter event that I hope to see you at is the Annual Picnic on June 2nd at Gibson Lake Park in Lexington. No registration necessary, just bring a salad or picnic food to share. See the flyer in the newsletter for more information. The summer months will be a slower time for the chapter so you can take time to enjoy family activities, traveling, vacations and staying cool. We gear back up again in August with some new programs so read the newsletters for information on them and sign up to attend!!!

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
